PETITION FOR IMMEDIATE SUSPENSION

On January 9, 2020, the Supreme Court of California issued an order suspending the respondent from the practice of law in California for 1 year with 30 days served and the remainder stayed pending the successful completion of a 1-year probation. On June 1, 2020, the Disciplinary Counsel for the Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) and the Disciplinary Counsel for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) jointly petitioned for the respondent's immediate suspension from practice before the Board of Immigration Appeals, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS. The Disciplinary Counsels for EOIR and the DHS further stated that the respondent remained suspended in California as of the date of their joint petition. The petition will be granted.\(^1\) See 8 C.F.R. \(^8\) 1003.103(a)(1) and (4) (2019) (discussing grounds for immediate suspension).

ORDER: The petition is granted, and the respondent is hereby suspended from the practice of law before the Board of Immigration Appeals, the Immigration Courts, and the DHS pending final disposition of this proceeding. 8 C.F.R. § 1003.103(a)(4).

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall promptly notify, in writing, any clients with cases currently pending before the Board of Immigration Appeals, the Immigration Courts, or the DHS that the respondent has been suspended from practicing before these bodies.

FURTHER ORDER: The respondent shall maintain records to evidence compliance with this order.

FURTHER ORDER: The contents of this notice shall be made available to the public, including at Immigration Courts and appropriate offices of the DHS.
