by these defendants the written memoranda which have been signed by him, in addition to the testimony of this witness before the federal grand jury in Jackson, Mississippi, and in the alternative that which is not pertinent or relevant to this case for the Court to inspect encamer for the Court to determine the relevancy and pertinent for the benefit of these defendants.

9 BY MR. HAUBERG:

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May it please the Court as to the grand jury minutes we stand in the position that we have stood all along, that he is not entitled to the grand jury minutes and we do object to that. We do have for their use and inspection for the purpose of cross examination under the Jancks Act various reports and statements given by this witness to the F. B. I. about matters involving this case. There are certain things that have been deleted because we contend they are not material to this case, and we have these ready for their inspection.
