Pennsauken Man Sentenced to 180 Months in Prison for String of Bank Robberies in New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Illinois

CAMDEN – A Pennsauken man was sentenced to 180 months in federal prison today for committing a string of seven bank robberies in southern New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Illinois, Acting U.S. Attorney Ralph J. Marra, Jr. announced.

U.S. District Judge Robert B. Kugler also ordered Keith Cummings, 34, to pay \$41,901 in restitution and to serve three years of supervised release upon the completion of his prison term. Cummings has been in custody since his arrest by Special Agents of the FBI and Investigators with the Camden County Prosecutor's Office on Sept. 8, 2008.

Cummings pleaded guilty before Judge Kugler on March 27, 2009, to a seven-count criminal Information that charged him with bank robbery. At his plea hearing, Cummings admitted that between July 31, 2008, and Sept. 5, 2008, he brandished a handgun, which turned out to be a pellet gun, to rob the following seven banks:

- July 31, 2008, Jim Thorpe National Bank, Jim Thorpe, Pa., of approximately \$2,316;
- Aug. 6, 2008, Jim Thorpe National Bank, Jim Thorpe, Pa., of approximately \$3,527;
- Aug. 11, 2008, Citadel Bank, Chadds Ford, Pa., of approximately \$7,100;
- Aug. 19, 2008, DNB Bank, Kennett Square, Pa., of approximately \$4,221;
- Aug. 23, 2008, Old Second Bank, Campton Hills, Ill., of approximately \$5,910;
- Sept. 2, 2008, Sun National Bank, Somerdale, N.J., of approximately \$4,900;
- Sept. 5, 2008, Bank of America, Turnersville, N.J., of approximately \$11,722.

In determining the actual sentence, Judge Kugler consulted the advisory U.S. Sentencing Guidelines, which provide appropriate sentencing ranges that take into account the severity and characteristics of the offense, the defendant's criminal history, if any, and other factors. The judge, however, is not bound by those guidelines in determining a sentence.

Parole has been abolished in the federal system. Defendants who are given custodial terms must serve nearly all that time.

Marra credited Special Agents of the FBI's South Jersey Resident Agency, under the direction of Special Agent in Charge Janice K. Fedarcyk in Philadelphia, and Investigators with the Camden County Prosecutor's Office, under the direction of Prosecutor Warren W. Faulk, with the investigation leading to the guilty plea.

The government is represented by Assistant United States Attorney Matthew Skahill of the U.S. Attorney's Office Criminal Division in Camden.
