



ATTACHMENT A

did knowingly and intentionally conspire and agree with each other and with others to manufacture and possess with intent to manufacture 1 kilogram or more of heroin, a Schedule I narcotic drug controlled substance, contrary to Title 21, United States Code, Sections 841(a)(1) and (b)(1)(A), in violation of Title 21, United States Code, Section 846.

ATTACHMENT B

I, William Brinker, am a Special Agent with the Drug Enforcement Administration. I have knowledge of the facts set forth below from my involvement in the investigation, a review of reports, and discussions with other law enforcement personnel. Any statements attributed to individuals are described in substance and in part.

1. On or about January 22, 2011, law enforcement received information that several men were manufacturing controlled substances at 6120 Washington Street in West New York, New Jersey (the "Heroin Mill").

2. Law enforcement officers responded to the Heroin Mill and knocked on the door.

3. Defendant VALDEZ opened the door. Law enforcement officers could see through the open door materials that they believed to be a controlled substance and related manufacturing and packaging materials for controlled substances inside the Heroin Mill.

4. Law enforcement entered the Heroin Mill and discovered defendants ARIAS, DELORBE, GUERRA, and COLON inside. These defendants were placed under arrest, along with defendant VALDEZ.

5. Law enforcement subsequently obtained a search warrant to search the Heroin Mill. In the course of executing this warrant, law enforcement seized, among other items, over two kilograms of a substance that field-tested positive for heroin, four plants believed to be marijuana, and large quantities of material and equipment associated with manufacturing and packaging controlled substances for retail distribution.
