**FIRST GUILTY PLEA ENTERED IN SECOND PHASE OF
SOUTHWEST AIRLINES TICKET SCHEME INVESTIGATION**

John E. Murphy, Acting United States Attorney, announced that this morning in San Antonio, 36-year-old Tasha Mathis, pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to commit wire fraud in connection with the Southwest Airline ticket scheme investigation.

Appearing before United States Magistrate Judge Nancy Stein Nowak, Mathis admitted to participating in a ticket distribution scheme masterminded by former Southwest Airlines employee Althea Jackson and her husband, James Jackson. The Jacksons were sentenced to 30 months in federal prison on May 8, 2008, and ordered to pay approximately \$800,000 restitution.

Althea Jackson, while employed as an administrative assistant in the executive offices of Southwest Airlines, obtained approximately 5,600 "Green Passes" or Southwest Airlines Non Revenue Must Ride (NRMR) tickets from the ticketing department. These "Green Passes" were supposed to be used for the purpose of thanking Southwest passengers who assisted flight crews in the performance of their in-flight duties, including rendering aid to passengers who sustained injuries or became ill while onboard a Southwest Airlines flight. Rather than following established Airline protocol and mailing NRMR tickets along with a letter of appreciation to deserving passengers, Althea Jackson, fraudulently obtained these NRMR tickets and kept them for her own purposes.

In furtherance of the scheme, Jackson solicited Mathis and others to sell the NRMR tickets at prices ranging from \$120 - \$200 or more. Mathis admitted to obtaining 100 NRMR tickets from Althea Jackson and reselling them causing an actual loss to Southwest Airlines of \$20,000.

Mathis faces up to 20 years in prison and a \$250,000 fine.

Nine co-defendants remain under indictment charged with conspiracy to commit wire fraud. No trial date has been scheduled.

This case is being investigated by the United States Secret Service sponsored South Texas Regional Task Force and is being prosecuted for the government by Assistant United States Attorneys Bill Baumann, David Counts and Thomas Moore.
