

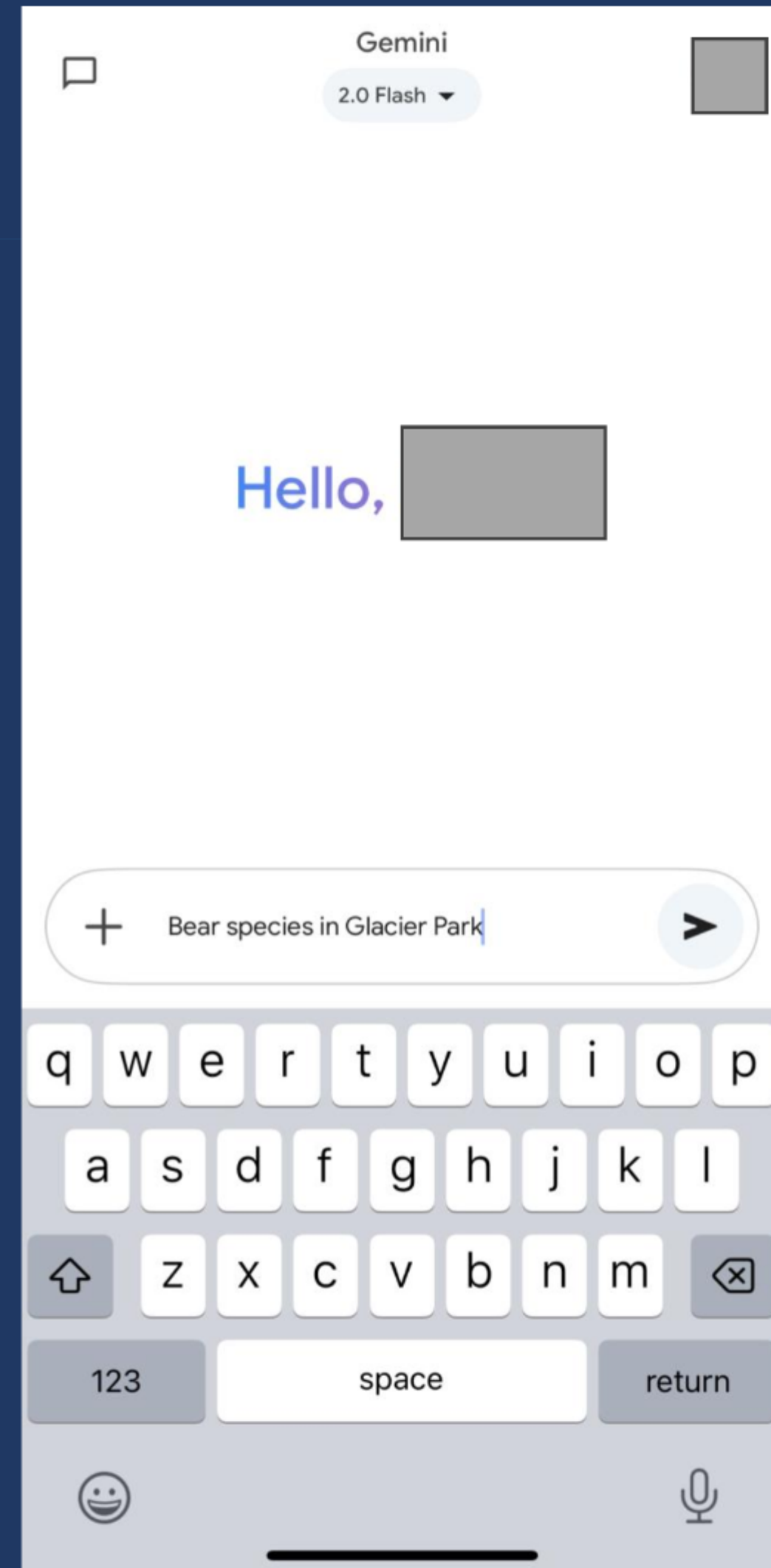
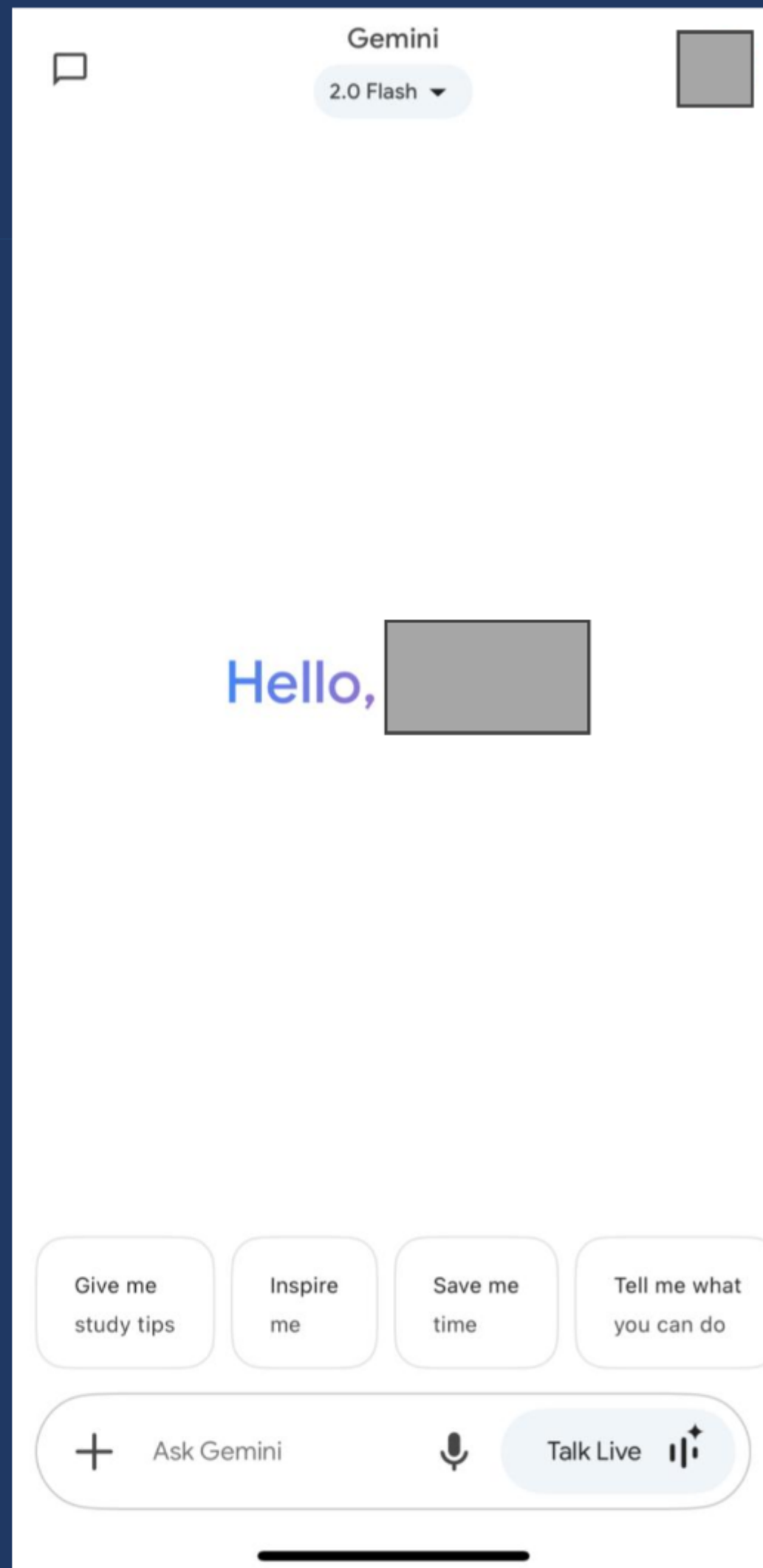

Bear species in Glacier Park

Glacier National Park is home to two species of bears:




- Grizzly bears (*Ursus arctos horribilis*), also known as brown bears.
- Black bears (*Ursus americanus*).

It's important to know that the color of a bear is not a reliable way to determine its species. Grizzly bears can range in color from blonde to black, and black bears can also be brown, blonde, or even a blue-gray color phase seen in Southeast Alaska called the glacier bear.



Here are some key characteristics to help distinguish between the two species:

Grizzly Bears:

- **Size:** Generally larger than black bears. Adult males can weigh 400 to 500 pounds on average, but can occasionally reach up to 661 pounds or more. They stand 3.5 to 4.5 feet tall at the shoulder on all fours and can be over 8 feet tall when standing on their

Grizzly Bears:

- **Size:** Generally larger than black bears. Adult males can weigh 400 to 500 pounds on average, but can occasionally reach up to 661 pounds or more. They stand 3.5 to 4.5 feet tall at the shoulder on all fours and can be over 8 feet tall when standing on their hind legs.
- **Shoulder Hump:** Have a distinct hump of muscle between their shoulders.
- **Facial Profile:** Their face appears "dished" or concave.
- **Ears:** Rounded.
- **Claws:** Longer (about 2-4 inches) and straighter.
- **Temperament:** Can be more aggressive than black bears, especially females with cubs.
- **Habitat:** Tend to dwell in more open terrain but can also be found in dense forests.

Black Bears:

- **Size:** Smaller than grizzlies. Adult males typically weigh between 180 and 250 pounds, sometimes up to 400 pounds. Females weigh between 120 and 180 pounds. They stand about 3 feet tall at the shoulder.
