During the same time, my mother has been hospitalized with pneumonia-influenza, and so seriously ill that I had to call home members of the family living in other cities. Much of my time has been required at the hospital and in unaccustomed demands at home. Yesterday I took her home from the hospital, have set up a professional nursing schedule at home, and am now turning again to my work.

I hope to have the transcript in progress by Tuesday of this week. I cannot now give you a delivery date, but I shall do all I can to complete it at an early date.

Nearly all the pictures sent to the Memphis and New Orleans Offices of the FBI for identification have been returned. The New Orleans Office has retained six for further investigation.

The pictures, which are all included in the United States v. Barnett Pictorial Chronology were given numbers based on the date taken. The following table is a guide to the numbering system used in the FBI request and the Chronology.

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Report on Movie "Oxford, U.S.A." By Dennis E. Dillon

John Resemberg and I went over to Oxford to see the sovie "Oxford, U.3.A.". This picture was produced by Sime Associates. Patrick Sime was approached by the F.B.I. when we first learned be had films which were taken at Oxford on September 30. He refused at that time to cooperate in any way with the Pederal Government and expressed sympathy for the rioters. This was consistent with his actions on the University campus during the riot, when according to a statement in our files, he circulated soons the rioters congratulating them and patting them on the back.

The nevie was shown at the Lyric Theater in Oxford. This was its fourth public showing. It consisted of statements by Governor Expect, Lt. Governor Johnson, T. B. Birdsong, Attorney General Patterson and interviews with various witnesses.

The action on the campus and in Oxford on September 30 was depicted by still photos as well as action pictures. These were connects unde by a nogrator on the soundtrack as the pictures appeared. These connects placed the blace for the riot and resulting injuries directly on the Pederal Government. At certain points in the film, a section of the Constitution would appear on the screen, and the marrator would explain that the actions of the Pederal Government just shown violated this particular section.

The pictures shown were obviously not taken by Sine. The stills shown are all in our netebooks and sust have been gotten from the same sources. They showed the excells lined up around the Lyceum right after arriving on the campus. One of the pictures shown was the one we have showing Engshal Duley standing in front of his squad holding a gas gum.

The confrontation on University Avenue on September 36 was chown. Home of the conversation between John Door and Lt. Governor Johnson was reported. The pushing incident between McShane and Johnson was shown. Home of the Sheriffs who blocked the Street appeared.

There were scenes shown of soldiers searching students. These appeared to have been taken on October 1 on the campus. One student had his hands above his head while a soldier frished him. The soldier was shown rolling up the student's pants leg looking for hidden weapons. Soldiers were shown stopping and searching cars. These scenes also looked as though they took place on October 1. A soldier was shown stopping a Highway Patrol car. The comment on the soundtrack at that sine was that so one was spared from the illegal search.

Scenes were shown of the riot itself. These consisted of shots showing burning cars, and shots of the Lycena area after the gas was fired. There was a scene showing a caravan of Army trucks nowing up onto the campus.

Meredith's arrival at the airport with John Dear was shown.

I believe we are in possession of most, if not all of the film contained in this documentary depicting the events leading up to the riot, during the riot and after the riot. The most significant parts of the film for our purposes are the interviews.

T. B. Birdsong said that the Highway Patrol was unsreed on September 10. He had 200 men in the University area. Seventy-five of these men were on the campus trying to control the crowd. One hundred twenty-five of the nen were serving on roadblocks which were set up at all six entrances of the campus. He made a point of anying it is not a regular function of the Hississippi Highway Patrol to control crowds. Birdsong estimated the crowd to be between 1500 and 2000. I believe his estimate referred to the time the gas was fired but he was not clear on this. He claimed the Highway Patroloen were attempting to centrol the crowd when the marshala fired gas. This forced the Highway Patroloen to retreat to their headquarters in the gymnasium. Birdsong claimed the accumulation of gas forced them later on in the evening to leave even the gymnasium.

Patrolean Michols, whose pictures appear in our notebooks in several places, said he saw his partner bodly gassed by the marshals. He said he himself was bart in the head by the tear gas shells. He was

separated from his partner in the melee but some other patrolmen took him to the campus hospital. The film them showed a Mighway Patrolman being carried on a stretcher into an elevator followed by Patrolman Michols. T. B. Birdsong and a doctor. The doctor is stopped and interviewed. He identified himself as Dr. Harris or Dr. Ayers. The soundtrack was poor and I couldn't be sure of the name. He said he was in charge of the University Infirmary. He said the patrolnan, who was identified as Patrolnan Brunt, was badly hurt and had less than a 50-50 chance to live. He said that he was then being removed to a bigger hospital.

Lt. Governog Johnson was shown. He said that Senator Tasbrough contacted the Governor and hinself about removing the Highway ?atrol. He said Yarbrough told them a full-scale riot had erupted. Johnson said he advised Tarbrough to keep the Highway Patrol on the campus. Johnhon said he then went to the University as a representative of the Governor and spake with the Pederal officials. He convented on a conversation he had with John Dong inside the Lycens but I cannot recall now what he said, Johnson said the Highway Patrol left the campus, but remained at the gate of the University and turned away hundreds of arned outsiders. Re said if these wen had ever gotten onto the campus there wouldn't be a masshal left in the morning. Johnson said the Highway Patrol remained at their posts near the University gates until forced away by troops at bayonet point the ment morning. The next scene showed gas makked troops marching at bayonet point into the canera. A Highway Patrol Inspector whose name escapes we but is from Starkville and is in photograph #555a in our notebooks was shown walking toward the cauera with the bayonets at his back. It is a daylight scene and probably did take place on the morning of October 1.

Several students were interviewed whose names were not given. These were the students who were shown in the pictures taken by Millian Leaptrett of the Memphis Press Scinitar, exhibiting the marks of shotgum pellets on their stonachs. Two of the boys were brothers. They said the shotgum fire case from the direction of the marshals and there was nobody standing between them and the marshals.

An interview with two students was shown which appeared to have taken place at a time and place removed from the riot. One of these students was identified as Crawford Jones, a freshman at the University. Jones calined he was stopped while in his car and searched by Army troops on the morning of October 1. The troops found his rifle in the trunk of his car and accused him of using it during the riot. We said he remained in his room during the riot. The troops took him to the Lyceus where be was held for 13 hours. He said the students from the three Mississippi schools were treated better than the older people and outsiders who were forced to crowd into the Public Safety Office, a small hot goon. He said no one was given food or medical attention. Hany of the prisoners had whelps on their heads where the narshale bent then. some were detained 24 hours. They were all treated like aptorious criminals.

The other student's nave sounded like Melson Childers, Jr. He said he witnessed the firing of the gas, and in his opinion this exused the riot. He said the Highway Patrol had the crowd under control until the gas was fired. He nentioned an incident which occurred on University Avenue, Soldiers stopped a car which a co-ed was driving and searched it. They forced her to open her suitease and then passed her underwear around while laughing and making compents.

Another interview was with a University student who said the marshals gassed his finance. He said she was in the dornitory when the marshals fixed into it. The next scene showed a gir, unconscious, being carried into the infigurary. The student said the girl suffered temporary paralysis in her hands.

The girl berself is shown a few days later and is identified. I did not get the last name, but her first name is Theirs and she comes from Vicksburg. She claimed the despitory was locked, and the girls did not provoke the marshals, but the marshals fixed tear gas into the dermitory.

Mississippi State Representative Jim Backus was interviewed. He stated that he was on the campus during

the riot and it was caused by the Federal Covernment's illegal interference with Mississippi's right to regulate her schools. He said the marshala provoked the riot.

A picture of a gas shell, supposedly used by the marshals during the riot, was shown and the instructions on the shell were read by the marrator. These instructions were that the shell was not to be used against crowds, but only against people entrenched or barricaded in buildings. There was a scene showing the site of Paul Omihard's death and as interview with the student who found the body. He could only testify to finding of the body. The marrator tried to relate the death with the invasion of marshals.

The theater was only about one-half full during the showing of the file. There was little response from the audience who were meetly students. The theater across the stract had a line about one-half block long waiting to see "To Kill a Nockingbird".

RIOT FILM TO BE SHOWN

Oxford Disorder Pictured By Texans

OXFORD, Miss., April 23—
"Oxford, U. S. A.," a documentary film to be shown in
Oxford this week, depicts
from the viewpoint of its producer, Patrick Sims, "How the
Pedaral Government violated
the Constitution in the invasion
of Mississippi last fall."

The film verifies the Mississippi Legislature's special investigating committee report—which will be released to the public this week—according to Mr. Sims, president of Sims Associates of Dallas, Texas.

Sims and his associates were at the University of Mississippi during the racial crisis until Federal troops barred them from the campus.

He described the 50-minute films as picturing injured patrolmen, gassed coeds, wounded students, and séldiers driving away Mississippi leghway patrolmen at hal onet point from the roadblocks."

The showing here Wednesday night will be the forth showing to the public. The film also will be shown Friday and Saturday nights at 7 each night
