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What, if anything, occurred as you go ahead and testify, as you were coming across there onto the corner of 6th and Ann and before I interrupted you.

Officer Shaw got up on the porch of this house here, and Officer Williams went back here somewhere and I lost sight of him. Officer Wollak, I believe he stayed right over here on this corner for a while and then later on he crossed over the street also. Officer Shaw though was going down from porch to porch here. And when he got on the porch of this house here I heard a gunshot, what sounded like a gunshot, and then moments later I observed Officer Williams and Shaw dragging a subject up the sidewalk here around to this side and lay him down on the sidewalk here. Just moments later a patrol car came and this subject was removed from the sidewalk.

MR. FERGUSON: Move to strike.

They turned, and as they turned tan, ran back, they had something long - appeared to be firearms in their hands hanging down by their side, when they crouched down and ran back - holding beside of them.

MR. HUNEVOL: Move to strike. THE COURT: Motion denied. (Explanding 10-)

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SOL. STBOUD: The State has not further questions of this witness, your Honor. Tender him for cross examination.

MR. BECTON: If it please the Court, we move to strike Mr. Chipps's entire testimony. THE COURT: Motion to strike denied.

> Shephard is concerned, your Honor. THE COURT: Members of the jury, I have previously instructed you the testimony as to the defendant Ben Chavis is to be considered by you only as to the defendant Ben Chavis and not

to be considered by you as evidence against any of the other defendants.

MR. HUNEVOL: Your Honor, I would move to strike all testimony as regards Mrs. Shephard, and I have no questions of Mr. Shipps. THE COURT: Motion to strike denied. (Sheption) MR. FERGUSON: We renew our motion. THE COURT: Motion to strike denied of the jury, the Court observes it has been raining pretty hard. I think It is slacking up now so we can go to lunch. We will take a recess until 2 o'clock. Let me caution you again not to discuss this case with anyone now allow anyone to discuss it with you or in your presence and do not discuss it among yourselves. Members of the jury, do not read any account in any newspaper of this trial if such should appear. Do not view any television reports of this trial if such should appear nor listen to any radio accounts of this trial if such should appear. You go now, members of the jury, and come back at 2 o'clock.

(The jury retired from the courtroom.) (The Court recessed from 1 until 1:55 P M.)

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THE COURT: The Court during the recess between the hours of 1 o'clock and 2 o'clock while in chambers was informed by a State Highway Patrolman that there was a person who had been in the courtroom during the morning session had taken numerous pictures on the outside of the courtroom of sitnesses leaving the courthouse who had testified on this morning, namely, Mr. Mike Poulos, Mrs. James Jackson, Mrs. Lela McKeithan: that when this matter was reported the Court ordered the State Highway Patrolmen and the S B I Agents to inform this person not to take anymore pictures around the courthouse square, on the premises, in the courthouse and not to take any pictures anywhere of any witnesses or any jurors; that thereafter approximately 3- minutes thereafter S B I Agents Slaughter and Twiddy and Federal Agent A T H Agent Walden informed the Court in chambers that this person had just a few minutes theretofore taken pictures of each of these persons, took pictures of the following persons; 2 pictures of Federal Agent Walden and 2 pictures of New Hanover County Deputy Sheriff Mike Robinson, State Highway Patrolman Bron who was

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taking the following luitnesses: Mrs. Lela McKeithan, Mr. Mike Poulos and Mrs. James Jack-Thereupon, the Court ordered the officers son. to bring the person into chambers who had taken these pictures which was immediately done, and the Court inquired of his name and learned that his name was Mark Douglas Smith who stated that he was of Greensboro, represented the African Morld and did not know that he was supposed to not take pictures except in the courtroom, saying that he was advised by a Sheriff Deputy that he could not take them in the courtroom; that the Court asked him if he would leave the film with the officers, and he said that some of the shots were of others than the aforementioned witnesses and that whereupon the Court informed him that the pittures would be returned to him except for those which were of witnesses and other participants of this trial. Thereupon, he voluntarily gave the film to S B I Agent Slaughter who informed him that he would return the photographs to him as soon as they were developed except those witnesses which were to be handed to the Court. Whereupon, Mr. Frank Ballance and other defense

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attorneys came in about that time and said they had just been spoken to by a group downstairs which the Court is informed were the defendants as to what was happening and that whereupon the Court explained to Mr. Ballance and other defense attorneys what had happened and also explained to them that Mr. Smith wanted to take pictures of the defendants and the Court told him that he would take this matter up with the defense counsel as to whether or not they would agree that their clients be photographs, but in any event that they could not be any pictures taken in the courthouse or on the courthouse grounds of any person during the progress of this trial. The Court further informed Mr. Ballance and Mr. Smith and others that a further announcement would be made when court reconvened. The Court further informed Mr. Smith that the Court had made several orders during the preceding weeks that no photographs be taken and realized that he was not in attendance and may not have heard the order; the Court further advised Mr. Ballance that he would be allowed to be present when the films were

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developed and returned to the Court and before the same were to be released. The Court orders now that no photographs are to be taken of any person or any object or of anything in the courtroom or in the courthouse or on the courthouse square during the progress of this trial. The Court further orders that no one bring or have in his possession any camera of any kind, sort or description in the courthouse or on the courthouse square during the progress of this trial. The Court further orders that no picture is to be made of any witness in this trial at any place during the progress of this trial. The Court further orders that no juror or jury be photographs at any place during the progress of this trial.

Now if anyone has any cameras with them I want you to remove them from the courtroom, and Mr. Sheriff, tomorrow morning if anybody brings any camera with them on the courthouse grounds I want the camera removed. MR. FERGUSON: We would like to note an exception to that portion of the order which bars cameras being in an around the square and the court-

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house on the grounds, that this constitutes a denial of the defendants to a public trial.

THE COURT: Now, Mr. Ferguson, I was akked just a while ago as to whether pictures could be taken of the defendants. And I told them that

the matter is for you gentlemen to decide as to whether or not that you would allow that to be done. But in any event that no picture is to be taken on the courthouse property. That includes the courthouse and the courthouse square. Now as to whether they are to be photographed elsewhere is a matter for you to decide.

MR. FERGUSON: Yes, sir; your Monor, we would like to note that during the progress of the trial film of the courtroom personnel and parties involved with the trial have been taken on the courthouse grounds and shown publicly on television prior to today.

EHE COURT: This includes television also, Mr. Ferguson. No television pictures are to be made on the courthouse square and no television pictures are to be made of any witness in this trial at any place or any juror at any place. MR. BALLANCE: Your Honor, at this time the defendants would like to move the Court for a mistrial on the basis that prior to the noon recess and at the time that police Officer Chipps was called by the State as a witness, Juror number 1 seated in the jurybox in the presence of the other jurors stated aloud that he knew this officer and that that remark was audible and was heard by the remainder of the jury and for that reason we move the Court for mistrial.
