They're entirely within their right to do this, and you are correct in that what they want most is new users. Nothing else really matters.

It's interesting how this influences our strategy. We need to develop some real business benefits behind IE. Things that go straight to the bottom line like cheaper distribution, lower support costs, easier recruitment, etc. Only when we can prove that IE is the best choice, on it's own merits, will we really get this under control. Today, we can arrange things (through co-marketing, etc.) so that IE4 is the best choice for a particular program or promotion or for most new users. But without that relationship support from us, water seeks its own level. Which is parity. We've really got a commodity product on our hands here.
