PROPOSED DECISION

This claim against the Government of Cuba, under Title V of the International Claims Settlement Act of 1949, as amended, was presented by JAMES E. BOUNDS and is based upon the asserted loss of \$296.25, sustained in connection with the ownership of common stock interests in Cia. Azucarera Vertientes-Camaguey de Cuba and Manati Sugar Company. Ciaimant has been a national of the United States since his birth.

Under Title V of the International Claims Settlement Act of 1949

[78 Stat. IIIO (1964), 22 U.S.C. §1643-1643k (1964), as amended, 79 Stat.

988 (1965)], the Commission is given jurisdiction over claims of nationals of the United States against the Government of Cuba. Section 503(a) of the Act provides that the Commission shall receive and determine in accordance with applicable substantive law, including international law, the amount and validity of claims by nationals of the United States against the Government of Cuba arising since January 1, 1959 for

losses resulting from the nationalization, expropriation, intervention or other taking of, or special measures directed against property, including any rights or interests therein owned wholly or partially, directly or indirectly at the time by nationals of the United States.

Section 502(3) of the Act provides:

The term 'property' means any property, right or interest including any leasehold interest, and debts owed by the Government of Cuba or by enterprises which have been nationalized, expropriated, intervened, or taken by the Government of Cuba and debts which are a charge on property which has been nationalized, expropriated, intervened, or taken by the Government of Cuba.

Section 504 of the Act provides, as to ownership of claims, that

(a) A claim shall not be considered under section 503(a) of this title unless the property on which the claim was based was owned wholly or partially, directly or indirectly by a national of the United States on the date of the loss and if considered shall be considered only to the extent the claim has been held by one or more nationals of the United States continuously thereafter until the date of filling with the Commission.

Section 507 of the Act provides, as to assignment of claims, that

(b) The amount determined to be due on any claim of an assignee who acquires the same by purchase shall not exceed (or, in the case of any such acquisition subsequent to the date of the determination, shall not be deemed to have exceeded) the amount of the actual consideration paid by such assignee, or in case of successive assignments of a claim by any assignee.

Claim is presented for an interest in stock issued by Vertientes.

Camaguey Sugar Company of Cuba. On the basis of evidence of record, the

Commission finds that claimant acquired 100 shares of stock in Vertientes.

Camaguey Sugar Company by purchase on September 27, 1960, for a consideration of \$296.25.

The record discloses that Cia, Azucarera Vertientes-Camaguey de Cuba was listed as nationalized in Resolution No. 1 (pursuant to Law 851), published in the Cuban Official Gazette on August 6, 1960, This corporation was organized under the laws of Cuba and does not qualify as a corporate "national of the United States" defined under Section 502(1)(B) of the Act as a corporation or other legal entity organized under the laws of the United States, or any State, the District of Columbia or the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, whose ownership is vested to the extent of 50 per centum or more in natural persons who are citizens of the United States. In this type of situation, it has been held previously that a stockholder in such a corporation is entitled to file a claim based upon the stock in question which represents an ownership interest in the assets of a nationalized enterprise within the purview of Section 502(3) of the Act. (See Claim of Parke, Davis & Company, Claim No. CU-0180.)

Under the provisions of Section 504(a) of the Act, a claimant is required to establish that the claim for any loss has been continuously owned by a national or nationals of the United States from the date of loss to the date of filing with the Commission. As stated, the loss to Vertientes-Camaguey Sugar Co. stockholders occurred on August 6, 1960. Claimant has been unable to obtain information or evidence to establish the nationality of the owner of the securities on the date of loss, and to establish continuous United States ownership of the securities until the date on which claimant acquired them.

Evidence of record before the Commission discloses that securities of the type subject of this claim were almost entirely owned and traded by persons or firms having addresses in the United States. The Commission has considered whether an inference may be justified that the claimed securities were continuously owned by a national or nationals of the United States from the date of loss to the date on which purchased by the claimant, and, in the absence of evidence to the contrary, has concluded that the securities were continuously so owned. (See Claim of the Executors of the Estate of Julius S. Wikler, Deceased, Claim No. CU-2571.)

The Commission finds that claimant, upon his purchase of 100 shares of Vertientes-Camaguey Sugar Company, succeeded to the loss sustained by the assignor of the shares, and concludes that he succeeded to and suffered a loss in the total amount of \$296.25 as a result of the nationalization of the Vertientes-Camaguey Sugar Company on August 6, 1960.

Claim has also been made for the value of 100 shares of common stock issued by Manati Sugar Company. Evidence available to the Commission establishes that Manati Sugar Company was incorporated in the State of New York, and it has also been established that more than 50% of the outstanding capital stock of the corporation was owned by nationals of the United States. Consequently, Manati Sugar Company qualifies as a corporate national of the United States within the meaning of Title V of the Act.

Section 505(a) of the Act recites, in part, that

A claim under section 503(a) of this title based upon an ownership interest in any corporation, association, or other entity which is a national of the United States shall not be considered.

Therefore, the portion of the claim which is based upon ownership of stock in Manati Sugar Company must be, and is hereby, denied. The Commission deems it unnecessary to make other determinations with respect to this portion of the claim.

The Commission has decided that in certification of loss on claims determined pursuant to Title V of the International Claims Settlement Act of 1949, as amended, interest should be included at the rate of 6% per annum from the date of loss to the date of settlement. (See the Claim of Liste Corporation, Claim No. CU-0644.)

The Commission concludes, however, that the amount of loss sustained by claimant herein, in connection with his Vertientes-Camaguey Sugar Company stock, shall be increased by interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from September 27, 1960, the date on which claimant acquired the shares, to the date on which provision is made for the settlement thereof.

CERTIFICATION OF LOSS

The Commission certifies that JAMES E BOUNDS succeeded to and suffered a loss, as a result of actions of the Government of Cuba, within the scope of Title V of the International Claims Settlement Act of 1949, as amended, in the amount of Two Hundred Ninety-six Dollars and Twenty-five Cents (\$296.25) with interest at 6% per annum from September 27, 1960 to the date of settlement.

NOTICE TO TREASURY: The above-referenced securities may not have been submitted to the Commission or if submitted, may have been returned; accordingly, no payment should be made until claimant establishes retention of the securities for the loss here certified.

The statute does not provide for the payment of claims against the Government of Cuba. Provision is only made for the determination by the Commission of the validity and amounts of such claims. Section 501 of the statute specifically precludes any authorization for appropriations for payment of these claims. The Commission is required to certify its findings to the Secretary of State for possible use in future negotiations with the Government of Cuba.

NOTICE: Pursuant to the Regulations of the Commission, if no objections are filed within 15 days after service or receipt of notice of this Proposed Decision, the decision will be entered as the Final Decision of the Commission upon the expiration of 30 days after such service or receipt of notice, unless the Commission otherwise orders.
