

Discretionary vs. Pass -Through Federal Funds

Discretionary

- Legal aid applies direct to federal agency
- Compete nationally
- Federal agency selects awardees based on specific criteria and merit

Pass-Through

- Federal agency disburses \$ to state/local/tribal administrators
- Legal aid applies to administrators
- Administrators have more flexibility within federal constraints
- State/local/tribal governments*almost* certain to receive \$

Final Rule: Foster Care Legal Representation 89 FR 40400

- Title IV-E of the Social Security Act (42 U.S.C. 674)
- 45 C.F.R. 1356.60(c)
- Child Welfare Policy Manual 8.1B #30, 31, 32

Timeline

- September 28, 2023: ACF published an NPRM proposing allowable administrative costs for legal representation. <u>88 FR 66769</u>
- October 30, 2023: Tribal consultation. Report
- Public comments, 122 identified as legal providers
- May 10, 2024, ACF published a final rule for allowable administrative costs for representation 89 FR 40400 and issued <u>Information</u> <u>Memorandum</u> ACF-ACYF-CB-IM-24-05 announcing the final rule.



45 CFR 1356.60(c)(4)(i)

Legal representation in foster care proceedings provided by an attorney representing the title IV-E agency or any other public agency (including an Indian tribe) which has an agreement in effect under which the other agency has placement and care responsibility of a title IV-E eligible child pursuant to 472(a)(2)(B)(ii) of the Act.



45 CFR 1356.60(c)(4)(ii)

A title IV-E agency may claim administrative costs for independent legal representation provided by an attorney representing a child in title IV-E foster care, or a child who is a candidate for title IV-E foster care, the child's parent(s), the child's relative caregiver(s), and the child's Indian custodian(s) in foster care and other civil legal proceedings when such legal representation is found necessary by the Secretary to carry out the requirements in the title IV-E agency's title IV-E foster care plan.



45 CFR 1356.60(c)(4)(iii)

A title IV-E agency may claim legal representation provided by an attorney representing an Indian child's tribe as described by 25 USC 1903(5), or representation of an Indian child's tribe provided by a non-attorney when the Indian child's tribe participates or intervenes in any state court proceeding for the foster care placement or termination of parental rights of an Indian child who is in title IV-E foster care or is a candidate for title IV-E foster care.
