I, the undersigned complainant, being duly sworn, state the following is true and correct to the best of my knowledge and belief. Between on or about July 12, 2009 and on or about September 8, 2009, in the Eastern Districts of California and Oklahoma, and elsewhere, the defendant(s) did,

Knowingly Mail Injurious Articles and Possess and Use a Destructive Device in Relation to a Crime of Violence,

in violation of Title 1, United States Code, Sections 1716 and 924(c)(1), respectively, with a maximum penalty of twenty years imprisonment and a fine of up to \$250,000, as to the former charge, and a mandatory minimum term of thirty years imprisonment, as to the latter charge.

I further state that I am a(n) Postal Inspector and that this complaint is based on the following facts: (Official Title)

A F F I D A V I T

I, Eula J. Toca, being duly sworn, hereby depose and state:

1. I am a Postal Inspector with the United States Postal Inspection Service, Los Angeles Division, Los Angeles, California, and have been so employed for over three years. I am currently a member of the Dangerous Mail Investigations Team where I have been assigned for over three years. I am responsible for investigating violations of law relating to the mail, including mail bombs, bomb threats to damage or destroy postal facilities, unknown suspicious substances/powder hoaxes and suspicious mail matter.

2. This affidavit is made in support of a criminal complaint against and arrest warrant for VERNON MUSTIN for violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1716, Mailing of Injurious Articles, and Title 18, United States Code, Section 924(c)(1), Possession and Use of a Destructive Device in Relation to a Crime of Violence.

3. This affidavit is being submitted for the limited purpose of establishing probable cause in obtaining an arrest warrant for VERNON MUSTIN. Therefore, I have not set forth each and every fact that I have learned during the course of this investigation.

PROBABLE CAUSE

4. On September 8, 2009, I learned through other Postal Inspectors and confirmed through an Inspection Service Report that Postal Inspectors were responding to a possible Improvised Explosive Device (IED) received by a postal customer at the 100 block of North Valley Oaks Drive, Visalia, CA 93292. Initial reports indicated that a postal customer had received a parcel in his box of a Neighborhood Delivery Collection Box Unit (NDCBU) and when he opened it, it exploded and caused burns on his arms.

5. I have been involved in this investigation since the initial report of the incident on September 8, 2009. Over the course of the investigation, I have spoken to a number of Postal Inspectors, I have read numerous reports provided by Inspectors and other law enforcement officers and I have performed research regarding and spoken to subjects involved with the incident.

Through these sources, I have learned the following:

6. The actual address where the IED exploded was 116 North Valley Oaks Drive, Visalia, CA. Postal Inspectors Raul Pina, Ralph Perez, Robert Draper, Glenn Fiene, Justin Moore, Frank Ducar and James Walsh responded to Visalia, CA. Members of the Visalia Police Department were also on scene.

7. Inspector Moore, who responded from Bakersfield, CA, interviewed the letter carrier who delivered the parcel containing the IED. Inspector Moore related the following information regarding the letter carrier:

a. U.S. Postal Letter Carrier Ray Hopper told Inspector Moore that he initially placed the parcel in a parcel locker located next to the community mail box which served the various businesses at this location.

b. As the letter carrier placed the letter mail in the various compartments, the receptionist for Cal Air (Leticia Valencia Arteaga) came to the mailbox to retrieve the mail for the business.

c. The letter carrier stated that he handed the letter mail to the receptionist and then retrieved the parcel from the parcel locker and handed it to the receptionist.

8. Inspector Moore stated the receptionist left the scene after being interviewed by Visalia Police Department Detectives. Inspector Moore stated that the receptionist, Leticia Valencia Arteaga, told detectives the following:

a. The mailman handed her a parcel addressed to Aaron's Air and Heating along with the letter mail for the business.

b. She returned to the office and gave this parcel to Aaron Mustin.

c. It is the business practice at their office for her to open all letters while she turns all parcels over to Aaron or Dan Mustin, who own and operate the business.

d. Mustin went into the adjoining office with this parcel.

e. A few moments later there was a flash and loud noise from the room Aaron Mustin had entered.

f. She entered the room and observed that Mustin had been injured and immediately called 911.

9. Inspector Moore stated Aaron Mustin had been transported to the local hospital.

10. Inspector Ducar spoke with a bomb technician from the Visalia Police Department who stated the device consisted of several PVC pipes with end caps, that only one of the pipes partially detonated and that four other pipes of the IED were still intact. Inspector Ducar was also told that the pipes had been removed and were currently in the "bomb bucket" for transport to the Visalia Police Department range where they would be rendered safe.

11. Inspector Ducar entered the crime scene area and observed that most of the package the IED was mailed in was still intact.

12. Inspector Ducar observed ten one dollar "Wisdom" stamps in the upper right corner with a "\$0.00" meter-strip located below the stamps.

13. Inspector Ducar made note of the meter-strip number and the date, Sept 04, 2009.

14. Inspector Ducar noted the parcel bore a return address of "HP", 8000 Foothills Boulevard, Roseville, California 95747.

15. Inspector Ducar contacted Postal Inspector Dave Guerra and provided him with the meter-strip number. Inspector Guerra called him back a few minutes later and told him this meter number was assigned to a Postal Contract Station located inside the Bel Air Market at 4008 Foothills Boulevard, Roseville, California.

16. Inspector Ducar contacted Postal Inspector Robert Stevens in Sacramento, California and requested that an Inspector be sent to this location. Inspector Stevens told him that he would be sending Postal Inspector Patrick Mahoney to the Bel Air Market.

17. While on scene, Inspector Pina spoke to James Potts, Senior I.D. Technician for the Visalia Police Department and learned that he was primarily responsible for conducting the crime scene processing. He took crime scene photographs. He also took possession of the evidence. The evidence was then transferred to Inspector Moore. This included the four pipe bombs that had been rendered safe by the Visalia Police Department Bomb Squad. According to the Visalia Police Department Bomb Squad report and Bomb Squad Commander Steven Phillips, the pipe bombs consisted of an unknown type of black powder (similar to smokeless powder), .22 rounds and PVC. James Potts later provided Inspector Pina with a copy of the crime scene photographs taken earlier that day.

18. While on scene, Inspector Pina determined that the package was addressed to Aaron's Air and Heating, 120 North

Valley Oaks Drive, Visalia, CA 93292. Inspector Pina later found out that the name Dan Mustin was part of the addressee information affixed to the package. Inspector Pina also learned that the business name was actually Cal Air Cooling and Heating and that the business had recently relocated from 120 North Valley Oaks Drive, Visalia, California to the new address of 116 North Valley Oaks Drive, Visalia, California.

19. On September 8, 2009, Inspector Mahoney related the following regarding his follow-up investigation conducted at the Bel Air Market:

a. Based on the date of the meter-strip, the package could have been mailed on either September 3, 2009, or September 4, 2009, because the postal contract station changes the date on their meter after the letter carrier picks up his last collection there. Therefore, all mail collected by the Bel Air Market on September 3, 2009, after the last collection would be dated September 4, 2009.

b. There were a total of three packages that were mailed on September 3, 2009 or September 4, 2009 with a "\$0.00" meter strip.

c. He reviewed the video surveillance tape at the Bel Air Market in an attempt to identify the mailer of the package and obtained one of the three photographs.

20. On September 8, 2009, Inspector Mahoney e-mailed me the photograph he obtained. The photograph depicts a white female adult carrying a package. I compared the photograph of

the female carrying the package to the crime scene photographs of the package used to mail the IED. Based on my comparison, it appeared that the female in the surveillance photograph may have been carrying the package containing the IED.

21. On September 9, 2009, Inspectors Fiene and Pina interviewed Aaron Mustin. Inspector Pina also took Aaron Mustin's written statement. Aaron Mustin stated the following regarding the incident in question:

- a. He returned from a service call at about 11:20 a.m.
- b. He saw a postal package that was placed on the desk in the back office.
- c. He continued working on the caller id system for a few minutes.
- d. The package was addressed to Dan Mustin.
- e. The business had just moved three weeks ago from 120 North Valley Oaks Drive to 116 North Valley Oaks Drive.
- f. In the past, there was an advertisement for the business under the name of Aaron's Air Conditioning and that the name would also be found with a Google internet search.
- g. He went on to explain that the business name Aaron's Air Conditioning was used so it would be the first listing in the phone book under "Air Conditioning."
- h. The city of Visalia stopped Cal Air from using and advertising with this business name since it was not their officially registered business name.

i. He picked up the package and placed it in the other office chair in the northwest corner of the office, which is a computer work station normally used by his father, Dan Mustin.

j. With the back of the chair facing the computer, he opened the package.

k. At the time he opened the package, he was sitting in his office chair.

l. After he opened the outside box, he began removing bubble wrap.

m. He observed that the plastic tackle box inside the package was very well wrapped and could not shift during transportation.

n. The tackle box appeared to be new, clean and shiny.

o. He opened the tackle box while it was still inside the shipping box.

p. He saw four three quarter inch PVC pipes each about a foot long.

q. There appeared to be PVC end caps on the ends.

r. About the time he opened the tackle box; he also reached in and pulled on one of the pipes.

s. About that time, there was a bright light and a large single pop.

t. He pushed back in his chair away from the explosion.

u. He yelled pipe bomb.

v. He yelled again and the secretary, Leticia Valencia Arteaga, came in.

w. He told her to look at him because he was in a state of shock.

x. She told him that he looked ok and they both left the building.

y. He was driven to the hospital by Leticia Valencia Arteaga, who had called 911.

22. I later saw photos of the injuries caused by the explosion. Aaron Mustin appeared to have flash burns and cuts on his right arm, left hand, and face.

23. On September 10, 2009, Postal Inspectors Fiene and Pina went to the Vernon Station Post Office in Roseville, California to show the letter carriers a copy of the surveillance photograph of the person believed to have mailed the subject parcel. The copy of the photograph was shown to the letter carriers during a stand-up talk.

24. Approximately 30 minutes later, Inspector Pina received a telephone call from Union Steward Nicole Vincent of the Vernon Station Post Office. She said that one of the employees thought she knew the person in the photograph. Inspectors Fiene and Pina met with Nicole Vincent and Rural Carrier Shawna Amaro. Shawna Amaro said that the person in the photograph looked like a woman she met at a place where she boards her horse. Shawna Amaro did not know her name but said that the lady lived at 4042 Kenwood Way, Roseville, California. With Inspectors present, Nicole Vincent called the post office. She spoke to Letter Carrier Andrew Garber, who delivers mail to

4042 Kenwood Way, Roseville, California. She said that Andrew Garber told her that mail at that address is received for the last name of Coty. Inspector Fiene contacted me and requested that I check law enforcement databases to find out who resides at 4042 Kenwood Way, Roseville, California. The databases showed a Dorothy and Yvonne Coty at this residence. Inspector Fiene said the name "Yvonne" in front of Nicole Vincent and Shawna Amaro. When he said this name, Shawna Amaro said "that's the name."

25. On September 10, 2009, Inspectors Fiene and Pina interviewed Yvonne Coty at 4042 Kenwood Way, Roseville, California. Yvonne Coty also provided a sworn written statement. Prior to the interview, I learned that Yvonne Coty operates an online re-mailing service called "Snail Mail Remail Service." She told Inspectors the following:

a. She confirmed that she owns and operates the website "Snail Mail Remail Service."

b. This service is used by customers as a way to communicate through the U.S. Mail without the addressees learning where the mailer lives.

c. The customers using Snail Mail Remail Service prepare mail for the intended addressees as they would when mailing any other piece of mail.

d. The customers affix the appropriate amount of postage, address the letter or parcel, and then mail it to Snail Mail Remail Service at the 4042 Kenwood Way address in another envelope or parcel.

e. Upon receipt of the mail, she removes the outer mailing envelope or wrapper, and then takes the inner piece of mail to a postal facility or contract station for mailing.

f. The reason for going through this process is to give the sender a means to have a postmark printed on the mail other than the postmark of the sender's origin.

g. She charges two dollars for re-mailing each piece of mail.

h. The mailers are to enclose the money or money orders in the mailing to her.

i. The customers usually enclose a "print and send" form from the Snail Mail Remail Service website.

j. The form is used as an invoice.

k. She does not open any of the mail she re-mails.

l. She remembered mailing a parcel the previous week.

m. She remembered that the parcel was going to a U.S. destination; the return address was from "HP" in Roseville, California; there were two rows of stamps totaling approximately eight dollars; it was wrapped in brown paper; and she sent it using Priority Mail service, because there was enough postage on it to cover the cost of Priority Mail service.

n. This was the only parcel she has re-mailed in the past year.

o. There was also ten dollars in cash and a handwritten note on the "print and send" form that indicated five dollars was

for the re-mailing service and the remaining five dollars was a tip.

p. She probably threw away the outer wrapping with the handwritten note in last week's trash.

q. She received a few telephone calls prior to receiving the parcel.

r. One call was from a woman she said sounded frightened about getting contacted by her ex-husband who was getting out of jail.

s. The woman wanted to know how secure the Snail Mail Remail Service was in protecting identities of mailers.

t. She also received two phone calls from men also inquiring about the anonymity of the Snail Mail Remail Service and how the re-mail service worked.

u. She did not know if these calls were related to the parcel in question.

v. She had no knowledge of the contents of the mailing.

26. Yvonne Coty was shown copies of crime scene photographs of the packaging for the IED in question. She said the return address of HP, 8000 Foothills Blvd., Roseville, CA 95747-6588 looked like the return address on the package she mailed at the Bel Air Market recently. She did not remember if the addressee information, Aaron's Air and Heating, 120 N. Valley Oaks Dr., Visalia, CA 93292, was on the package she mailed but that the city looked familiar. She looked at the two rows of stamps and said that this looked like it could be the stamp

section of the package she sent. She identified herself in the surveillance photograph carrying a package and said it was her carrying the only package she had sent for a long time for the re-mail service.

27. On September 11, 2009 a search warrant was executed at the residence of Yvonne Coty at 4042 Kenwood Way, Roseville, California for evidence of violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1716, Mailing of Injurious Articles.

28. During the execution of the search warrant, Inspector Joe Bennett spoke to Layne Evans, boyfriend of Yvonne Coty. Inspector Bennett related the following:

a. He asked Layne Evans who hosts the Snail Mail Remail Service website.

b. Layne Evans told him that he (Evans) hosts the website on his web server which is in Texas.

c. He asked Layne Evans if he could provide the customer logs from the web server that he manages for the Snail Mail Remail Service website.

d. Layne Evans agreed to provide this information.

29. Inspector Bennett stated that the logs would provide Internet Protocol (IP) addresses for all customers that would have accessed the Snail Mail Remail Service website and the time and date that it was accessed.

30. Later in the day on September 11, 2009, Layne Evans contacted inspectors stating that he got the logs from the web server and that he put them on a compact disk. On September 14,

2009, the compact disk arrived in Los Angeles via the United States Mail. The information from the compact disk was provided to Inspector Brian Bone who was going to analyze it.

31. On September 18, 2009, Robert Moberley, Senior Forensic Chemist of the Forensic Laboratory Services provided preliminary list of components recovered from the improvised explosive device. The evidence had been previously submitted on September 9, 2009 to the United States Postal Service Forensic Laboratory by Inspectors Draper and Moore. The list included the following items:

- a. Approximately 15 inch by 12 inch by 10 inch single wall corrugated Ready Post mailing carton.
- b. Ten United States Postal Service one dollar Wisdom, Rockefeller Center, New York City, 2003 self-adhesive stamps.
- c. Contract Postal Unit United States Postage \$0.00 strip
- d. Mailing label with black printing on approximately 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ inch by 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch white paper product bearing: Dan Mustin, Aaron's Air & Heating, 120 N. Valley Oaks Dr., Visalia, CA 93292.
- e. Mailing label with black printing on what appears to be approximately 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ inch by 2 inch white (perforated) business card stock bearing the following information: HP, 8000 Foothills Blvd., Roseville, CA 95747-6588.
- f. Two inch nominal width clear colorless plastic packaging tape (ends bear serration indicative of a dispenser with cutter blade).

g. 1 7/8 inch wide Priority Mail white plastic packaging tape (Label 106A, May 2008).

h. Two inch nominal width foil tape (aluminum appearance foil with clear adhesive).

i. Plastic tool/tackle box approximately fourteen inch by eight inch by seven inch with a maroon colored top with light grey handle and light grey bottom with the remaining labeling inside the bottom of box of Model 6102, Plano Moldin.

j. One inch Genova brand flat-crown PVC end cap with approximately a 1/8 inch hole drilled through the crown.

k. 3/4 inch Genova brand flat crown end caps.

l. PVC plastic fragment exhibiting a right angle bend labeled "Spears 3/4."

m. 3/4 inch nominal internal diameter PVC pipe.

n. Cresline brand 3/4 inch internal diameter PVC pipe (pipe bore labeling "Cresline PVC SCH 40 - 480 PSI PR Water at 73°F PVC.")

o. .22 long rifle Federal brand lead bullet cartridges.

p. Pyrodex, a black powder substitute (identified in the loose powder in the garbage can and one of the RSP pipes).

q. Pre-perforated bubble wrap approximately 12 inch wide roll with approximately 1 inch diameter by 5/16 inch height circular pillows.

r. Pre-perforated bubble wrap approximately 12 inch wide roll with approximately 3/8 inch diameter by 3/16 inch height circular pillows.

s. Yellow colored rubber band fragments approximately 1/16 inch wide by 1/32 inch thickness by 4 5/8 inch long (reconstructed 1 1/2 inch circular diameter).

t. Putty colored rubber band fragments approximately 1/8 inch wide by 1/32 inch thickness by 6 1/2 inch long (reconstructed 2 inch circular diameter).

u. 1 inch (2 penny) by 1/16 inch diameter brown coated ring shank nail (e.g. paneling nail).

v. 1/2 inch long by 5/32 inch diameter round head bolt.

w. 3/16 inch wide white plastic wire tie (zip tie)

x. Brown twine.

y. White string.

z. Steel washer, approximately 11/16 inch outer diameter with a 5/16 inch diameter hole.

32. In addition to this list, there was a note at the bottom of the list from Bonnie Beal, Forensic Document Examiner. In the note, she said that during a search Inspectors need to look for all rubber stamps that have the same address as on the mailing labels; all changeable rubber stamps as the information can be changed in between uses; business card stock; and labels. She also provided a written report in which she recommends that Inspectors recover all hand stamps and accessories, inks, card stock, label stock, printers and known handwriting and submit it to the laboratory for comparison examinations.

33. On September 21, 2009, Yvonne Coty contacted Inspectors and said that she found the paper (print and send

form) that was sent with the package in question. She said she found it in her purse. On September 24, 2009, the form was delivered to the Los Angeles Division Inspectors. The form is a one page document with the heading "Remail - Letters.com." Below that are the words "Sacramento California." The top of the form states that it is an order form with the instructions to print and send with your letter and two dollars. The form appears to be a pre-populated form with sections to be filled out by the sender. Near the bottom of the form are instructions to mail this order form to "Yvonne - SMRS 4042 Kenwood Way Roseville, CA 95747." The contents of the form are handwritten and state that the item was a "package" to be remailed from "Sac" for the price of "\$5.00." The sender also indicated that they were including a "tip" bringing the total enclosed to ten dollars. At the bottom of the form is the website where the form was printed and the date it was printed: <http://www.remail-letters.com/order/sac-v.htm> and "7/12/2009."

34. On October 5, 2009, after analyzing the information on the compact disk provided by Layne Evans, Inspector Brian Bone provided a list of all the IP addresses that had accessed the Snail Mail Remail Service website. Inspector Bone narrowed his search to the IP addresses which attempted to access the uniform resource locator (url) <http://www.remail-letters.com/order/sac-v.htm> which is associated with the "print and send" form from the Snail Mail Remail Service website. Upon review of the list provided by Inspector Bone, two IP addresses accessed the "print

and send" form on July 12, 2009. One of the IP addresses was 64.149.42.152. Further analysis found that the IP address of 64.149.42.152 accessed pages associated with the Snail Mail Remail Service website on July 13, 2009, and July 19, 2009.

35. On October 6, 2009, a Grand Jury Subpoena was obtained for IP Address 64.149.42.152. On the same day, the subpoenaed records from AT&T Internet Services were received. Per the subpoenaed records, on July 12, 2009, IP Address 64.149.42.152 was assigned to the user name vernonmustin@sbcglobal.net. The records provided indicate that the customer named on the account is Betty Mustin with a service address of 19133 U.S. Highway 271, Leflore County, OK 74959. The master member id is vernonmustin with a domain of sbcglobal.net. There are two additional member ids for dalemustin and betty.mustin with a domain of sbcglobal.net.

36. On October 7, 2009, Inspector Fiene spoke to Letter Carrier Junnell Hall to determine who receives mail at the 19133 U.S. Highway 271, 74959. Inspector Fiene said that Junnell Hall told him that she delivers mail to Betty Mustin and VERNON MUSTIN at that address.

37. On October 7, 2009, Inspector Pina interviewed Dan Mustin, intended victim, via telephone. Dan Mustin stated that his brother, VERNON DALE MUSTIN, lives in Spiro, Oklahoma with their mother, Betty Lou Mustin. Dan Mustin said he has not seen his brother in three years. Dan Mustin said he does not talk much to VERNON MUSTIN because they went down different paths.

Dan Mustin said that VERNON MUSTIN is not overly ambitious and that they do not have a lot in common. However, he said there are no hard feelings between the two and that they are not on bad terms.

38. On October 12, 2009, federal agents executed a federal search warrant at 19133 U.S. Highway 271, Spiro, OK. Inspectors confirmed this is the residence of Betty Mustin and VERNON MUSTIN.

39. On October 14, 2009, Inspector Pina told me the following:

a. On October 14, 2009, while he was reviewing the evidence recovered at the residence, he noted that Inspector Albert Chapa recovered a note from the lower drawer of the night stand in what agents designated as Room E (RM E). The note stated: "If I get murdered Dan Mustin had it done. He hires thugs through George Mustin."

b. He had previously interviewed Betty Mustin and she identified RM E as belonging to VERNON MUSTIN.

40. On October 14, 2009, Inspector Bone told me the following:

a. An initial forensic review of a computer recovered during the execution of the search warrant at the residence of VERNON MUSTIN in Spiro, OK yielded several uniform resource locators (URL) pertaining to the public United States Postal Service (USPS) website, www.usps.com. On or about July 31, 2009, the computer was utilized to access the USPS online domestic


postage calculator. Based upon an analysis of URLs, it yielded data showing that a subject using this computer conducted a search for postage prices for a large package, weighing 6 pounds, to be sent from zip code 95747 to 93292. In addition, the subject added a package length of 15 inches, height of 12 inches, and width of 10 inches. It is noted that the sending zip code of 95747 is Roseville, CA and the destination zip code of 93292 is Visalia, CA. A subsequent review of information about the IED received from the USPSIS Forensic Lab showed that the IED package mailed to Dan Mustin had the approximate dimensions of 15 by 12 by 10.

b. Further forensic review found that on or about August 1, 2009, the same computer in question was again utilized to access the USPS online domestic postage calculator. At this time, the analysis of related URLs showed that a subject using this computer conducted a search for postage prices for a large package, weighing 6 pounds, to be sent from zip code 74959 to 95678. In addition, the subject added a package length of 15 inches, height of 11 inches, and width of 12 inches. It is noted that the sending zip code of 74959 is Spiro, OK and the destination zip code of 95678 is a Roseville, CA zip code.

41. According to Inspector Pina, Betty Mustin, VERNON MUSTIN's mother, was also interviewed at the time of the execution of the search warrant. Betty Mustin indicated that she does not use the computer.


42. Based on the foregoing and my training and experience, I believe there is probable cause to believe that violations of Title 18, United State Code, Section 1716, Mailing of Injurious Articles, and Title 18, United States Code, Section 924(c)(1), Possession and Use of a Destructive Device in Relation to a Crime of Violence, were committed by VERNON MUSTIN.

43. Because this is an ongoing investigation, it is requested that this affidavit be sealed until further order of the Court.
