Hello, my name is Eric Primm; I'm an avid reader who loves to support his local bookstore (Left Bank Books) here in St. Louis. It is a small business and important to the country's economy and to the local St. Louis economy. It is also important to St. Louis's history and culture. I've been to a number of author readings and events at the store. I love that store. It is being threatened, however, by Amazon.com; a company that chooses to lose money on books so as to sell other products. Amazon prices books so low that they lose money. How does a small business, whose main income is the sale of books, compete against a company that purposely loses money? It can't, but the agency model that the U.S. government is now in direct opposition to and going to court over, brought a bit of parity to the market. It slowed Amazon's ability to form a monopoly on the sale of books and allowed sane business principles to take root. Left Bank Books was able to enter the eBook market under the agency model and sell books to me. I finally had an option that supported local business where I could buy eBooks.
