I worked my way to this and put my back up to this two doors here. At this point I realized that I was illuminated. Things were real bright. I looked in this direction which would have been across the street towards Mike's Grocery. Then I continued to turn on around to my immediate right, which I would have been looking back this way. At that point is when I heard the click of the gun. I immediately turned back to my left in this open space right here. There was a barrel of a shotgun in this angle pointing up. As I turned and looked back I looked you Immediately might say down the barrel of a shotgun.

I pulled the trigger on my shotgun.
