3. Computer Matching Programs

a) List of Matching Programs

1. Department of Education (ED) and Department of Justice (DOJ), Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Affairs (BJA):
This agreement matches data from applications for student financial assistance under Title IV of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA), with data from the BJA computer information system, Denial of Federal Benefits Clearinghouse System (DEBARS), to identify applicants who are ineligible for HEA benefits.
2. DOJ, Justice Management Division, Debt Collection Management Service (DCMS), and Department of Treasury, Internal Revenue Service (IRS):
The IRS provides DCMS with the mailing addresses of taxpayers so that DOJ may notify the delinquent debtor/taxpayer of enforcement action to collect or compromise debts owed to the United States.
3. DOJ, Bureau of Prisons (BOP) and Bureau of Veterans Affairs, Veterans Benefits Administration (VBA):
BOP will disclose information about individuals who are in federal prison so VBA can match with recipients of benefits.
4. DCMS and Housing and Urban Development (HUD):
DCMS provides judgment debtor records to HUD in the Credit Alert Verification Reporting System (CAIVRS). This system allows agencies and authorized financial institutions to pre-screen applicants for loans made or guaranteed by the federal government.

The DOJ DIB required a favorable cost-benefit ratio for all approved matches. The DOJ components implementing each matching program continue to consider the programs to be cost-effective.
