

CRIMINAL INFORMATION

The United States Attorney charges:

1. **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR.** as a defendant on the charges stated below.

At the times relevant to this Information:

BACKGROUND

- MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8, engaged in the sale of sports equipment to schools throughout the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere.
- 3. **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR.** knew that public schools in Mississippi require bids from two separate companies for procurements over \$5,000.00.
- 4. Schools generally procured sports equipment through the process of requesting and obtaining bids from multiple companies and would typically award a contract for sports equipment to the company that submitted the lowest bid.
- 5. The conspiracies charged below in Counts 1–5 affected at least \$4,557,402.14 of sales to COMPANY-8 from at least 579 procurements, to at least 50 schools. **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR.** received commission payments from his employer, COMPANY-8, based on his sales.

CO-CONSPIRATORS

- 6. COMPANY-1, a company organized under the laws of Louisiana, with its principal place of business in Louisiana, was a distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 7. COMPANY-2, a company organized under the laws of Delaware, with its principal place of business in Illinois, was a manufacturer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 8. COMPANY-3, a company organized under the laws of Tennessee, with its principal place of business in Tennessee, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 9. COMPANY-4, a company organized under the laws of Mississippi, with its principal place of business in Mississippi, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 10. COMPANY-5, a company organized under the laws of Mississippi, with its principal place of business in Mississippi, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 11. COMPANY-6, a company organized under the laws of Mississippi, with its principal place of business in Mississippi, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
- 12. COMPANY-7, a company organized under the laws of Florida, with its principal place of business in Florida, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Alabama.

- 13. COMPANY-8, a company organized under the laws of Mississippi, with its principal place of business in Mississippi, was a retailer and distributor of sports equipment engaged in selling sports equipment in Mississippi.
 - 14. Bradley David Willcutt was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
 - 15. Charles Ferrell Trimm was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-2.
 - 16. CO-CONSPIRATOR-1 was the owner of COMPANY-1.
- 17. CO-CONSPIRATOR-2 was employed as a part of the administrative support staff by COMPANY-8.
 - 18. CO-CONSPIRATOR-3 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
- 19. CO-CONSPIRATOR-4 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8, and then later was a part-owner of COMPANY-8.
- 20. CO-CONSPIRATOR-5 was employed as a part of the administrative support staff by COMPANY-8.
- 21. CO-CONSPIRATOR-6 was employed as a part of the administrative support staff by COMPANY-8.
 - 22. CO-CONSPIRATOR-7 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
 - 23. CO-CONSPIRATOR-8 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
 - 24. CO-CONSPIRATOR-9 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
 - 25. CO-CONSPIRATOR-10 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-8.
 - 26. CO-CONSPIRATOR-11 was a part-owner of COMPANY-3.
- 27. CO-CONSPIRATOR-12 was employed as a purchasing manager by COMPANY-3.
 - 28. CO-CONSPIRATOR-13 was employed as a financial manager by COMPANY-3.
 - 29. CO-CONSPIRATOR-14 was a part-owner of COMPANY-3.

- 30. CO-CONSPIRATOR-15 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-4.
- 31. CO-CONSPIRATOR-16 was employed as a sales professional by COMPANY-5.

DESCRIPTION OF THE OFFENSES

COUNT 1 (15 U.S.C. § 1)

- 32. Paragraphs 1 through 31 are realleged and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 33. The relevant period for Count 1 is that period from at least as early as July 2013 through at least as late as July 2023 ("Count 1 relevant period").
- 34. During the Count 1 relevant period, in the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. knowingly entered into and engaged in a conspiracy with COMPANY-1, Bradley David Willcutt, CO-CONSPIRATOR-1, CO-CONSPIRATOR-2, CO-CONSPIRATOR-3, CO-CONSPIRATOR-4, CO-CONSPIRATOR-5, and other co-conspirators to suppress and eliminate competition by rigging bids to obtain procurements for sports equipment and related services for schools in Mississippi, in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1. The conspiracy engaged in by the defendant and co-conspirators was a *per se* unlawful, and thus unreasonable, restraint of interstate trade and commerce in violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1.
- 35. In furtherance of the conspiracy, **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING**, **JR.** and co-conspirators did, among other things, the following:
 - a. agreed in advance of the bids which co-conspirator would win the bid;
 - agreed to provide and submit complementary bids (that is, intentionally higher-priced bids) to schools;
 - c. submitted complementary bids to schools on behalf of COMPANY-8;

- d. received procurements on behalf of COMPANY-8 for school sports equipment and related services where complementary bids were submitted.
- 36. During the Count 1 relevant period, the business activities of MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. and his co-conspirators that are the subject of the conspiracy charged in Count 1 were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce.

All in violation of Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.

COUNT 2 (15 U.S.C. § 1)

- 37. Paragraphs 1 through 31 are realleged and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 38. The relevant period for Count 2 is that period from at least as early as May 2021 through at least as late as May 2023 ("Count 2 relevant period").
- 39. During the Count 2 relevant period, in the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. knowingly entered into and engaged in a conspiracy with COMPANY-2, Charles Ferrell Trimm, Bradley David Willcutt, CO-CONSPIRATOR-3, CO-CONSPIRATOR-5, and other co-conspirators to suppress and eliminate competition by rigging bids to obtain procurements for sports equipment and related services for schools in Mississippi, in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1. The conspiracy engaged in by the defendant and co-conspirators was a *per se* unlawful, and thus unreasonable, restraint of interstate trade and commerce in violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1.
- 40. In furtherance of the conspiracy, **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING**, **JR.** and co-conspirators did, among other things, the following:
 - a. agreed in advance of the bids which co-conspirator would win the bid;

- agreed to provide and submit complementary bids (that is, intentionally b. higher-priced bids) to schools;
- submitted complementary bids to schools on behalf of COMPANY-8; c.
- d. received procurements on behalf of COMPANY-8 for school sports equipment and related services where complementary bids were submitted.
- During the Count 2 relevant period, the business activities of MAURICE 41. **DANIEL BOWERING, JR.** and his co-conspirators that are the subject of the conspiracy charged in Count 2 were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce.

All in violation of Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.

COUNT 3 (15 U.S.C. § 1)

- 42. Paragraphs 1 through 31 are realleged and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 43. The relevant period for Count 3 is that period from at least as early as February 2014 through at least as late as August 2020 ("Count 3 relevant period").
- 44. During the Count 3 relevant period, in the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. knowingly entered into and engaged in a conspiracy with COMPANY-3, Bradley David Willcutt, CO-CONSPIRATOR-2, CO-CONSPIRATOR-3, CO-CONSPIRATOR-4, CO-CONSPIRATOR-6, CO-CONSPIRATOR-7, CO-CONSPIRATOR-11, CO-CONSPIRATOR-12, CO-CONSPIRATOR-13, CO-CONSPIRATOR-14, and other co-conspirators to suppress and eliminate competition by rigging bids to obtain procurements for sports equipment and related services for schools in Mississippi, in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1. The conspiracy engaged in by the

defendant and co-conspirators was a per se unlawful, and thus unreasonable, restraint of interstate trade and commerce in violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1.

- 45. In furtherance of the conspiracy, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. and co-conspirators did, among other things, the following:
 - a. agreed in advance of the bids which co-conspirator would win the bid;
 - b. agreed to provide and submit complementary bids to schools;
 - submitted complementary bids to schools on behalf of COMPANY-8; c.
 - d. received procurements on behalf of COMPANY-8 for school sports equipment and related services where complementary bids were submitted.
- 46. During the Count 3 relevant period, the business activities of MAURICE **DANIEL BOWERING, JR.** and his co-conspirators that are the subject of the conspiracy charged in Count 3 were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce.

All in violation of Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.

COUNT 4 (15 U.S.C. § 1)

- 47. Paragraphs 1 through 31 are realleged and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 48. The relevant period for Count 4 is that period from at least as early as July 2010 through at least as late as July 2023 ("Count 4 relevant period").
- 49. During the Count 4 relevant period, in the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. knowingly entered into and engaged in a conspiracy with COMPANY-4, Bradley David Willcutt, CO-CONSPIRATOR-2, CO-CONSPIRATOR-3, CO-CONSPIRATOR-4, CO-CONSPIRATOR-8, CO-CONSPIRATOR-15,

and other co-conspirators to suppress and eliminate competition by rigging bids to obtain procurements for sports equipment and related services for schools in Mississippi, in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1. The conspiracy engaged in by the defendant and co-conspirators was a *per se* unlawful, and thus unreasonable, restraint of interstate trade and commerce in violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1.

- 50. In furtherance of the conspiracy, **MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING**, **JR.** and co-conspirators did, among other things, the following:
 - a. agreed in advance of the bids which co-conspirator would win the bid;
 - b. agreed to provide and submit complementary bids to schools;
 - c. submitted complementary bids to schools on behalf of COMPANY-8;
 - d. received procurements on behalf of COMPANY-8 for school sports equipment and related services where complementary bids were submitted.
- 51. During the Count 4 relevant period, the business activities of MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. and his co-conspirators that are the subject of the conspiracy charged in Count 4 were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce.

All in violation of Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.

COUNT 5 (15 U.S.C. § 1)

- 52. Paragraphs 1 through 31 are realleged and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein.
- 53. The relevant period for Count 5 is that period from at least as early as August 2012 through at least as late as September 2022 ("Count 5 relevant period").

- 54. During the Count 5 relevant period, in the Southern District of Mississippi and elsewhere, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. knowingly entered into and engaged in a conspiracy with COMPANY-5, CO-CONSPIRATOR-3, CO-CONSPIRATOR-5, CO-CONSPIRATOR-6, CO-CONSPIRATOR-9, CO-CONSPIRATOR-10, CO-CONSPIRATOR-16, and other co-conspirators to suppress and eliminate competition by rigging bids to obtain procurements for sports equipment and related services for schools in Mississippi, in violation of the Sherman Antitrust Act, 15 U.S.C. § 1. The conspiracy engaged in by the defendant and co-conspirators was a *per se* unlawful, and thus unreasonable, restraint of interstate trade and commerce in violation of 15 U.S.C. § 1.
- 55. In furtherance of the conspiracy, MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. and co-conspirators did, among other things, the following:
 - a. agreed in advance of the bids which co-conspirator would win the bid;
 - b. agreed to provide and submit complementary bids to schools;
 - c. submitted complementary bids to schools on behalf of COMPANY-8;
 - d. received procurements on behalf of COMPANY-8 for school sports equipment and related services where complementary bids were submitted.

56. During the Count 5 relevant period, the business activities of MAURICE DANIEL BOWERING, JR. and his co-conspirators that are the subject of the conspiracy charged in Count 5 were within the flow of, and substantially affected, interstate trade and commerce.

All in violation of Title 15, United States Code, Section 1.

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
