PROPOSED DECISION

This claim against the Government of Albania is based upon the alleged confiscation of real property located in the District of Shkoder.

Under section 4(a) of Title I of the International Claims Settlement Act of 1949 ("ICSA"), as amended, the Commission has jurisdiction to

receive, examine, adjudicate, and render final decisions with respect to claims of . . . nationals of the United States included within the terms of . . . any claims agreement on and after March 10, 1954, concluded between the Government of the United States and a foreign government (exclusive of governments against which the United States declared the existence of a state of war during World War II) . . . providing for the settlement and discharge of claims of . . . nationals of the United States against a foreign government, arising out of the nationalization or other taking of property, by the agreement of the Government of the United States to accept from that government a sum in en bloc settlement thereof.

22 U.S.C. 1623(a) (1994).

The Governments of the United States and Albania concluded an agreement for en bloc settlement of claims of United States nationals against Albania on March 10, 1995. *Agreement Between the Government of the United States and the Government of the Republic of Albania on the Settlement of Certain Outstanding Claims*, March 10, 1995 (entered into force April 18, 1995) ("Settlement Agreement"). Claims covered by the Settlement Agreement are

the claims of United States nationals (including natural and juridical persons) against Albania arising from any nationalization, expropriation, intervention, or other taking of, or measures affecting, property of nationals of the United States prior to the date of this agreement[.]

Settlement Agreement, Article 1(a).

The claimant in this case has stated that the property which is the subject of his claim was confiscated by the Albanian government in 1984. At the time of confiscation, according to the claimant, the property was owned by claimant, his mother, his uncle and his two brothers. The claimant has asserted that all owners, except his uncle, were United States nationals.

By letter dated March 22, 1996, the Commission requested that the claimant submit evidence of his United States nationality, a certificate of inheritance identifying the heirs to the property, evidence of his ownership of the property in question, and some evidence of the date and circumstances of

the alleged confiscation. On July 9, 1996, the Commission reiterated its request and informed claimant that if the requested information and evidence was not received within thirty days, the claim would be submitted for decision on the basis of the existing record. No evidence of probative value has been received.

Section 531.6(d) of the Commission's regulations provides:

The claimant shall be the moving party and shall have the burden of proof on all issues involved in the determination of his or her claim.

45 C.F.R. 531.6(d)(1995).

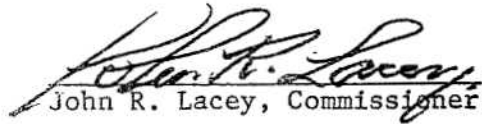
The Commission finds that the claimant has not met the burden of proof in that he has failed to submit supporting evidence to establish his United States nationality, his interest in the property at issue at the time of its asserted loss, and the date and circumstances of its confiscation. In the absence of such evidence, the Commission is unable to find that, at the time the property in question was assertedly taken by the Albanian government, it was owned by a national of the United States. Accordingly, it must conclude that claimant's claim is not compensable under the terms of the Settlement Agreement. The claim therefore must be and is hereby denied.

The Commission finds it unnecessary to make determinations with respect to other elements of this claim.
