FINAL ORDER OF DISCIPLINE

The respondent will be suspended from practice before the Board, Immigration Courts, and Department of Homeland Security (the "DHS"), for five years.

On October 21, 2011, the Supreme Court of the State of Nebraska disbarred the respondent from the practice of law in Nebraska. Consequently, on March 26, 2013, the Disciplinary Counsel for the Executive Office for Immigration Review petitioned for the respondent's immediate suspension from practice before the Board of Immigration Appeals and the Immigration Courts. The DHS then asked that the respondent be similarly suspended from practice before that agency. Therefore, on April 11, 2013, the Board suspended the respondent from practicing before the Board, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS pending final disposition of this proceeding.

The respondent was required to file a timely answer to the allegations contained in the Notice of Intent to Discipline but has failed to do so. *See* 8 C.F.R. § 1003.105 (2012); 77 Fed. Reg. 2011, 2014-15 (Jan. 13, 2012); *see also* 78 Fed. Reg. 24669 (April 26, 2013). The respondent's failure to file a response within the time period prescribed in the Notice constitutes an admission of the allegations therein, and the respondent is now precluded from requesting a hearing on the matter. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.105(2012); 77 Fed. Reg. 2011, 2014-15 (Jan. 13, 2012); *see also* 78 Fed. Reg. 24669 (April 26, 2013).


The Notice proposes that the respondent be suspended from practicing before the Board and the Immigration Courts for five years, observing that the respondent may not apply for reinstatement in Nebraska for five years. The DHS asks that the Board extend that discipline to practice before it as well. Because the respondent has failed to file an answer, the regulations direct the Board to adopt the proposed sanction contained in the Notice, unless there are considerations that compel us to digress from that proposal. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.105(2012); 77 Fed. Reg. 2011, 2014-15 (Jan. 13, 2012); *see also* 78 Fed. Reg. 24669 (April 26, 2013).

Since the proposed sanction is appropriate, in light of the respondent being disbarred in Nebraska, the Board will honor that proposal. As the respondent is currently under our April 11, 2013, order of suspension, we will deem the respondent's suspension to have commenced on that date.

ORDER: The Board hereby suspends the respondent from practice before the Board, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS, for five years.

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent is instructed to maintain compliance with the directives set forth in our prior order. The respondent is also instructed to notify the Board of any further disciplinary action against him.

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent may petition this Board for reinstatement to practice before the Board, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS under 8 C.F.R. § 1003.105(d)(2) (2012). *See* 77 Fed. Reg. 2011, 2015 (Jan. 13, 2012); *see also* 78 Fed. Reg. 24669 (April 26, 2013).
