Proceeds from the sale were then used to pay the mortgage holders, other holders of debt secured by the property, and, in some cases, the defaulting homeowner (collectively, "beneficiaries").

### THE COMBINATION AND CONSPIRACY

- 2. Beginning as early as March 2009 and continuing until in or about October 2010, the defendant, LESLIE GEE, and co-conspirators entered into and engaged in a combination and conspiracy to suppress and restrain competition by rigging bids to obtain selected properties offered at public auctions in Contra Costa County in the Northern District of California, in unreasonable restraint of interstate trade and commerce, in violation of the Sherman Act, Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.
- 3. The charged combination and conspiracy consisted of a continuing agreement, understanding, and concert of action among the defendant and co-conspirators to suppress competition by agreeing to refrain from or stop bidding against each other to purchase selected properties at public auctions in Contra Costa County at non-competitive prices.
- 4. For the purpose of forming and carrying out the charged combination and conspiracy, the defendant and co-conspirators did those things that they combined and conspired to do, including, among other things:
- a. agreeing not to compete to purchase selected properties at public auctions in Contra Costa County;
- b. designating which conspirator would win the selected properties at the public auctions for the group of conspirators; and
- c. refraining from or stopping bidding for the selected properties at the public auctions.

5. Various entities and individuals, not made defendants in this Count, participated as conspirators in the offense charged and performed acts and made statements in furtherance thereof.

## TRADE AND COMMERCE

6. During the period covered by this Information, the business activities of the defendant and co-conspirators that are the subject of this Information were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce. For example, beneficiaries located in states other than California received proceeds from the public auctions that were subject to the bid-rigging conspiracy.

## JURISDICTION AND VENUE

7. The combination and conspiracy charged in this Information was carried out, in part, in the Northern District of California, within the five years preceding the filing of this Information.

COUNT TWO: 18 U.S.C. § 1349 – Conspiracy to Commit Mail Fraud (Contra Costa County)

#### THE CONSPIRACY

- 8. Beginning as early as March 2009 and continuing until in or about October 2010 in Contra Costa County in the Northern District of California, the defendant, LESLIE GEE, and co-conspirators did willfully and knowingly combine, conspire, and agree with each other to violate Title 18, United States Code, Section 1341, namely, to knowingly devise and intend to devise and participate in a scheme and artifice to defraud beneficiaries, and to obtain money and property from beneficiaries by means of materially false and fraudulent pretenses, representations, and promises.
- 9. The objects of the conspiracy were to fraudulently acquire title to selected properties sold at public auctions in Contra Costa County, to make and receive payoffs, and to divert money to conspirators that would have gone to the beneficiaries.
  - 10. Various entities and individuals, not made defendants in this Count, participated

as co-conspirators in the offense charged and performed acts and made statements in furtherance thereof.

- 11. For the purpose of forming and carrying out the charged conspiracy, the defendant and co-conspirators did those things that they conspired to do, including, among other things:
