Microsoft Meeting - August 9, 1995

On Mednesday, Angust 9, I met with Josephin Rempin and Mark Baber of Microsoft regarding the status of the PC Company Windows 95 contract. The susmary of the meeting is as follows:

Microsoft Open Items

- 1. 12 D Immunity
- 2. Recovery Disk Program
- 3. Reporting and Payment Prognency
- 4. OFK Tool (preload tool)
- 5. End User License Agreems
- 6. LAW Manager, Win 3.2 and/06/2 Audits

Resolved Issues

1. 12 D Immity:

I told Microsoft that this would be the final issue closed. Once other items were agreed to, IM would agree to current working of this provision.

2. Recovery Disk:

Agreed to current wonding per David Walsh.

1. Reporting & Payment Frequency:

Agreed to change the designation of royalty to a per system default. Our process to manage the current per copy default is cumbersome, and it seems to be causing most of the Windows 3.X discrepancies.

He are the only OM using the par copy default.

Microsoft agreed to allow a period (through year-end 1995) to resolve our administrative issues on payments. In the interim, IBM will make estimated monthly payments including an overpayment. Overpayment will be carried forward by Microsoft monthly and applied to the next month's outstanding royalty.

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4. OPE Tool:

Agreed to current working given we could use knowledge gained from using the tool and can be transferred to the loading of other son-Microsoft software.

5. End User License Agreement:

Agreed to include Microsoft T's & C's in our agreement.

6. Audite:

Microsoft is concurred on the potential magnitude of TBR's underpayment. Joschim suggested they may want to go back to 1987 and audit all years.

Microsoft estimates \$50-\$100M in underpayments based upon past experience with IBM. Example quoted: in the fourth quarter, IBM is quoted in the press as selling \$00K to IM OS/2 Warp licenses; Microsoft was only paid for 35K.

We believe that these estimates are overstated. ISM estimates are being worked.

Josephia offered to accept a single payment and close all outstanding sudits.

Joachim also suggested this payment may be reduced through an offer of good faith from IRM...something be could show Cates.

He suggested IBN not bundle Lotus SeartSuite on our systems for a minimum of six months to one year. He is concerned on the impact to Microsoft profit from Office if they begin offering to OEM's as a preload. They view the "threat of bundling" as a "core issue" in the relationship. I told him that this was not an option.

I suggested a broadening of the role of the Kirkland Porting Center to include MT on Intel. This is intended to provide world-class customer support for those customers who have made an MT client decision. I told him that this would have to be reviewed with Rick Thoman.

Open Items

- 1. Resolution of Overpayment Methodology
- 2. Proposed Audit Flat Payment
- 3. Good Paith Offer Expanded HT Support
- Gerstner Meeting with Gates on strategic issues for the industry, proceeded by sessions with J. H. Thompson, H. M. Donofrio and G. R. Thomas.

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While these issues are being worked, Microsoft will work on completing the final version of the Win 95 contracts with plans to close the issues by the end of the teak.

Other Issues

While the meeting with Joschim and Mark Saher was cordial, the overall relationship is rocky and needs to improve.

We discussed the role of Jim Miller - suggested that he he removed from his current role with Microsoft.

Haber said the reason the Win 95 contract was being tied to audits was that Jim Miller suggested if the audits could not be resolved, IEM would be unwilling to sign the Win 95 agreement.

SUMMALTY

IBM's management of the OS/2 contract and subsequent audit has raised the tension between our companies.

Joachim wants to close contractual issues on Win 95 before August 24.

Top level meetings which lead to a Gerstner meeting with Gates will go a long way to repairing the relationship.
