NCHS CDC program

- Working to improve national mortality surveillance by ...
 - Promoting quality and consistency in death investigations
 - Facilitating collection, automation, and distribution of medicolegal death investigation data
 - Enhancing efficiency of current programs by coordinating efforts
 - Facilitating information sharing among medical death investigators and public health

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What information does CDC need from MECs?

- Information for prevention purposes including cause and circumstances of death, and risk and protective factors
- Potential emerging public heath and safety threats
- New science and technology in death investigation that may impact public health
- Seminars, reports, publications of interest

What information does CDC need to communicate to MECs?

- Alerts on emerging public health threats
- Resources on death investigation (e.g., SUID)
- Services offered (e.g., detection of infectious diseases)
- Guidance on filling out death certificates
- Seminars, reports, publications of interest
- Continuing medical education opportunities
- Funding opportunities

Current pathways used by CDC to communicate with MECs

- MDI Professional associations
- Conferences/meetings
- Conference calls
- Personal communication
- Through state partners
 - More difficult due to multiple departments within governments
 - State vs. county

Routes of communication



Health Alert Network

- Primary method of sharing cleared information about urgent public health incidents
- Collaboration with between CDC and federal, state, local partners to develop protocols and relationships to will ensure robust interoperable platform for the rapid distribution of public health information

Routes of communication

Clinician Outreach and Communication Activity (COCA)

- Provides timely, accurate information to clinicians related to emergency preparedness and response and emerging public health threats
- Fosters partnerships with national clinician organizations to strengthen information-sharing networks before, during, and after a public health emergency

Routes of communication

State vital records registrars

- Communicate with medical examiners and coroners in their jurisdiction on issues related to death certification
- CDC's NCHS has email contacts for state and local vital records registrars who process death certificates as part of their duties

Why existing routes of communication aren't sufficient

- Each of our communication pathways are for very specific purposes with controlled dissemination
- None has primary focus of ME/C
- No communication mechanism for distributing non-critical materials such as training and funding announcements

Summary

- Proposed network would supplement our current communication pathways and fill a void
- CDC needs to communicate with medical examiners and coroners for public health and safety
