The NIYPA used the concept of the Citizen's Police Academy, customizing the activities to Native American Youth. These activities provided youth with an opportunity to learn about law enforcement and public safety and to experience different facets of public safety through hands-on training and exercises, while maintaining culturally important elements, in a safe and comfortable environment for the youth.

Jointly sponsored by Italian law enforcement and DEA, IDEC's principal mission is to share drug-related intelligence, coordinate drug policies and develop joint operational strategies targeting the world's most prolific Drug Trafficking Organizations. Each IDEC conference has proven successful in institutionalizing cooperation and reinforcing the commitment to fight drug trafficking and narco-terrorism on an international level. DEA funded a portion of the conference (\$704,581), while the remaining conference costs were funded by the Government of Italy.

Attendees enhanced their skill sets by learning how to effectively identify emerging corporate fraud schemes employing accounting fraud; identify corporate fraud schemes related to executive self-dealing to include insider trading; identify emerging securities fraud schemes; locate sources of intelligence including subject matter experts at regulatory agencies; determine ways to support the advancement of investigations through advanced investigative techniques; recognize and address the challenges associated with conducting large scale corporate investigations; and determine which regulatory agencies or law enforcement partners would enhance a corporate and securities fraud investigation.

The joint conference is conducted cooperatively by two national non-profit organizations, the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators and the National Association of Crime Victim Compensation Boards, which serve as the umbrella membership organizations for state VOCA formula grantees. Because of significant membership overlap, these joint conferences maximize the value and cost-effectiveness for attendees and for DOJ. Each VOCA assistance and compensation grantee is required by special condition to send key grantee officials to attend this training conference. This event is the only VOCA-specific opportunity for state managers and staff to obtain essential, up-to-date information directly from OVC, Office of Justice Programs, and other federal staff, from subject matter experts in the victim services field, and by engaging in substantive discussions with their colleagues from other states.

The training included face-to-face contact from technical assistance providers to aid in strategic planning for addressing grant requirements, provided hands-on-skill and capacity-building, and served as a gathering place for national experts to reach grantees about emerging issues and best practices. Grantees followed one of four different tracks during the meeting to address a different minimum requirement from the previous Institute, gathering comprehensive mastery of each grant requirement through expert-level content and strategic planning help from the technical assistance providers.
