Dear Mrs. Wright:

In accordance with our conversation of the afternoon of October 2, 1963, I am forwarding you this list of students at the University of Mississippi involved in disciplinary problems during the past year.

A. Students Involved in the September 30 Riot

The students included in this category were all identified in some way as participants in the riot, and this participation was made known to University officials usually by letters to the Dean of students from officials of the Department.

So far our records indicate only eight students were in any way disciplined. These first eight students referred to Dean Love were first issued warning by Dean Love and then placed on disciplinary probation pending an appearance before the student judicial council. There is no record of the student council's recommendation in these cases. It is widely believed by members of the faculty that expulsion was recommended for two of the persons, Shelton and Stuart and possibly for two others, Scott and Jenkins but we do not know what, in fact, the recommendation was except in Stuart's case. A memorandum indicates that Mr. Clark, of the Department, was told by Dean Love that student council had recommended expulsion until February 1963.

The final result was that some of the students were placed on disciplinary probation for the year and the others were sentenced to dismissal with sentence suspended, for the rest of the time the student is in school. The students with the charges against them are as follows:

1. James Franklin Stuart, a leader who cursed, challenged and spat on the Marshalls.
2. John T. Jenkins, a leader who cursed resisted arrest, and threatened the Marshalls and a soldier with a length of pipe.
3. Anson Shelton, Jr. assaulted a photographer during the riot, and obtained a roll of film from another reporter a week after the riot through force or threat of force.
4. Tommy Wayne Scott, threw rocks, breaking windows in an Army jeep.
5. Edward J. Hervath, was arrested at the height of the riot for being a leading participant.
6. Ronnie Spencer Roberts, a leader and an active instigator in the riot.
7. Clyde Wilkerson Owen, Jr. was in a group of persons who threw Molotov cocktails in Army vehicle.
8. John William Seal was a participant in riot.
9. A freshman student whose last name is Denier, was actually involved in the riot. Information regarding him was

not forwarded to the university until after the student judicial council hearings for the other students had been set up.

The attached copy of the Dean Love's report on discipline contained in the pamphlet "The University of Mississippi and the Meredith Case" does not include information on #9, Dozier. (See Attachment #1)

Attached to this letter is a list of 17 additional students who were identified as participants in the riot. This information was furnished to the University in late October. It is doubtful that anything was done to the students. (See Attachment #2)

B. Students Who Have Been Involved with Weapons

The following students were in some way involved with the possession of various types of weapons or ammunition. This list does not include those listed above. It should be noted that all weapons were ordered removed from the campus in early October.

1. Joseph Randoi Patty - On October 19, 1962 Patty, who was riding in a car, pointed a starter pistol at a passing jeep with Army personnel in it. He fired the pistol which was loaded with blanks. He was quite lucky that his fire was not returned. Dean Love regarded this as a serious incident and had Patty write a letter of apology to the Commander of the troops.
2. Paul E. Van Houten - Ammunition was spotted in his car on October 26.
3. Glenn Griffin and Samuel Orvan - These two men were caught taking shot guns into their dorms on October 28.

4. Raymond Shumrock - was found with a shot gun on the same day. In reference to the shot gun incidents, all three of the persons involved said that he brought the guns to the campus to go squirrel hunting and were cooperative with police officer and agreed to let the campus police have custody of the weapons.
5. In late November 1962, two car loads of cadets returning from a military drill drove by Baxter Hall which was at that time guarded by Army sentinel and several of the cadets were riding inside or outside the car had their drill rifles with them and clicked the bolts on these rifles and shouted as they passed. This was another "serious" incident, and the entire Cadet Corp wrote a letter of apology to the Commander of the Oxford forces.
6. Tully Hall - On April 23, 1963, was observed to have 22 rifle in his dormitory which is located near Baxter Hall. It is not known what action was taken by the University of Mississippi.
7. On August 1, 1963, a Deputy Marshall observed a car which was riding around the campus and a person in the car had a pistol loaded with blanks which he fired a couple of times at random. The Marshall was told that this person was Charlie Patterson, a law student. This information may not have been furnished to the University by us.

C. The Students Disorders During the Last of October and the First of November

On Monday, October 29, 1962 and for the remainder of that week serious disturbances occurred on the campus. With the consent of University officials, the Army conducted a search of Baxter Hall and surrounding dorms. A list setting forth the items found in the search is attached to this letter. (See Attachment #3)

As a result of the disturbances and this search, four, or possibly five students were expelled. Taylor Robertson, Jack Wade Hood, Richard Martin Toplitz. The students of whose identity we are aware are. Robertson was expelled for possession of the items indicated on the attached list and for being a general ring leader. Hood was expelled for throwing cherry bombs at a soldier and provoking him so that he would fire at him. The reason for the Toplitz expulsion is not certain.

Additionally, James T. Mc Swain, David M. Coer, Jonathan M. Nash, and Hugh M. Hurison were referred to the student council for disciplinary action. Nash and Coer had cherry bombs and provocative leaflets in their rooms. James T. Mc Swain had cherry bombs and shot gun shells and Hurison was the owner of a car from which cherry bombs were thrown, on the night of October 29. Coer reportedly withdrew from school voluntarily. And we do not know what, if any, disciplinary action was taken in regard to the others.

It should be brought to your attention that Taylor Robertson obtained an ex parte injunction from state Chancery Court which ordered his readmission. Although the University considered taking action in this matter, they did nothing to challenge the injunction during the fall semester. It was, at one time, agreed by University officials and Robertson's lawyer that he would withdraw.

following the fall semester and no action would be made to challenge the ex parte injunction. It is not known whether Robertson returned for the Spring semester.

D. Additional incidents of Student's Misbehavior

In addition the disciplinary action growing out of the riots or the disturbances during the action above mentioned, the following students were known to have appeared before the student council the past year:

1. A student named Cogh whose residence is in Maryland was a participant in the disturbances that followed the January 7 announcement by Mr. Meredith that he would not return to school unless conditions changed. Cogh was part of a crowd of students who tried to enter the school library following Mr. Meredith. Cogh became involved in a hassle with the University Police. University officials had him move off campus, allowed him to complete his semester's work and then suspended him for the remainder of the academic year.
2. On April 30, 1963, two students ignited an explosive device in a dormitory which blew out windows and did other minor property damage. These two students, who are unknown to the Department, were disciplined. One was expelled and the other suspended from school.
3. John P. Little - On May 2, 1963, a car believed to be driven by Little for the second time tried to run an Army jeep off the road. Little was later brought before the Student Judicial Council and charged with four counts. Three of them general misbehavior charges and the other was an attempt to damage Army personnel or property. The result of this hearing is not known.

Finally there are a number of incidents in which students misconduct was involved. We have no record of the action taken, if any, by the University.

1. On October 14, 1962 two students, James L. Martin and Richard R. Chaffin were arrested by State authorities for selling bonded whiskey to soldiers on duty at Oxford. They were fined \$100 each by the Oxford City Court.

2. Two students named Holmes and Bogan, believed to be Sidney Garland Holmes and William Joe Bogan, were active in a series of incidents which threatened, intimidated or harassed three white students, James Defibough, William Temple and a Canadian student named Stock, all of whom were friendly with James Meredith. These incidents began in the early part of December, and campus authorities were notified by Defibough and Temple. Also on January 9, an incident of throwing coke bottles by persons unknown through the transom in Temple's room resulted in slight injury to Temple. The University officials suggested and then insisted that Temple and Stock move from Hovary B to Baxter Hall but they refused.
3. Milus C. Campbell, Jr. - Dean Love was informed that on a number of occasions that Campbell had threatened, insulted, and cursed a Lieutenant in charge of guss details at Baxter Hall. There were a number of similar incidents involving Taylor Robertson which were reported to Dean Love prior to the action in late October during which he was expelled.
4. Another group of students living at Baxter Hall the week before the October disturbances blocked the water fountain and attempted to prevent James Meredith from drinking water. A prominent participant in this was John T. Moss. Dean Love acted on these three series of incidents by calling a meeting of the entire white residents of Baxter Hall and giving them a talk.
5. Tommy Wayne Scott - On February 10, 1962 when James Meredith was going to Memphis for the weekend, he attempted to pass a car on two occasions which tried to run him off the road. The Deputy Marshal who was accompanying preventing the car from continuing to harass Meredith. The car was checked and was owned by the father of Tommy Wayne Scott and driven by a person of Scott's description. It should be noted, at this time, Scott was on disciplinary probation for his participation

but is unknown what action he took.

2. ALL PERSONNEL SHOULD BE BRIEFED ON THEIR DUTIES AS SOON AS POSSIBLE. THEY SHOULD BE GIVEN DUTY ASSIGNMENTS, AUTO ASSIGNMENTS AND WHERE ACCOMMODATIONS ARE AVAILABLE. THEY SHOULD BE INFORMED OF THE GENERAL FEELING OF THE PUBLIC AND THE STUDENTS. THEY SHOULD ALSO BE GIVEN AN OPPORTUNITY TO READ THIS AND FAMILIARIZE THEMSELVES WITH ITS OPERATION.
3. SUPERVISOR IN CHARGE OF DETAIL SHOULD INSURE THAT PROPER ROOM ARRANGEMENT HAVE BEEN MADE WITH THE OLE MISS HOTEL FOR ALL MEN. ALL EXTRA EXPENSES INCURRED SHOULD BE CLEARED WITH THE SUPERVISOR. THE ONLY EXCEPTION WILL BE FOR GAS AND OIL FOR RENTAL CARS.
4. SUPERVISOR AND SQUAD LEADERS SHOULD MAINTAIN RECORDS OF ALL DUTY PERSONNEL. THEY SHOULD KNOW FULL NAMES AND HOME DISTRICT OF THEIR MEN. SQUAD LEADERS WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR MEN. SUPERVISOR SHOULD SET UP A ROTATION SYSTEM FOR DEALING AS EQUALLY AS POSSIBLE WITH EACH DEPUTY. UNUSUAL CIRCUMSTANCES CONCERNING DEPUTIES SHOULD BE TAKEN UP WITH THE CHIEF U.S. MARSHAL.

2. LIASON WITHIN OUR OWN UNIT WILL RUN AS OUTLINED ABOVE EXCEPT THAT SQUAD LEADERS WILL CONFER WITH MR. SATHER DURING THEIR TOUR OF DUTY. MR. SATHER WILL HANDLE IMMEDIATE CHANGES IN PROCEDURES. LIASON BETWEEN FEDERAL BUREAU OF INVESTIGATION, U.S. ARMY, ARMY INTELLIGENCE AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENTS GROUPS WILL BE HANDLED BY THE SUPERVISORY DEPUTY OR ONE OF THE ATTORNEYS. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES IS A DEPUTY TO CALL ANY OF THESE UNITS WITHOUT CHECKING WITH SUPERVISOR OR MR. SATHER.

IV. EQUIPMENT

1. A LIST OF ALL EQUIPMENT IS TO BE KEPT BY THE DEPUTY IN CHARGE. THIS WILL INCLUDE EQUIPMENT IN THE ROOMS AS WELL AS EQUIPMENT IN THE CARS. EACH SQUAD LEADER WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR EQUIPMENT ASSIGNED TO HIS SQUAD. A RUNNING INVENTORY WILL BE KEPT AND WILL INCLUDE LOST OR STOLEN ITEMS.
2. A LIST OF ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT NEEDED WILL BE MADE AND TURNED OVER TO THE DEPUTY IN CHARGE.

3. ADDITIONAL EQUIPMENT OR SPECIAL EQUIPMENT MAY BE ORDER FROM WASHINGTON D.C. BY THE DEPUTY IN CHARGE.

V. CONDUCT AND RESPONSIBILITIES

1. WHEN DEALING WITH GROUPS, CROWDS, PRESS, AND LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS, IT SHOULD BE REMEMBERED THAT WE ARE PROFESSIONAL MEN AND SHOULD GOVERN OURSELVES ACCORDINGLY. REFRAIN FROM ENTERING INTO CONTROVERSIES WITH ANYONE. BE FIRM BUT POLITE AND FRIENDLY AT ALL TIMES.
2. ALL QUESTIONS OF A DELICATE NATURE SHOULD BE REFERRED TO THE ATTORNEY IN CHARGE.
3. ALL SQUAD LEADERS WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THEIR MEN. THIS INCLUDES DAILY LOGS AND DUTY REPORTS. THEY ARE ALSO RESPONSIBLE FOR SEEING THAT WHEN THEY LEAVE THIS ASSIGNMENT THE FOLLOWING MAN IS BRIEFED.

VI. SECURITY

1. MAXIMUM SECURITY MEASURES SHOULD BE MAINTAINED AT ALL TIMES. EXTREME CARE SHOULD BE TAKEN WITH REFERENCE TO DANGEROUS ITEMS SUCH AS TEAR GAS, WEAPONS ETC.
2. EACH DEPUTY SHOULD USE CARE WHEN DISCUSSING THIS ASSIGNMENT AND IN PASSING ON INFORMATION. PERSON TO PERSON CONTACT SHOULD BE MAINTAINED RATHER THEN USE OF TELEPHONE.
3. SURVEILLANCE OF ROOMS AND SURROUNDING AREA SHOULD BE MADE PERIODICALLY. THIS INCLUDES AJOINING ROOMS, STORAGE ROOMS AND BATHS.

VII. OPERATING PROCEDURES

1. ALL MEN WILL BE PLACED ON ROTATING SHIFTS. A SCHEDULE WILL BE SET UP BY THE DEPUTY IN CHARGE AND A SCHEDULE GIVEN TO EACH MAN.
2. THE DEPUTY IN CHARGE AND THE SQUAD LEADERS WILL BRIEF ALL NEW MEN AS SOON AS THEY ARRIVE. IF POSSIBLE THERE WILL BE A PERMANENT DRIVER DURING THE DAY TIME. THIS WILL BE IN ADDITION TO THE THREE MEN ON THE SHIFT. EACH MAN WILL BE ASSIGNED ONE OF THE FOLLOWING POSITIONS AT THE START OF EACH DAY:
 - A. DRIVER: THE DRIVER WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR HAVING THE CAR AVAILABLE NEAR EACH OF THE CLASSROOMS. THE DRIVER SHOULD REMAIN WITH THE VEHICLE AT ALL TIMES SO HE WILL BE IN A POSITION TO RADIO FOR ASSISTANCE IF NECESSARY. HE WILL ALSO FAMILIARIZE HIMSELF WITH THE POSITION ON THE MILITARY POLICE JEEP. DURING THE MEAL PERIOD, THE CAR IS TO BE PARKED IN FRONT OF THE CAFETERIA. THE DRIVER WILL REMAIN WITH THE CAR AND WILL EAT ONLY AFTER THE MAIN GROUP HAS RETURNED TO THE DORMATORY.
 - B. LEAD MAN: THE LEAD MAN WILL LEAVE SHORTLY BEFORE MEREDITH AND WILL CHECK THE GENERAL AREA OF THE CAMPUS AS WELL AS THE CLASSROOM, BEFORE MEREDITH ARRIVES. HE WILL STAY NEAR THE CLASSROOM UNTIL THE CLASS IS OVER. AT THIS TIME HE WILL FOLLOW MEREDITH, AT A SHORT DISTANCE, OUT OF THE BUILDING. HE THEN BECOMES THE REAR MAN.

C. THE REAR MAN: THE REAR MAN WILL FOLLOW MEREDITH AT A SAFE DISTANCE, CLOSING UP AS THE CROWDS INCREASE, FALLING BACK AS THE CROWDS THIN OUT. WHEN SUBJECT REACHES THE NEXT CLASS THIS DEPUTY WILL TAKE UP A POSITION IN THE MAIN HALL OF THE BUILDING WHERE HE CAN OBSERVE THE CAR AND JEEP. IN CASE OF TROUBLE IN THE BUILDING IT IS THIS MAN'S JOB TO CALL THE SQUAD LEADER, MP'S, ETC. WHEN SUBJECT LEAVES CLASSROOM THIS DEPUTY WILL PROCEED ON AHEAD TO THE NEXT CLASS. AT THIS POINT HE BECOMES THE LEAD MAN. THE SQUAD LEADER WILL TAKE A POSITION TO THE REAR OF THE DEPUTY FOLLOWING SUBJECT. WHERE HE WILL BE ABLE TO OBSERVE EVERYTHING TAKING PLACE. WHEN SUBJECT ARRIVES AT HIS CLASS THE SQUAD LEADER WILL REMAIN OUTSIDE AND LOCATE THE CAR AND MP JEEP. WHEN SUBJECT LEAVES HE WILL AGAIN TAKE UP HIS POSITION TO THE REAR. TO 7:00 A.M. THE MEN COMING ON DUTY WILL EAT AT THE SAME TIME THAT MEREDITH DOES. THE MEN GOING OFF SHIFT WILL ACT AS OUTSIDE MAN AND DRIVER FOR THE SECOND CAR. THE OUTSIDE MAN WILL TAKE UP A POSITION OUTSIDE OF THE CAFETERIA WHERE HE IS ABLE TO OBSERVE THE SUBJECT AND ALSO THE CAR AND JEEP. IN CASE OF TROUBLE IT WILL BE HIS JOB TO ALERT THE GROUP OUTSIDE OR THE GROUP INSIDE. THE SECOND CAR WILL GO TO THE REAR OF THE CAFETERIA AND WAIT IF THERE IS TROUBLE THIS WILL BE THE CAR THAT THE SUBJECT WILL USE TO LEAVE IN. THE REMAINDER OF THE MEN WHO WISH TO EAT IN THE CAFETERIA MAY DO SO BUT SHOULD SIT AT THE OPPOSITE END OF THE CAFETERIA FROM THE SUBJECT. ANY UNUSUAL CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD BE REPORTED IMMEDIATELY. DURING ANY PERIOD WHEN TROUBLE IS EXPECTED THE MEN WILL STANDBY IN THE HOTEL OR AT THE DORMITORY. FOR THIS REASON ALL MEN SHOULD LET THEIR SQUAD LEADERS KNOW IF THEY EXPECT TO BE GONE FOR ANY LENGTH OF TIME.

3. MAPS OF THE CAMPUS AND TOWN ARE POSTED IN THE DORMITORY AND SHOULD BE STUDIED BY ALL DEPUTIES. THEY SHOULD BE ESPECIALLY FAMILIAR WITH THE GENERAL AREA OF THE CLASS ROOMS. ALWAYS BE ON THE LOOKOUT FOR LITTLE BITS OF INFORMATION THAT MAY BE OF ASSISTANCE. INFORMATION MAY BE OBTAINED IN SEVERAL DIFFERENT WAYS. ONE OF THE BEST IS FROM THE FRIENDLY STUDENTS. INSTRUCTIONS WILL BE GIVEN TO EACH DEPUTY BY HIS SQUAD LEADER, AS TO THE OPERATIONS OF THE RADIO SET UP. INSTRUCTIONS REGARDING ASSAULT ON MEREDITH WILL BE FOUND ON THE LAST PAGE. USE OF TEAR GAS WILL BE ONLY ON INSTRUCTIONS FROM THE ASST. U.S. ATTORNEY. ALL OTHER OPERATIONS WILL FOLLOW NORMAL POLICE PROCEDURES. ANY STUDENT WHO BECOMES ABUSEIVE OR GIVES THE DEPUTY A LOT OF TROUBLE SHOULD BE ASKED TO SHOW HIS IDENTIFICATION CARD. IF HE REFUSES, THE DEPUTY SHOULD TRY TO NOTE A GOOD PICTURE IN HIS MIND AND HE CAN CHECK THE PICTURE FILE LATER.

EACH INDIVIDUAL SITUATION WILL HAVE TO BE HANDLED BY THE DEPUTY IN THE BEST INTERESTS OF MEREDITH'S SAFETY AND IN THE HIGHEST DEGREE OF LAW ENFORCEMENT TRADITION. SEE APPENDAGE FOR ADDITIONAL INFORMATION.

OFFICE OF THE UNITED STATES ATTORNEY

1. This action is brought to protect the interest of the United States in the preservation of the integrity of orders of the Federal Courts.

2. This court has jurisdiction of this action under 28 USC 1345.

3. The defendants listed in the caption to this complaint are all white males who were present at Oxford, Mississippi, on or about September 23 and 24, 1962.

4. James H. Meredith is a plaintiff in a civil action now pending in the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi and in the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. In said action, James H. Meredith sought a court order directing the Board of Trustees of the University of Mississippi to consider, without regard to race, his application for admission to the University of Mississippi. On June 23, 1962, the Court of Appeals reversed the judgment of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi and directed the District Court to enter judgment for the plaintiff as prayed for in his complaint.

5. On July 26, 1962, the Circuit Court of Appeals, in aid of its jurisdiction and in order to preserve the effectiveness of its judgment, issued an injunction requiring the University officials and the members of the Board of Trustees of Institutions of Higher Learning of the State of Mississippi to admit James H. Meredith as a student to the University. The Circuit Court of Appeals provided that its order should remain in effect until such time as the District Court had issued and enforced the orders required by the Circuit Court of Appeals and until such time as there has been full and actual compliance in good faith with the orders of the Circuit Court of Appeals and of the District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi.

6. On September 13, 1962, the District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi entered an order, requiring the officials of the University of Mississippi and the members of the Board of Trustees of Institutions of Higher Learning of Mississippi to enroll James H. Meredith as a student in the University.

7. On September 20, 1962, James H. Meredith attempted to register at the University of Mississippi and was refused registration by Ross R. Barnett. Thereafter, the United States of America, acting as Amicus Curiae, obtained a restraining order against Ross R. Barnett and other law enforcement officials from (among other things) injuring, harassing, threatening or intimidating James Howard Meredith in any other way or by any other means on account of his attending or seeking to attend the University of Mississippi; interfering with or obstructing by any means or in any manner the performance of obligations or the enjoyment of rights under the Circuit Court's order of July 23, 1962, and the order of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi entered September 13, 1962, in this action; and interfering with or obstructing, by force, threat, arrest or otherwise, any officer or agent of the United States in the performance of duties in connection with the enforcement of, and the prevention of obstruction to, the orders entered by the Court of Appeals and the District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi relating to the enrollment and attendance of James Howard Meredith at the University of Mississippi; or arresting, prosecuting or punishing such officer or agent on account of his performing or seeing to perform such duty.

8. Commencing on or about September 20, 1962, and continuing to the present time, the defendants and other persons unknown to the plaintiff have conspired to prevent by violence, force, threats, and harassment, James H. Meredith from freely exercising his right to attend the University of Mississippi pursuant to orders of the Federal Courts.

9. On Sunday, September 30, 1962, James H. Meredith again came to the University of Mississippi to register. He arrived accompanied by United States Marshal at about 6:30 o'clock P.M. Within two hours thereafter, the defendants, in furtherance of their conspiracy, assembled on the campus of the University of Mississippi. While the defendants were so assembled, the defendants and their co-conspirators thereupon started a riot all for the purpose of interfering with and obstructing by force James H. Meredith's admission to the University of Mississippi. In the course of this riot, the defendants damaged property, and attempted to and did inflict violence on United States Marshals. This conduct was done with the purpose and has the effect of interfering with the orders of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi and the United States Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit.

10. Law enforcement officials of the State of Mississippi were unable to prevent the acts and conduct of the defendants or to arrest those responsible. The riot continued throughout the night and part of the following day and was not stopped until military forces took command.

11. Unless restrained by order of this Court, the defendants named in this petition will continue their unlawful efforts to discourage and prevent James H. Meredith from attending the University of Mississippi pursuant to the orders of the Circuit Court of Appeals and the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi.

12. The petitioner, having the duty to represent the public interest in the preservation of the integrity of the orders of the Federal Courts, has no remedy against the unlawful acts and conduct described in this petition other than this action for an injunction. and unless such injunction is issued as prayed, and unless a temporary restraining order is issued at once, before notice can be served and a hearing had, petitioner will suffer immediate and irreparable injury consisting of the impairment of the integrity of its judicial processes, the obstruction of the due administration of justice, and the deprivation of rights under the

WHEREFORE, the petitioner respectfully prays that a temporary restraining order be issued upon the filing of this petition, that a preliminary injunction be issued after notice and hearing, and that a permanent injunction be entered after trial upon the merits, restraining and enjoining the defendants named in this complaint and all persons in active concert with them from:

1. Interfering with or obstructing by any means or in any manner the performance of obligations or the enjoyment of rights under the order of the Court of Appeals of July 28, 1962, and the order of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi entered September 13, 1962, which orders directed the registration, admission and attendance of James E. Meredith at the University of Mississippi.

2. Interfering with, or obstructing by force, threat, any officers or agent of the United States in the performance of duties in connection with the enforcement of, and the prevention of obstruction to, the orders entered by the Court of Appeals and the District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi relating to the enrollment and attendance of James Howard Meredith at the University of Mississippi.

3. For such further relief as the interest of justice may require.

4. For the costs of this action.

OBSTRUCTION OF COURT ORDERS

SEC. 101. Chapter 73 of title 18, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end thereof a new section as follows:

"§ 1509. Obstruction of court orders

"Whoever, by threats or force, wilfully prevents, obstructs, impedes, or interferes with, or wilfully attempts to prevent, obstruct, impede, or interfere with, the due exercise of rights or the performance of duties under any order, judgment, or decree of a court of the United States, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than one year or both.

"No injunctive or other civil relief against the conduct made criminal by this section shall be denied on the ground that such conduct is a crime."

SEC. 102. The analysis of chapter 73 of such title is amended by adding at the end thereof the following:

3. 18 U.S.C. 3053, Powers of Marshals and Deputies

U. S. C. A. TITLE 18

§ 3053. Powers of marshals and deputies

United States marshals and their deputies may carry firearms and may make arrests without warrant for any offense against the United States committed in their presence, or for any felony cognizable under the laws of the United States if they have reasonable grounds to believe that the person to be arrested has committed or is committing such felony. June 25, 1948, c. 645, 62 Stat. 817.

4. Temporary Restraining Order Filed By Fifth
Circuit on September 25, 1962

1. Arresting, attempting to arrest, prosecuting or instituting any prosecution against James Howard Meredith under any statute, ordinance, rule or regulation whatever, on account of his attending, or seeking to attend, the University of Mississippi;

2. Instituting or proceeding further in any civil action against James Howard Meredith or any other persons on account of James Howard Meredith's enrolling or seeking to enroll, or attending the University of Mississippi;

3. Injuring, harassing, threatening or intimidating James Howard Meredith in any other way or by any other means on account of his attending or seeking to attend the University of Mississippi;

4. Interfering with or obstructing by any means or in any manner the performance of obligations or the enjoyment of rights under this Court's order of July 28, 1962 and the order of the United States District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi entered September 13, 1962, in this action, and

5. Interfering with or obstructing, by force, threat, arrest or otherwise, any officer or agent of the United States in the performance of duties in connection with the enforcement of, and the prevention of obstruction to, the orders entered by this Court and the District Court for the Southern District of Mississippi relating to the enrollment and attendance of James Howard Meredith at the University of Mississippi; or arresting, prosecuting or punishing such officer or agent on account of his performing or seeking to perform such duty.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Paul G. Alexander and J. Robert Gilfoy be temporarily restrained from proceeding further, serving or enforcing any process or judgment, or arresting James Howard Meredith in connection with the criminal actions against him in the Justice of the Peace Court of Hinds County, Mississippi.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that A. L. Meador, Sr., be temporarily restrained from taking any further action or seeking to enforce any judgment entered in the case of A.L. Meador, Sr. v. James Meredith, et al.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that Ross R. Barnett be temporarily restrained from enforcing or seeking to enforce against James Howard Meredith, any process or judgment in the case of State of Mississippi, Ex Rel Ross Barnett, Governor vs. James H. Meredith.

ORDER GRANTING PERMANENT INJUNCTION

. . . Now, therefore, it is here ordered, adjudged, and decreed that the plaintiff, James Howard Meredith, be and he is hereby granted all the relief that is prayed for by him in his complaint and that the defendants, Charles Dickson Fair, President of the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning of the State of Mississippi, Louisville, Mississippi; Euclid Ray Jobe, Executive Secretary of the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning of the State of Mississippi, Jackson, Mississippi; Edgar Ray Izard, Hazlehurst, Mississippi, Leon Lowrey, Olive Branch, Mississippi; Ira Lamar Morgan, Oxford, Mississippi; Malcolm Nette Roberts, Hattiesburg, Mississippi; William Orlando Stone, Jackson, Mississippi; S. R. Evans, Greenwood, Mississippi; Verner Smith Holmes, McComb, Mississippi; James Napoleon Lipscomb, Macon, Mississippi; Tally D. Riddell, Quitman, Mississippi; Harry Gordon Carpenter, Rolling Fork, Mississippi; Robert Bruce Smith, II, Ripley, Mississippi and Thomas Jefferson Tubb, West Point, Mississippi, Members of the Board of Trustees of State Institutions of Higher Learning; James Davis Williams, Chancellor of the University of Mississippi, Oxford, Mississippi; Arthur Beverly Lewis, Dean of the College of Liberal Arts of the University of Mississippi, Oxford, Mississippi, and Robert Byron Ellis, Registrar of the University of Mississippi, Oxford, Mississippi, and each of them, their agents, servants, employees,

successors, attorneys and all persons in active concert and participation with them be and they hereby are permanently restrained and enjoined from:

(1) Refusing to admit plaintiff, James Howard Meredith immediately to the University of Mississippi and that they shall each of them be, and they are hereby required to admit him to the University of Mississippi upon the same terms and conditions as applicable to white students;

(2) From interfering in any manner with the right of plaintiff, James Howard Meredith to matriculate in, or attend the University of Mississippi;

(3) From taking any action or doing any act or being guilty of any conduct which will impair, frustrate or defeat his right to enter the University of Mississippi;

(4) Refusing to admit the plaintiff, James Howard Meredith to the University of Mississippi upon his applications heretofore filed, all of which are continuing applications.

It is further ordered that said defendants, or any of the classes of persons referred to, are prohibited and enjoined from excluding the said James Howard Meredith from admission to continued attendance at the University of Mississippi.

It is further ordered that the defendants, their servants, agents, employees, successors and assigns, and all persons acting in concert with them, are enjoined to admit the plaintiff, James Howard Meredith to the University of Mississippi upon his applications heretofore filed and they are enjoined from excluding the said James Howard Meredith from admission to continued attendance at the University of Mississippi or discriminating against him in any way whatsoever because of his race.

It is further ordered that a copy of this order and injunction be served by the United States Marshal on each of the defendants herein.
