On December 8, 2015, the Supreme Court of California disbarred the respondent from the practice of law in California. The basis for the disbarment involved misconduct concerning immigration matters. The Disciplinary Counsel for the Department of Homeland Security ("DHS Disciplinary Counsel") petitioned for the respondent's immediate suspension from practice before that agency on March 25, 2019. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.103(a). The DHS Disciplinary Counsel states that the respondent remains disbarred from the practice of law in California, as of the date of its filing. The Disciplinary Counsel for the Executive Office for Immigration Review asks that the respondent be similarly suspended from practice before the Board of Immigration Appeals ("Board") and the Immigration Courts. The petition will be granted. See 8 C.F.R. §§ 1003.103(a)(1) and (4) (discussing grounds for immediate suspension).

ORDER: The petition is granted, and the respondent is hereby suspended from the practice of law before the Board, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS pending final disposition of this proceeding. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.103(a)(4).

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall promptly notify, in writing, any clients with cases currently pending before the Board, the Immigration Courts, or the DHS that the respondent has been suspended from practicing before these bodies.

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall maintain records to evidence compliance with this order.

FURTHER ORDER: The contents of this notice shall be made available to the public, including at Immigration Courts and appropriate offices of the DHS.

FOR THE BOARD

The Board may set aside the order of immediate suspension upon a showing of good cause when it appears in the interest of justice to do so. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.103(a)(4).
