



### THE WAVE IS COMING

### U.S. Senior Population 1900 – 2050\*

Abused seniors are **3X MORE LIKELY TO DIE**than non-abused seniors.



COGNITIVE DECLINE IS A
RISK FACTOR FOR elder
abuse, including FINANCIAL
EXPLOITATION.



Approximately 1 IN 10 SENIORS is abused EACH YEAR.



Abused seniors are MORE LIKELY to be PLACED IN NURSING HOMES than non-abused seniors.



Elder abuse is **DRAMATICALLY UNDERREPORTED**. Only **1 IN EVERY 23 CASES** gets reported to Adult Protective Services.

### **ELDER JUSTICE INITIATIVE**

The **mission** is to support and coordinate the Department of Justice's enforcement and programmatic efforts to combat elder abuse, neglect, and financial fraud and scams that target older adults.

### The Initiative does so by—

- Promoting justice for older adults.
- Helping older victims and their families.
- Enhancing state and local efforts through training and resources.
- Supporting research to improve elder abuse policy and practice.

### What DOJ Is Doing



### **Victim Services**

- Increasing access to civil legal services
- Assisting victims and their families to identify available resources, information and services



### Research & Capacity Building

- Funding critical research on elder abuse and financial exploitation
- Developing resources for rural service providers to effectively respond to elder abuse
- Developing resources to enhance collaboration with local faith communities



### Training & Raising Public Awareness

Supporting the development of training and resources for state and local

- Prosecutors
- Judges

• Civil legal aid attorneys

- Law enforcement
- Victim specialists



### Law Enforcement

- Investigating and prosecuting financial scams targeting or disproportionately impacting seniors
- Pursuing nursing homes that provide grossly substandard care to seniors
- Promoting greater federal, state and local coordination to combat elder abuse

### **ELDER JUSTICE TASK FORCES**

- Ten regional Elder Justice Task Forces launched in March 2016
  - Located in California, Georgia, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maryland, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, and Washington state.
- Goal: To enhance coordination and cooperation among interested stakeholders to pursue nursing homes that provide grossly substandard care and other forms of elder financial exploitation
- Focus areas include case work, training, and community outreach

ware was sentenced in Cedar Rapids to 33 months' imprisonment. A special assessment of \$300 was imposed, and she was ordered to make \$108,100 in restitution to her victims. Further, Ware forfeited \$40,000 that the government seized prior to Ware's Indictment. Ware must also serve a three-year term

"Whether abuse occurs in nursing homes or involves financial fraud schemes such as the one in which Ms. Ware participated, this office and the Elder Justice Task Force are committed to pursuing justice for the elderly," said United States Attorney Kevin Techau. "We will continue to work with our partners to hold accountable those who seek to financially exploit the most vulnerable in our society. I wish to thank the Postal Inspection Service and the FBI for their hard work investigating this case."

### Cedar Rapids Woman Sentenced to Federal Prison for Defrauding Elderly Couple Out of More than \$100,000

A woman who defrauded an elderly couple out of more than \$100,000 was sentenced yesterday to nearly three years in federal prison.

Tea Lynette Ware, 37, from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, received the prison term after a June 9, 2016 guilty plea to two counts of mail fraud and one count of using a fictitious name in mail fraud.

At the plea hearing, and in a plea agreement, Ware admitted that from about September 2015 through February 2016, Ware participated in a scheme to defraud an elderly Illinois woman during which the victim was falsely told she had won a lottery and was entitled to large sums of money. The victim was also told the winnings or funds could be claimed only if she first mailed Ware money for purported taxes or fees. In truth, no such winnings existed and the calls were designed only to steal from the victim and her husband, a resident of a long-term care facility with dementia. Like many senior citizens in the United States, the couple received unsolicited telephone calls; they even changed their telephone number to avoid unsolicited calls, but such calls nonetheless resumed after they changed their phone number.


