IN PRACTITIONER DISCIPLINARY PROCEEDINGS

PETITION FOR IMMEDIATE SUSPENSION

On October 23, 2018, the Supreme Court of California issued an order suspending the respondent from the practice of law in that state for 1 year. The court stayed the period of suspension for all but 60 days, and the 60-day suspension became effective on November 22, 2018 (Petition for Immediate Suspension, Attachments 1-3). On April 19, 2019, the Disciplinary Counsel for the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) petitioned for the respondent's immediate suspension from practice before the Immigration Courts and the Board of Immigration Appeals. In the petition, the Disciplinary Counsel for EOIR noted that, while the respondent's period of suspension in California has expired, she remains suspended from the practice of law in that state (Petition for Immediate Suspension, Attachment 3). The Disciplinary Counsel for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) then asked that the respondent be similarly suspended from practice before that agency. The petition will be granted.<sup>1</sup> See 8 C.F.R. §§ 1003.103(a)(1) and (4) (2018) (discussing grounds for immediate suspension).

ORDER: The petition is granted, and the respondent is hereby suspended from the practice of law before the Board of Immigration Appeals, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS pending final disposition of this proceeding. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.103(a)(4).

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall promptly notify, in writing, any clients with cases currently pending before the Board of Immigration Appeals, the Immigration Courts, or the DHS that the respondent has been suspended from practicing before these bodies.

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall maintain records to evidence compliance with this order.

FURTHER ORDER: The contents of this notice shall be made available to the public, including at Immigration Courts and appropriate offices of the DHS.
