How does the release of Visual J-- 6/0 affect Java developers

From the comments of the various discussion groups, the release of J--6.0 would seem to be another sign of Microsoft's ambivalence towards Java: it's as if they can't decide whether to kill it or embrace it (some might say this is not mutually exclusive for MS). It also seems to show distinct ambivalence towards the developer community.

First, they announced they were "fully supporting" Java, but then they failed to support JDK 1.1, JFC and RMI. Second, they used to promote AFC, but now they're promoting WFC. I feel sorry for all those loyal MS developers who are trying to make a decision on which technology to use.

In Europe we have to contend with a greater installed base of multiple OS - especially in large organisations - and there is much greater interest in Java for its cross-platform portability (see survey at <http://www.cc.gatech.edu/gvu/>). Admittedly we're now at the stage where it's "write once, debug everywhere". However, that's still far more productive than "write once, re-write everywhere" for the C++ and VB/VJ-- developers.

By breaking away from pure Java, there is a perception that MS is seeking to cloud the issue; throwing up new whiz-bang technologies which have little practical use in 90% of applications. On the positive side they are at least catching up with the rest of the market by including some features already seen in the leading tools.

One thing seems clear to me - the sooner Sun get Java adopted by the

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OSI committee, the better it will be for those that want to keep the terrific concept of Java on track. For the millions of developers who are developing real-world Java applications already, you just have to hope that MS doesn't trip it up in the meantime.
