Certified Latent Print Examiner

• The Latent Print certification program is the oldest of the IAI's certification programs. It is geared toward examiners who process evidence and crime scenes for friction ridge impressions and compare those impressions to known exemplars or other recovered impressions.

Certified Footwear Examiner

 Certification as a Footwear Examiner is for those who specialize in the collection of footwear specimens from crime scenes or evidence and comparing them to known exemplars.

Certified Forensic Photographer

 Applicants for the Forensic Photography certification must demonstrate a proficiency in: crime scene photography; evidence photography; chemical based and digital photography; lighting techniques; special filters; scaling; digital editing and image enhancement; and other aspects

Tenprint Certification Program

 For individuals who deal with the creation, management and comparison of fingerprint records used to maintain criminal history records and populate databases used by automated fingerprint identification systems and other biometric identification systems.

- The Forensic Art Certification program offers multiple certifications which are not levels as with the crime scene certification program. These are endorsements which deal with the specific aspect of forensic art in which the applicant wishes to certify. These endorsements are:
 - Composite Imaging
 - Facial Reconstruction
 - Age Enhancement.

Certified Bloodstain Pattern Examiner

 Deal with the analysis and interpretation of bloodstain evidence found at crime scenes and on evidence. Some of the analysis is based on visual pattern recognition and some involves mathematical calculations based on measurements taken of individual bloodstains.

- The Forensic Video Certification is the IAI's newest program.
 - It is designed for those who are proficient at using the various tools and technologies associated with the examination of video captures.

Accreditation

From 2010 through March of 2016, seven of the IAI programs were accredited by the Forensic Specialties Accreditation Board.

However, due to inconsistencies in the interpretation and application of FSAB standards and the IAI's expansion of its non-US divisions, the IAI Board of Directors decided at its January 2016 meeting to abandon its participation with FSAB and redirect resources toward ISO17024 accreditation. IAI Certification Boards are currently conducting a gap analysis and making recommendations for compliance. Targets: Application for accreditation – late 2016. Accreditation late 2017, early 2018.
