

U.S. v. Michelle Webster Palm

COUNT 2 (False Statement)

On December 14, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, in a matter within the jurisdiction of the Securities and Exchange Commission, the defendant,

MICHELLE WEBSTER PALM,

did knowingly and willfully make a material false statement and representation to the Securities and Exchange Commission, an agency of the United States, all in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Section 1001(a)(2).

Forfeiture Allegations

Count 1 of this Information is hereby realleged and incorporated as if fully set forth herein by reference, for the purpose of alleging forfeitures pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 981(a)(1)(C), and Title 28, United States Code, Section 2461(c).

As the result of the offense alleged in Count 1 of this Information, the defendant shall forfeit to the United States pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 981(a)(1)(C), and Title 28, United States Code, Section 2461(c), any property, real or personal, which constitutes or is derived from proceeds traceable to the violations of Title 18, United States Code, Section 371.
