





# Explorer vs. Navigator

Boom! Pow! The heavyweights square off.

There hasn't been a battle like this for years. It may look like Microsoft and Netscape are just fighting over browsers, but the winner decides how we'll use our computers now and into the future. That's good news no matter which company's browser you prefer. The heated competition means the next beta arrives with even more features before you finish installing the

last version. In its latest incarnation, Internet Explorer 3.0 rivals Navigator for features and adds unique touches of its own.

Meanwhile, Navigator 3.0 is richer than ever and still boasts dominant market share. Which browser is better for you? That depends on how you use the Web. Our Internet and usability experts inspected both browsers in several key areas—e-mail, finding information, bookmarking your favorite Web sites, downloading files, and customization—to help you decide which one better suits your browsing style.



**Usability Report Card** 

Dead Heat



Browsers do a lot more than change Web channels. Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0 and Netscape Navigator 3.0 include dozens of Internet tools and, for the most part, are evenly matched. In evaluating late betas of these browsers, we concentrated on the five core tasks. While both browsers passed in all areas, each had certain strengths. Navigator narrowly edged out Explorer in three of them—e-mail, finding information, and downloading files—while Explorer won by a hair in bookmarking and customization. However, when the scores were tallied Navigator and Explorer tied for first, with a few caveats. For one, Navigator costs \$49 and Explorer is free. On the other hand, Navigator supports a wider range of open technologies and comes in many different cross-platform flavors.

#### E-Mail

Winner: Netscape Navigator 3.0

**Digital Postcards:** Both Explorer and Navigator have powerful e-mail clients, though Navigator's setup uses a bit too much technical jargon compared with Explorer's easy-to-follow wizard. However, attaching files and sorting messages (by date, subject, and so on) while reading mail are a breeze with Navigator.

# **Finding Information**

Winner: Netscape Navigator 3.0

Needle in a Haystack: Navigator offers several choices for entering Web addresses, and unlike Explorer it features a handy Open Location option, which you can quickly activate with the Ctrl-L command. Both browsers include toolbar-based Search buttons that link to most major search engines.

# Bookmarking

Winner: Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0

Saving Your Place: Keeping track of the Web's good stuff is easier than ever. Navigator's Bookmark feature is much improved from previous versions. It can even automatically check for changes in bookmarked sites. But Explorer's Favorites feature wins by letting you create folders and manage URLs on the fly.

# **Downloading Files**

Winner: Netscape Navigator 3.0

Online Loot: Navigator's file-download feature is fast and convenient, with a single dialog box asking where you want the file stored. Downloading with Explorer annoyed testers because it waits until after you've completed the download to ask where to store the file and what to name it.

### Customization

Winner: Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0

Have It Your Way: Browsers should work the way you do. Changing the default home page is a snap with both browsers. But Explorer simplifies finding and modifying cache settings to suit your style. And the tabbed Options box makes it easier to set and save the browser's other settings in one fell swoop.

# Not Just **Browsing**

No matter how we sliced the results of our rigorous usability testing, we were forced to declare a draw. For different reasons, both Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0 and Netscape Navigator 3.0 are perfect choices.

For now, Navigator still enjoys an overwhelming mind-share lead over upstart Explorer, due mostly to marketing momentum and recent technology leadership. But things are changing: Explorer 3.0 now nearly matches Navigator's arsenal of features and it adds a few extras of its own. For example, Microsoft's ActiveX component technologypromises to provide a new way to deliver animation, 3-D virtual reality, video, and other multimedia content to the Web.

Today's browsers have to handle more than just the Web, however. Both Explorer and Navigator contain entire suites of Internet tools, from e-mail handlers to teleconferencing utilities. Although Explorer's NetMeeting and Navigator's CoolTalk weren't ready in time for our testing, they will let you communicate, collaborate, and conference over a TCP/IP connection. Each product makes voice and data communication over the Net as simple as a phone call--a situation that could radically change the way you work and live. Navigator, like Explorer, also supports a wide range of cutting-edge online technologies including Java, VRML, and multimedia. And through hundreds of third-party plug-ins like Progressive Networks' RealAudio Player and Starfish Software's EarthTime, both browsers can be expanded to take advantage of an even wider range of technologies.

Despite their similarities, these browsers aren't interchangeable. If your primary interests lie in e-mail, finding information, and downloading files, Netscape Navigator gets the usability nod. And if you need browsers for platforms other than Windows 95 or NT (such as Macintosh, Windows 3.1, or Unix), Navigator is the only real choice. However, if you're looking for easier bookmark management or enjoy customizing and configuring your browser, choose Microsoft Internet Explorer. Explorer has come a long way in a short time, and it poses a serious challenge to Navigator's dominance. Better still, it's free vs. Navigator's \$49 fee.

#### Internet Explorer

OK, so there isn't much out there for Internet Explorer 2.0. Internet Explorer 3.0's plug-in and ActiveX control support (below) will change the situation. With the plug-in support, almost all Navigator plug-ins will work under Internet Explorer. But ActiveX controls will add even more features. Video, audio, animation, interactivity: You name it and ActiveX will do it Many companies, including Adobe and Macromedia, are working on ActiveX versions of their Navigator plug-ins. Best of all, ActiveX controls can automatically download and install themselves in Internet Explorer 3.0.

#### **Netscape Navigator**

- Duplexx Net Toob: Net Toob handles all types of digital video--AVI, FLI, MPEG, QuickTime, and more--without a hitch.
- Inso Quick View Plus: View more than 200 file types, from word processing documents to spreadsheets to graphics files.
- Macromedia Shockwave: "Shocked" pages can take a while to download, but Shockwave's sound and animation add excitement to the Web.
- Progressive Networks RealAudio: The sound's a little tinny. but you'll still like listening to a live broadcast on your PC.
- VDONet VDO Live: VDO Live's real-time video points enticingly toward the Web's future.

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


# Microsoft Internet Explorer 3.0, Netscape Navigator 3.0

The Browser Battle Rages On: Isn't competition great? With giants Netscape and Microsoft openly battling to build the best Web browser, the rest of us only stand to come out ahead. In the latest round of the contest, both companies have produced even better versions of the two most popular and most powerful browsers available: Netscape's Navigator 3.0 and Microsoft's Internet Explorer 3.0.

On paper, the packages are much alike. Both include extensive support for many of the same new Internet technologies, controls, and plug-ins. Take a closer look, however, and you'll see many differences. Microsoft's efforts will present a serious challenge to Netscape in the future. For now, however, the top browser is still Netscape's -- barely.

**Refined and Reliable** Netscape had something to prove about reliability given the numerous peccadilloes of Navigator 2.x. But our early tests of a prerelease version of Navigator 3.0 make it clear that the company succeeded in hammering out the bugs.

Navigator 3.0 runs fast and true. Have you had trouble with Navigator's cache? Netscape's new LiveCache system makes better use of RAM to support CD-ROM content. It also progressively caches partially loaded content, making it easier for you to pick up where you left off.

Although Navigator 3.0 represents a major upgrade, it's really an enhancement of the already great version 2.0. The big news is its support for new Web file formats and technologies, plus one or two significant add-on modules. There's built-in support for streaming audio, streaming video (both AVI and

QuickTime), and 3-D VRML, plus security password certificates. We've tested them all, and they work as advertised. The VRML support is particularly impressive.

Cool Talkin' CoolTalk is probably the single most visible addition to Navigator 3.0. It's a separate Internet telephone program, similar to VocalTec's Internet Phone, that lets you converse with another person either point-to-point or via a Netscape host-server connection. In addition to two-way audio communication, CoolTalk provides competent software and data-sharing (whiteboarding) tools, as well as a text-chat feature.

There are two significant advances in Navigator 3.0 that won't be readily apparent to most users, but they could improve the Internet experience. For example, Netscape reworked its Java and JavaScript support for greater reliability and wider compatibility. Even better, the company added an object-integration framework, called LiveConnect, that allows live objects such as Java applets, JavaScripts, and plug-ins to interact and synchronize with one another.

Navigator 3.0 also includes minor but welcome interface tweaks, such as completely reworked context menus in Bookmarks. There's also a nifty little icon next to the Location (URL) field that you can drag off to the desktop, a folder, or the Bookmarks window to create an instant URL shortcut icon of the current Web page. You can also (finally) customize the windowpane arrangements of the Mail and News programs.

Webmasters and Net surfers alike will appreciate improvements to Frame navigation, including support for the Back button within a frame. There are also new HTML tags like background colors for tables, and new attributes for embedding audio and video.

Serious Challenger Meanwhile, Microsoft's Internet Explorer (or MSIE, as it's known on the Net) is also extremely ambitious. Version 3.0 might just as well have been called version 4.0. That's no accident: Netscape has a significant lead in the browser world, with 75 percent market share, and Microsoft is the only company with any real chance of competing. To get ahead, Internet Explorer 3.0 has to match or beat Navigator 3.0 feature for feature, and in many ways it does.

Internet Explorer 3.0 looks dramatically different from previous versions. Microsoft paid close attention to the interface, giving it a drag-and-drop-configurable toolbar with buttons that light up as the pointer hovers over them. These enhancements add up to an extremely usable application — and usability is where Microsoft's browser skips ahead of Navigator.

Top Performer Internet Explorer 3.0 brings a raft of features that improve performance, including better support for multiple connections and background downloads. In a simple side-by-side comparison of the prerelease versions of the two browsers, Internet Explorer 3.0 had a slight performance edge when opening uncached Web pages. Another surprising new touch is a pair of excellent bundled add-in programs: Internet News (a newsgroup reader) and Internet Mail (an e-mail utility). Both are first-rate apps that we prefer by a small margin to their Netscape counterparts.

Microsoft also added Navigator 2.0-compatible frames that support the use of the Back button within frame pages. New attributes deliver customizable frame borders, including invisible borders and floating frames, letting users improve their Web-page designs without facing performance penalties.

Early Look Many of the major features that Microsoft announced for Internet Explorer 3.0, such as support for Java and third-party plug-ins, weren't operational in the prerelease version we tested but will be included in the final release. Existing Navigator plug-ins will work with Internet Explorer 3.0, and Microsoft is working on a setup routine that will detect and automatically configure plug-ins already

installed on your PC. That's a trick Netscape should copy. Internet Explorer also includes an Internet phone that lets users share applications over the Net, and a shared whiteboard conferencing tool that supports multiple-point (more than two-person) conferencing. These two features could help Microsoft leapfrog Netscape.

Another big feature of Internet Explorer 3.0, ActiveX, was in the prerelease version -- but few pages on the Web have yet to take advantage of this technology. Built-in ActiveX controls let browsers view charts, timed events, automatic event-launchers, and 3-D animation. ActiveX components will work in concert with Java applications. In theory ActiveX is a boon, but we'll reserve final judgment until we've seen it fully applied.

Close Choice Until now Netscape's Navigator has dominated the browser market. With version 3.0 of Internet Explorer, however, Microsoft poses a serious threat to Netscape's lead. Microsoft may even beat Netscape at its own game: Internet Explorer 3.0 costs nothing, while Navigator, after years of being free, now costs \$49 per copy. Ultimately, however, the battle of the browsers will be decided by content. If either LiveConnect or ActiveX builds serious support, people will want to use the browser that best supports the prevailing standard. But for now, the lead is still Netscape's.

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
