and there is no identification of any Black Panther or anything of the sort on the photograph, is prejudicial. We would further urge the Court that the description of the photograph showing the witness Allen Hall and Benjamin Chavis was prejudicial to the jury because this is totally irrelevant to an alleged conspiracy charge, a burning charge, on February 5 and 6. It was done for no other purpose we contend than to inflame and prejudice the minds of the jury, and we would argue to the Court that the impression upon the jury's mind as a result of having heard the witness describe everything that was in the photograph is so prejudicial as to be impossible to erase from the minds of the jury, and the only possible cure at this point would be a mistrial. We would further at this time move for a mistrial based upon all previous errors committed during the trial including the jury selection procedures and presenting of evidence. THE COURT: Do you wish to be heard? SOL. STROUD: No, sit.

MR. HUNEVOL: I'd like to concur in that motion on behalf of Mrs. Shepard and state that I

cannot see how the prejudicial value of the introduction or attempted introduction before the djury could be outweighed by the probative value of something that happened 5 or 6 days after my client was purportedly charged with being an accessory before the fact of the burning of Mike's.
