The Summit provided guidance from high level government officials as to the following issues regarding opioids: (1) nationwide enforcement actions-reducing the supply; (2) regional and local impact-harm caused and work to reduce demand; (3) threat briefings; (4) available resources; (5) successful investigation and prosecution models; and (6) community outreach. The remainder of the Summit was directed to all Opioid Coordinators and focused on advanced training for investigating and prosecuting opioid cases. This training falls into five broad categories: (1) cartels and gangs; (2) overdose deaths; (3) healthcare fraud and pill mills; (4) cyber and transnational criminals; and (5) victims' issues. Experts in these areas provided case studies and detailed guides on how to approach these types of cases and overcome the challenges prosecutors often face during the investigation and subsequent prosecution of opioid cases.
