THE UNITED STATES GRAND JURY CHARGES THAT:

COUNT 1

(Production of Child Pornography)

On or about July 10, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

DOUGLAS LUKE ROBINETTE,

did employ, use, persuade, induce, entice, or coerce C.M.H., a minor, to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct, which visual depiction was produced using materials, including a T-mobile MyTouch 3G Slide cellular telephone and a Micro SD card, that had been mailed, shipped, and transported in interstate and foreign commerce, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2251(a) and 2251(e).

COUNT 2

(Production of Child Pornography)

On or about July 12, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

did employ, use, persuade, induce, entice, or coerce C.M.H., a minor, to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct, which visual depiction was produced using materials, including a T-mobile MyTouch 3G Slide cellular telephone and a Micro SD card, that had been mailed, shipped, and transported in interstate and foreign commerce, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2251(a) and 2251(e).

COUNT 3

(Production of Child Pornography)

On or about August 3, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

DOUGLAS LUKE ROBINETTE,

did employ, use, persuade, induce, entice, or coerce C.M.H., a minor, to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct, which visual depiction was produced using materials, including a T-mobile MyTouch 3G Slide cellular telephone and a Micro SD card, that had been mailed, shipped, and transported in interstate and foreign commerce, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2251(a) and 2251(e).

COUNT 4

(Production of Child Pornography)

On an unknown date to the Grand Jury, but between July 1, 2010, and August 30, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

DOUGLAS LUKE ROBINETTE,

did employ, use, persuade, induce, entice, or coerce C.M.H., a minor, to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing a visual depiction of such conduct,

specifically a video depicting defendant engaged in sexually explicit conduct with C.M.H., which visual depiction was produced using materials, including a T-mobile MyTouch 3G Slide cellular telephone and a Micro SD card, that had been mailed, shipped, and transported in interstate and foreign commerce, in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2251(a) and 2251(e).

COUNT 5

(Distribution of Child Pornography)

On or about July 12, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

DOUGLAS LUKE ROBINETTE,

did knowingly distribute visual depictions using a means and facility of interstate commerce that had been mailed, shipped and transported in and affecting interstate commerce, by any means including a computer, where the production of such visual depictions involved the use of a minor engaging in sexually explicit conduct and such depictions are of such conduct, including, but not limited to, the following computer image files:

- (1) IMAG0046-1.jpg;
- (2) IMAG0050-1.jpg;
- (3) IMAG0081-1.jpg; and
- (4) IMAG0085-1.jpg

all in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2252(a)(2) and 2252(b)(1).

COUNT 6

(Distribution of Child Pornography)

On or about July 18, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

did knowingly distribute visual depictions using a means and facility of interstate commerce that had been mailed, shipped and transported in and affecting interstate commerce, by any means including a computer, where the production of such visual depictions involved the use of a minor engaging in sexually explicit conduct and such depictions are of such conduct, including, but not limited to, the following computer image files:

(1) IMAG0066.jpg;

(2) IMAG0051.jpg;

(3) IMAG0073.jpg

all in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2252(a)(2) and 2252(b)(1).

COUNT 7

(Possession of Child Pornography)

On or about August 30, 2010, in the State and District of Minnesota, the defendant,

DOUGLAS LUKE ROBINETTE,

did knowingly possess one or more matters which contained visual depictions that had been mailed, shipped and transported in interstate and foreign commerce, and which were produced using materials which had been mailed, shipped or transported in interstate and foreign commerce, by any means, including by computer, where the production of such visual depictions involved the use of a minor engaging in sexually explicit conduct and

such visual depictions were of such conduct, including, but not limited to, the following computer image and video files:

- (1) IMG_1100.jpg;
- (2) IMG_1101.jpg;
- (3) IMG_1105.jpg;
- (4) IMG_1109.jpg;
- (5) IMG_1112.jpg; and
- (6) IMG_1118.jpg

all in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2252(a)(4)(B) and 2252(b)(2).

FORFEITURE ALLEGATIONS

Counts 1 through 7 of this Indictment are hereby realleged and incorporated as if fully set forth herein by reference, for the purpose of alleging forfeitures pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 2253(a).

As a result of the foregoing offenses, the defendant shall forfeit to the United States pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 2253(a):

(1) any visual depiction described in section 2251, 2251A, 2252, 2252A, 2252B, or 2260 of this chapter, or any book, magazine, periodical, film, videotape, or other matter which contains any such visual depiction, which was produced, transported, mailed, shipped or received in violation of Chapter 110, United States Code;

(2) any property, real or personal, constituting or traceable to gross profits or other proceeds obtained from such offense; and

(3) any property, real or personal, used or intended to be used to commit or to promote the commission of such offense or any property traceable to such property, including:

- a. T-mobile MyTouch 3G Slide, serial number HT06SPS06882;
- b. Micro SD card;
- c. Toshiba laptop computer, model number PSK0QU-00Q004, serial number 3A084003W.

If any of the above-described forfeitable property is unavailable for forfeiture, the United States intends to seek the forfeiture of substitute property as provided for in Title 21, United States Code, Section 853(p), as incorporated by Title 18, United States Code, Section 2253(b).

All in violation of Title 18, United States Code, Sections 2251(a), 2251(e), 2252(a)(4)(B), 2252(b)(2) and 2253(a).
