MICHAEL 'THE SITUATION' SORRENTINO, MARC SORRENTINO SENTENCED TO FEDERAL PRISON ON TAX CHARGES

WASHINGTON - Television personality Michael "The Situation" Sorrentino was sentenced to eight months in prison, and his brother, Marc Sorrentino, was sentenced to 24 months in prison for violating federal tax laws. Principal Deputy

Assistant Attorney General Richard E. Zuckerman of the U.S. Department of Justice's Tax Division, U.S. Attorney Craig Carpenito for District of New Jersey, and IRS Special Agent in Charge John R. Tafur made the announcement.

Tax evasion charges were originally brought against Michael Sorrentino, 37, and his brother, Marc Sorrentino, 39, in September 2014, and a superseding indictment returned in April 2017 added additional charges. Michael previously pleaded guilty before U.S. District Judge Susan D. Wigenton to Count 13 of a superseding indictment, which charged him with tax evasion. Marc pleaded guilty to Count 5, which charged him with aiding in the preparation of a false and fraudulent tax return. Judge Wigenton imposed the sentences today in Newark federal court.

"Lying to and defrauding the federal government is a very serious crime, regardless of a defendant's celebrity status," said Principal Deputy Assistant Attorney General Zuckerman. "The Sorrentino brothers chose to use Michael's fame to benefit themselves at the expense of the American taxpayer, and with the help of our federal partners, they were held accountable."

"The law requires all Americans to pay our fair share of taxes. These defendants deliberately flouted this requirement, acting as though fame and celebrity status placed them above the law. They are not," said U.S. Attorney Carpenito. Tax fraud is as serious as any other form of theft from the government, and the sentences imposed today should make that abundantly clear."

"Tax crimes, plain and simple, are an outright theft from the hardworking American public," stated John R. Tafur, Special Agent in Charge, IRS Criminal Investigation, Newark Field Office. "The courts recognize the severity of these crimes and now Michael and Marc Sorrentino are convicted felons with prison sentences to serve for intentionally disregarding their tax obligations to our country."

According to documents filed in this case and statements made in court, Michael Sorrentino was a reality television personality who gained fame on "The Jersey Shore," which first appeared on the MTV network. He and his brother, Marc, created businesses, such as MPS Entertainment LLC and Situation Nation Inc., to take advantage of Michael's celebrity status.

Michael Sorrentino admitted that in tax year 2011, he earned taxable income, including some that was paid in cash, and that he took certain actions to conceal some of his income to avoid paying the full amount of taxes he owed. He made cash deposits into bank accounts in amounts less than \$10,000 each so that these deposits would not come to the attention of the IRS.

Marc Sorrentino admitted that during tax years 2010, 2011 and 2012, he earned taxable income and that he assisted his accountants in preparing his personal tax return for those years, willfully providing them with false information. His personal tax returns under-reported his total income and taxable income.

In addition to the terms of imprisonment, Judge Wigenton ordered Michael Sorrentino to serve two years of supervised release and pay \$123,913 in restitution and a criminal fine of \$10,000. Marc Sorrentino was ordered to serve one year of supervised release and pay a criminal fine of \$7,500.

Principal Deputy Attorney General Zuckerman and U.S. Attorney Carpenito credited special agents of the IRS, under the direction of Special Agent in Charge Tafur, with the investigation leading to today's sentencings.

The government is represented by Trial Attorneys Yael T. Epstein and Jeffrey B. Bender of the Tax Division of the U.S. Department of Justice and Assistant U.S. Attorney Jonathan W. Romankow of the U.S. Attorney's Office Criminal Division in Newark.

Remarks of Attorney General Jeff Sessions at the Genesee Theater Waukegan, Illinois September 19, 2018

Thank you, John (Lausch) for that generous introduction and thank you for your dozen years of service to the Department of Justice. John was once the captain of the Harvard football team and now he's the captain of an office that serves 9 million people.

On behalf of President Donald Trump— I want to thank your staff and all of the federal officers who are here with us today. And while we are inexpressibly proud of our justice team—FBI, DEA, ATF, the Marshals Service—we also fully appreciate the fact that 85 percent of the law enforcement officers in this country serve at the state and local levels. It is simple arithmetic that we cannot succeed without you.

And so I want to thank:

- Waukegan Police Chief Wayne Walles (WALLACE) and
- State's Attorney Mike Nerheim (Nearhime)

Thank you also to the Mid-States Organized Crime Information Center.

I want to commend all of the 146 officers from 51 agencies who are receiving VALOR training today. The day I was sworn in as Attorney General President Trump ordered me to enhance officer safety and to "back the blue." That's exactly what we are doing.

It is an honor to be back in the Chicago area and to meet with law officers on the front lines in the fight against violent crime.

This morning, I met with police department commanders that explained what they are putting in place to curb the violence here and I met with community members who are affected every day.

Mothers who's sons were gunned down.

Students from a local high school who are being exposed to unspeakable violence every day.

So I am here to tell you this is urgent. The people in these neighborhoods are entitled to the same safety and security as the people living in the mansions and gated communities on the north shore.

They deserve the same protection from this city's leadership. They deserve to go to sleep at night without the fear of a stray bullet hitting coming through the wall as their children sleep.

Because you can bet these trends wouldn't be accepted if it were happening in Winnetka or Lincoln Park. But we have children being gunned down every day and it is our duty to do everything in our power to stop it.

Accepting this status quo of death and crime because it's confined to a few neighborhoods is morally bankrupt.

It's beneath the honor of our great nation and this storied city. We don't have to capitulate to the violence.

And that is why I am here today. Your work has never been easy. But in recent years you have faced obstacles that have made your jobs more difficult and more dangerous than they have to be.

Colossal mistakes have been made by politicians and leaders that have had particular catastrophic consequences for the people of cities like Chicago, Baltimore, and St. Louis.

From 1991 to 2014, we saw an historic nationwide decline in violent crime.

Murder dropped by half. Violent crime overall dropped by half. So did aggravated assault.

Rape decreased by more than a third, and robbery plummeted by nearly two-thirds.

This was an incalculable benefit to America.

But nationally in the last two years of the previous administration, the trends ominously reversed.

From 2014 to 2016, the violent crime rate went up by nearly seven percent. Assaults and rape went up nearly 10 percent.

Murder shot up by more than 20 percent.

Sadly, this was a nationwide phenomenon. But Chicago is, without a doubt, the most dramatic example.

In 2014, the police here came under intense criticism. A year later, the ACLU issued a report on "Stop and Frisk in Chicago" and threatened the City of Chicago with a lawsuit—and the politicians went into a retreat.

In the aftermath, the city's leadership rushed into an irresponsible consent decree with the radical activists and the ACLU.

After the consent decree became effective on January 1, 2016, policing went down; crime went up—and as a result, hundreds of Chicagoans are now dead—almost all of them African-American or Latino.

Chicago saw the biggest single-year increase in the murder rate since we've had reliable statistics—which is over 60 years.

765 people were killed in Chicago, the most the city had seen in 20 years.

Over the previous decade before the consent decree, the average was 454. That means that 311 Chicagoans—friends, neighbors, moms, dads—were killed in 2016 who might still be alive if the murder rate had stayed at the 10-year average.

More people were murdered in Chicago in 2016 than in New York and Los Angeles combined—even though Chicago has one-fifth of the population of those two cities.

The situation was so bad that nearly a quarter of the nationwide increase in homicide that year happened in Chicago alone.

This did not need to happen. In 2015 and 2016, Chicago had the same police on patrol and the same prosecutors in court, but dramatically different results.

So what happened?

According to a study by two professors from the University of Utah—one of whom is a former federal judge—the consent decree mandated a major change in Chicago's community-based policing—including *Terry* stops—that allowed this bloodshed to take place.

The professors found that the increased crime cost a staggering \$1.5 billion and noted that 78 percent of its victims were African-American and 16 percent were Latino. Ninety-four percent of the victims were minorities.

The ACLU consent decree required police officers to submit a detailed report to the ACLU, a former federal judge, and a publicly available database after every single *Terry* stop.

John's predecessor as United States Attorney, Zachary Fardon, said in an open letter to the City that the ACLU agreement "[told] cops if you go talk to those kids on the corner, you're going to have to take 40 minutes to fill out a form, and you're going to have to give them a receipt with your badge number on it."

And he noted that as a result, by January 2016, "the city was on fire" because "the rule of law, law enforcement, had been delegitimized." That is a devastating analysis.

Reporting by the Chicago Sun Times confirms this, stating in January 2016, that Chicago officers say that "they fear getting in trouble for stops later deemed to be illegal and the new [required forms] take too much time to complete."

After the consent decree pushed by the ACLU went into effect in 2016, these stops declined by 75 percent. Chicago police made 24 percent fewer arrests in 2016 than they made in 2015, and about half as many arrests as they made in 2011.

To any police officer or sheriff's deputy on the beat, the dangers created were immediately obvious.

But tragically, it was not obvious to the politicians, the media, or the activists.

As former U.S. Attorney Fardon put it, "cops stopped making stops and kids started shooting more."

The professors who studied Chicago call it "the ACLU effect." Policing went down and crime went up.

There's a clear lesson here: if you want more shootings and more death, then listen to the ACLU, Black Lives Matter, or Antifa. If you want public safety, then listen to the police professionals who have been studying this for 35 years.

Chicago's officers are still on these streets every day doing honorable, respectable work on behalf of the community.
Chicago hired 1,100 more police officers in 2017. That is a positive step.

But the disastrous consent decree is still in effect.

And while the police here are doing everything in their power to reverse these trends, their hands still remain tied. We've seen some important progress thanks to your efforts—its encouraging—but the murders in 2017 remained at historic highs—still 35 percent higher than 2015.

Hundreds more people gunned down for another year. And yet, there's been recent discussion of even more restrictions. Clearly that is not the answer. We need to get back to community based policing not further limit the very tactics that have the best chance to reduce crime and violence. This is why—sadly—Chicago has become a cautionary tale for leaders across America.

But Chicago is not alone. Good and decent people of other cities have also suffered from political leadership forcing their police departments to restrict proactive community policing.

One of the most tragic examples is Baltimore.

After the death of Freddie Gray, violence and riots followed.

City leadership signed a consent decree with the ACLU. The results were the same as in Chicago.

From 2014 to 2017, the average number of field interviews conducted by police in Baltimore fell by 70 percent.

Arrests fell dramatically and arrests on outstanding warrants dropped by half.

Meanwhile, homicides in Baltimore increased by 62.5 percent. Rape more than tripled. Car theft and aggravated assault went up by third.

St. Louis has gone through a similar ordeal.

In St. Louis, after the fatal shooting of Michael Brown in 2014 in nearby Ferguson, there were riots and police pulled back from the community.

In 2015—the year after the shooting—St. Louis became the murder capital of the United States.

In 2016, it had a murder rate more than 10 times the national average and double the murder rate of Chicago.

But it doesn't have to be this way. Smart law enforcement policies can bring down crime rates and start a virtuous cycle of safety and prosperity.

Think about the example of New York City.

In 1990, there were 2,605 murders in New York City. Last year there were 292. Thanks to the historic work of Bill Bratton and Rudy Giuliani, the burglaries are down by nearly two-thirds and robberies have been cut in half since 2000. Results like these don't happen by accident. This was the work of smart and diligent policing.

New York targets criminals whom they refer to as Alpha Criminals—ones who commit a disproportionate amount of violent crime and recruit others to join their enterprises.

NYPD monitors crime rates block by block.

Los Angeles has also shown how to reduce crime. Violent crime fell by more than 70 percent from the 1980s to 2015.

From 2005 to 2013, the murder rate fell by nearly half.

The proof is in. It can no longer be denied: disrespect and lack of support for police officers has real world consequences.

Leaders must understand and affirm the important and dangerous work of our officers. Failure to support our professionals undermines the pro-active policing that has been shown to save lives.

President Trump is a lifelong New Yorker. He saw how a surge of violence almost lost that great city.

And he saw Rudy Giuliani and Bill Bratton save his hometown and the prosperity that has followed.

Under his strong leadership, we are respecting police again and enforcing our laws.

Based on my experience meeting with officers like you across the country, I believe that morale has already improved under President Trump. I can feel the difference.

Last summer, I deployed more ATF agents and prosecutors to Chicago, and I prioritized prosecutions to focus on reducing violent crime. That will help.

We believe that law enforcement is a noble profession and one that demands respect.

Of course, the Department of Justice will continue to hold accountable any officer who violates the law and undermines the good work of our police.

But we will not malign entire police departments. We will not try to micromanage their daily work all the way from Washington. We will encourage proven, constitutional, and proactive policing that departments must do to keep all Americans safe—and especially our minority communities who are by far the most victimized by crime.

They are crying out for safety and they are right to do so.

We will not participate in anything that would give comfort to criminals or radicals who preach hostility rather than respect for police.

The work ahead of you is difficult, but it is not hopeless. It may take some time, but Chicago can choose a better future.

Nothing is more important to Chicago than restoring safety.

Chicago cannot accept an image as a violent, crime-ridden city. If it does, then it continues down the vicious cycle of crime, poverty, and low growth. Chicago's population has declined for three years in a row.

In 2016, it was the only one of our 10 biggest cities to have a shrinking population.

And so I would urge that the city take on a great mission to recognize the mistakes of the past and develop a plan for the future. If anybody thinks that it can't be done, then look at New York City and Los Angeles. It can be done. But Chicago must listen to the police professionals and support them financially and morally.

And so, in our joint effort to protect the good people of this city and this country, you can be certain about this: we have your backs, and you have our thanks.

Summary of Report:

- More than half (58 percent) of all federal arrests in fiscal year (FY) 2016 took place in the five federal
 judicial districts along the U.S.-Mexico border, up from 45 percent in FY 2006, the Bureau of Justice
 Statistics announced today. These five districts also accounted for 52 percent of all federal suspects
 investigated and 41 percent of all offenders who were sentenced to federal prison in FY 2016.
- In 2016, nearly 2 in 3 (64 percent) suspects arrested in the five border districts were disposed as misdemeanants, compared to fewer than 1 in 10 (8.6 percent) suspects in the remaining federal districts. The number of arrestees in border districts has risen sharply since 2006 with the adoption of the zero-tolerance prosecutorial initiative. Known as Operation Streamline, offenders caught making their first illegal entry face criminal charges, which are typically disposed of by U.S. magistrates as misdemeanors.
- Excluding defendants in magistrate courts, 41 percent of defendants charged in U.S. district courts in FY 2016 were not U.S. citizens: 30 percent were Mexican citizens, 5 percent were from Central America and 6 percent were citizens of other foreign nations. During the same time, 59 percent of defendants charged in U.S. district courts were U.S. citizens, 5 percent were legal aliens and 36 percent were illegal aliens.
- These findings are based on data from BJS's Federal Justice Statistics Program (FJSP) which collects, standardizes and reports on administrative data received from six federal justice agencies: the U.S. Marshals Service, Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys, Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts, U.S. Sentencing Commission and Federal Bureau of Prisons.
- From FY 2015 to 2016, the total number of federal arrests decreased by 1.3 percent, from 153,478 to 151,460 arrests. Similarly, the number of defendants sentenced to federal prison decreased by 3 percent, from 56,018 to 54,274 prisoners.
- Immigration violations (45 percent) were the most common federal arrest offense in FY 2016, followed by drug offenses and supervision violations (16 percent each). From FY 2015 to 2016, arrests for weapons offenses increased by 8 percent and supervision violations increased by 6 percent. Arrests declined for property offenses by 11 percent, immigration violations by 4 percent and drug offenses by less than 1 percent.
- In FY 2016, the DEA made 29,486 drug arrests, down from 31,593 in FY 2015. The agency made 7,479 drug arrests for heroin or opioid offenses, which made up 25 percent of all drug arrests during the year. From FY 2006 to 2016, arrests for heroin or other opioids increased 154 percent. During the period, the yearly average rate of arrests for opioids increased the most of any drug estages. (13 percent)

followed by heroin (up 10 percent per year). During the period, the average yearly arrests for crack cocaine declined the most (11 percent), followed by powder cocaine (down by 4 percent per year).

Most defendants adjudicated in U.S. district court (91 percent) in FY 2016 were convicted. More than 9 in 10 defendants charged with immigration (98 percent), weapons (94 percent), drug (92 percent) and violent (91 percent) offenses were convicted. Defendants adjudicated in the five federal judicial districts along the U.S.-Mexico border had a higher conviction rate (96 percent) than defendants in non-border districts (88 percent).



Definitions of major offense categories

Violent—Includes murder, non-negligent or negligent manslaughter, aggravated or simple assault, sex abuse, robbery, kidnapping, and threats against the president.

Property—Includes fraudulent and other types of property offenses.

Fraudulent property—Includes embezzlement, fraud (including tax fraud), forgery, and counterfeiting.

Other property—Includes burglary, larceny, motor-vehicle theft, arson, transportation of stolen property, and other property offenses, such as destruction of property and trespassing.

Drug—Includes the manufacture, import, export, distribution, or dispensing of a controlled substance (or a counterfeit substance), or the possession of a controlled substance (or a counterfeit substance) with intent to manufacture or distribute.

Public order—Includes regulatory and other types of offenses.

Regulatory public order—Includes violation of agriculture, antitrust, labor, food and drug, motor carrier, and other federal regulations.

Other public order—Includes non-regulatory violations concerning tax law (tax fraud), bribery, perjury, national defense, escape, racketeering and extortion, gambling, liquor, mailing or transporting obscene materials, traffic, migratory birds, conspiracy, aiding and abetting, jurisdiction, and other offenses.

Weapons—Includes violations of any of the provisions of 18 U.S.C. §§ 922-923 concerning the manufacturing, importing, possessing, receiving, and licensing of firearms and ammunition.

Immigration—Includes offenses involving illegal entrance into the United States, illegally reentering after being deported, willfully failing to leave when so ordered, or bringing in or harboring any aliens not admitted by an immigration officer.

Supervision violations—Includes violation of bail, violation of pre-trial or post-sentencing supervision in the community (probation), and failure to appear.

supervision (table 1). This represents a decrease from fiscal year-end 2015, when 392,212 persons were under federal correctional control (60% in secure confinement and 40% on supervision in the community).

Arrest and booking

In 2016, federal law enforcement agencies made 151,460 arrests for a federal offense

Nearly 8 in 10 (77%, or 115,881) federal arrests in 2016 were for immigration, drug, or supervision violations.

In 2016, immigration (45%) was the most common federal arrest offense, followed by drug offenses and supervision violations (16% each) (table 2).

Arrests for violations of federal law decreased by 1% from 2015 to 2016. Property arrests declined by 11% over the year. Immigration (4%) and drug (less than 1%) arrests also declined from 2015 to 2016. However, there was an 8% increase in the number of suspects arrested for weapons offenses from 2015 to 2016. Supervision violations also increased 6% during the year.

More than half of arrests in 2016 were in the five federal judicial districts along the U.S.-Mexico border


The five federal judicial districts along the U.S.-Mexico border (California Southern, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas Western, and Texas Southern) accounted for 58% of all federal arrests in 2016, up from 45% in 2006 (see *Federal Justice Statistics*, 2010, NCJ 239913, BJS web, December 2013) (map 1). Federal law enforcement agencies made the most arrests in the Texas Southern federal judicial district (29,759), followed by Texas Western (24,210) and Arizona (21,702).

The U.S. district court in Tucson, Arizona, processed the most federal arrests (16,799). The U.S. district court in Laredo, Texas (Texas Southern), processed the second most arrests in 2016 (14,475). Immigration offenses were the most common arrests in each of the five districts along the U.S.-Mexico border in 2016.

In 2016, nearly 2 in 3 (64%) suspects arrested in the five districts were disposed as misdemeanants by U.S. magistrates (see table 4). In contrast, fewer than 1 in 10 (8.6%) federal arrestees in the remaining districts were disposed as misdemeanants. Growth in the proportion of federal arrestees in the five districts from 2006 to 2016 is the result of increased criminal enforcement of immigration. Under *Operation Streamline*, a federal zero-tolerance prosecutorial initiative which began in 2005, offenders caught making their first illegal entry are charged with a misdemeanor.²

Among those non-U.S.-Mexico-border districts that had the most arrests, the greatest numbers of arrests were for drug offenses (New York Southern, Texas Northern, and Florida Middle), property offenses (Florida Southern), and supervision violations (District of Columbia).



Arrests by the Drug Enforcement Administration

Created in 1973, the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) enforces the controlled-substances laws and regulations of the United States. This includes investigating major drug offenders at the national and international levels. The DEA coordinates with foreign governments and federal, state, local, and tribal agencies. It has 220 offices in the United States and 91 offices in 70 countries (see https://www.dea.gov/docs/DEAFactSheet AUG2017.pdf).³

³The phrase "suspects arrested by the DEA" is used to describe arrests where each arrest for an individual suspect is counted separately. Individual suspects can be arrested by the DEA more than once in one year. DEA data do not distinguish between arrests that are referred for either state or federal prosecution.



The DEA reported 29,486 drug arrests in 2016, down from 31,593 in 2015. From 2006 to 2016, the annual average number of arrests by the DEA for other opioids (up 13% per year) increased the most of any drug category, followed by arrests for heroin (up 10%), and methamphetamine (up 4%) (figures 2 and 3). During the same period, arrests for crack cocaine declined by an annual average of 11%, arrests for powder cocaine declined by 4%, and arrests for marijuana declined by 3%.

During 2016, the DEA made 7,479 drug arrests for heroin or opioid offenses, which represented 25% of the total drug arrests (29,486). This was a 154% increase in arrests made by the DEA for heroin and other opioids in 2006.

Investigation and prosecution

Investigations are most commonly referred to a U.S. attorney by a federal law enforcement agency, but are also referred by a state or local investigative agency. U.S. attorneys determine which cases they will prosecute and establish policies and priorities within their federal judicial districts. They use a variety of factors, such as available resources and priorities of the Department of Justice (DOJ) and state and local law enforcement.

In 2016, the majority of suspects were referred by the Department of Homeland Security

Ninety-three U.S. attorneys serve as the chief federal law enforcement officer within their respective districts.⁴ Department of Homeland Security (DHS) agencies referred 53% of all suspects in matters received by U.S. attorneys in 2016, down from 58% in 2014 and 54% in 2015 (table 3).⁵ Law enforcement agencies within DOJ referred 30% of suspects in matters referred to U.S. attorneys in 2016, compared to 28% in 2015 and 25% in 2014. In 2016, the Department of the Treasury referred 1% of all suspects, down from 2% in 2006.

After criminal investigations are initiated and criminal suspects are referred to them, U.S. attorneys may file charges against defendants in a U.S. district court, or they may file cases before U.S. magistrates, who have the authority to adjudicate misdemeanor offenses (18 U.S.C. § 3401).

46% of suspects in matters concluded in 2016 were prosecuted in U.S. district court

Suspects charged with weapons (74%) and drug (71%) offenses had the highest prosecution rates in 2016, followed by those with violent (59%), property (51%), and public-order (44%) offenses (table 4). Thirty-seven

percent of matters concluded by U.S. attorneys in 2016 were disposed of by U.S. magistrates. Offenses that were most likely to be disposed of by U.S. magistrates included immigration (69%) and public-order (17%) offenses.

Prosecutors may also decide to decline to prosecute a matter. The decision to decline a federal prosecution is based on a number of factors, including the lack of a prosecutable offense, an alternative resolution, or case- and suspect-related reasons. Suspects involved in regulatory offenses were most likely to have their matter declined for prosecution (51%), followed by fraud (43%) and other public-order offenses (37%).

Case filing and adjudication

The majority of defendants charged in U.S. district courts in 2016 were of Hispanic origin

Defendants of Hispanic origin made up more than half (56%) of defendants charged in U.S. federal district courts. Nearly two-thirds (64%) of defendants charged were ages 25 to 44. Defendants age 50 or older made up 14% of defendants charged. The youngest (age 19 or younger) and oldest (age 65 or older) defendants together made up 3% of defendants charged in 2016 (table 5). In FY 2016, 41% of defendants charged in U.S. district courts were not U.S. citizens. Mexican citizens made up 30% of all defendants charged in federal district court and 74% of non-U.S. citizens charged.

Most defendants charged in U.S. federal district court in 2016 were male

In 2016, 54,546 (86%) male and 8,843 (14%) female defendants were charged in U.S. federal district court. Most males charged were of Hispanic origin (58%), followed by black (20%) and white (19%) males. Both males and females had a median age of 35. Most females charged were of Hispanic origin (43%), followed by white (32%) and black (19%) females.

Males charged were split between U.S. (56%) and non-U.S. (44%) citizens. Eighty percent of females charged were U.S. citizens, and 20% were non-U.S. citizens. Among males, the most common countries or regions of citizenship apart from the United States included Mexico (33%), Central America (6%), the Caribbean (2%), and South America (2%). Among females, the most common countries or regions included Mexico (14%), Central America (2%), the Caribbean (1%), and South America (1%).

9 in 10 defendants adjudicated in U.S. district court in 2016 were convicted

Of the 76,639 defendants whose cases were terminated in U.S. district courts in 2016, 91% were convicted (table 6). More than 9 in 10 defendants charged with immigration (98%), weapons (94%), drug (92%), property (92%), and violent (91%) offenses were convicted. In 2016, 89% of defendants were convicted following a guilty plea, and 2% of convicted defendants received a bench or jury trial. Defendants adjudicated in the five federal judicial districts along the U.S.-Mexico border had a higher conviction rate (96%) than defendants in non-border districts (88%).

Non-conviction rates among major offenses ranged from 3% (immigration) to 14% (regulatory offenses). Most non-convictions were cases that were dismissed or were otherwise ended by the judge or prosecutor. In 2016, dismissals (427 days), non-conviction after trial (274 days), and guilty pleas (213 days) took less time to process from case filing to disposition than trials ending in conviction (547 days).

Sentencing

3 in 4 convicted defendants were sentenced to prison in 2016

Of the 69,487 defendants convicted in U.S. district court in 2016, more than three-quarters (78%) were sentenced to prison (table 7). The remainder received sentences of probation only (10%), fine only (2%), or a suspended sentence (9%). Felons with the highest likelihood of receiving a prison term were those convicted of violent (93%), weapons (92%), and drug (89%) offenses. More than a third (36%) of persons convicted of a misdemeanor received a prison sentence in 2016.

Defendants sentenced to prison in 2016 received a median prison sentence of 30 months

Offenders sentenced for felony violent offenses received a median prison sentence of 81 months, followed by felony drug (60 months) and felony weapons offenses (51 months). Offenders sentenced for felony immigration offenses received a median sentence of 12 months. Defendants convicted and sentenced to prison in the five southwest-border districts received a median sentence of 15 months, compared to a median of 51 months in other districts. This was due primarily to the higher percentage of immigration cases in the southwest districts.

In 2016, the median probation sentence for each type of felony offense was 36 months, with the exception of 37 months for violent offenses. Probation sentences for misdemeanors had a median length of 12 months.



Federal prison

Drug offenders made up nearly half of prisoners in federal prison at fiscal year-end 2016

Prisoners with a drug offense as their most serious commitment offense made up 48% of the Federal Bureau of Prisons population in 2016, down from 55% in 2006 (figure 4). Weapons offenders increased from 14% in 2006 to 17% in 2016. Violent offenders decreased from 7% in 2006 to 6% in 2016, and immigration offenders decreased from 12% in 2006 to 9% in 2016.



1 in 5 federal prisoners at fiscal year-end 2016 had been committed by federal courts in four judicial districts

At fiscal year-end 2016, a fifth (20%) of prisoners in federal prison were committed from four districts: Texas Southern (11,686), Texas Western (9,010), Arizona (6,400), and Florida Southern (6,197) (map 2). Three states (Texas, California, and Florida) committed 31% of prisoners in federal prison at fiscal year-end 2016.



The type of commitment offense varied by race and Hispanic origin of federal prisoners at year-end 2016

Drug offenses were the most common commitment offense for Hispanic, black, and white federal prisoners at year-end 2016. Hispanic prisoners made up the greatest number of drug (31,468) and immigration (14,754) commitment offenses (figure 5). Black prisoners had the

largest number of weapons (16,409) and violent (3,714) offenses. White defendants made up the largest number of public-order (14,255) offenses, the second-largest number of weapons (6,972) offenses, and the third-largest number of drug (17,624) offenses. The most common offenses for American Indians/Alaskan Natives included violent (2,014), drug (542), and weapons offenses (412).

The number of prisoners age 65 or older more than doubled from 2006 to 2016

The median age of prisoners was 40 years in 2016, compared to 39 in 2006 (table 8). The number of prisoners age 65 or older more than doubled, from 2,498

prisoners in 2006 to 5,028 in 2016. Offenders age 60 or older made up about 6% of the total prison population in 2016, compared to 4% in 2006.

Males accounted for 93% of BOP prisoners in 2016

Males made up 93% of federal prisoners in 2016, and females accounted for 7%. The average annual rate of growth from 2006 to 2016 was similar for males and females (up less than 1%). In 2016, 35% of the federal prison population was black, 34% was Hispanic, and 28% was white. American Indians and Alaska Natives (2%) and Asians (1%) made up the remainder of the prison population. American Indians and Alaska Natives had the greatest average annual increase from 2006 to 2016 (up 2%).

In 2016, more than 1 in 5 federally sentenced prisoners in the BOP were non-U.S. citizens

The proportion of non-U.S. citizens in federal prison decreased from 27% in 2006 to 22% in 2016. In 2016, 15% of federally sentenced prisoners were citizens of Mexico, followed by countries in the Caribbean (2%), Central America (2%), and South America (1%). Prisoners with citizenship in a Central American country increased by an average of 4% annually from 2006 to 2016, while prisoners who were citizens of Caribbean and South American countries declined by an annual average of 5%.

Federal supervision in the community

The U.S. Probation and Pretrial Services, a component of the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts, oversees the supervision of federal offenders in the community. Federal probation officers monitor offender compliance to court-ordered conditions of supervision. This section includes defendants sentenced to a term of probation (with no prison time served) and defendants sentenced to a term of supervision (to be served upon release from prison). Defendants under pre-trial supervision are not included in this section.


Most (87%) offenders were under federal supervision following release from prison

Eighty-seven percent of offenders under federal community supervision in 2016 received one of two forms of supervision following release from prison: supervised release (115,843) or parole (1,128) (table 9). The remainder (17,938) were on probation supervision, a sentence to a term of supervision in the community. Of the 134,909 offenders under federal supervision at fiscal year-end 2016, 83% were male and 17% were female.

Black (47,168) and white (46,198) offenders made up 71% of persons under federal supervision in the community at fiscal year-end 2016. The median age was the same for offenders on supervised release or probation (age 41) and higher for persons on parole supervision (age 54). Seven percent of persons under supervised release in the community in 2016 were non-U.S. citizens.

The number of persons on supervision in the community increased from 113,263 in 2006 to 134,909 in 2016. Drug offenders made up a growing share of persons under federal supervision in the community, from 45% in 2006 to 49% in 2016 (figure 6). The percentage of property fraud offenders under supervision decreased from 21% in 2006 to 16% in 2016. Weapons offenders increased from 10% in 2006 to 13% in 2016.

Methodology

This report uses data from the Federal Justice Statistics Program (FJSP), a collection from the Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS). The FJSP receives administrative data files from six federal criminal justice agencies. Data represent the federal criminal case processing stages from arrest to imprisonment. BJS standardizes this information to maximize comparability across and within agencies over time. This includes—

- counting each appearance of an individual in the data during a fiscal year (October 1 through September 30), whether it be for a criminal arrest, matter, case, or imprisonment stay
- delineating fiscal year as the period for reported events
- applying a uniform offense classification across agencies
- classifying disposition and sentences imposed.

FJSP data sources

U.S. Marshals Service: The Justice Detainee Information System provides information on suspects arrested for federal offenses. Suspects may be counted more than once in a fiscal year if they are arrested multiple times during the period. This report uses most serious arrest offense as classified by the deputy U.S. Marshal at the time of booking. Each of the 94 federal judicial districts in the United States have a U.S. Marshal. Deputy U.S. Marshals take federal suspects who have been charged with a crime into custody, which includes booking, processing, and detaining suspects. They also oversee court security and coordinate prisoner transportation, among other duties.

Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA): The Defendant Statistical System contains data on suspects arrested by DEA agents within the U.S. The data include information on characteristics of arrestees and the type of drug for which they were arrested. Suspects may be counted more than once in a fiscal year if they are arrested multiple times by the DEA during this period.

Executive Office for U.S. Attorneys: The Legal Information Office Network System database contains information on the investigation and prosecution of suspects in criminal matters received and concluded and criminal cases filed and terminated by U.S. attorneys. Suspects may be counted more than once in a fiscal year if they are involved in multiple matters received

and concluded during the period. A matter is defined as a referral in which an attorney spends one hour or more investigating. The lead charge is used to classify the most serious offense at referral and is defined as the substantive statute that is the primary basis of referral.

Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts (AOUSC):

The Criminal Master File contains information about the criminal proceedings against defendants whose cases were filed and terminated in U.S. district courts. It includes information on felony defendants, Class A misdemeanants—whether handled by U.S. district court judges or U.S. magistrates—and other misdemeanants provided they were handled by U.S. district court judges.⁶

Offenses are based on the most serious charged offense, as determined by the probation officer responsible for interviewing the defendant. The probation officer classifies the offense charged into AOUSC four-digit offense codes, which are maintained and updated by the AOUSC. For defendants charged with more than one offense on an indictment, the probation officer chooses as the charged offense the one carrying the most severe penalty or, in the case of two or more charges carrying the same penalty, the one with the highest offense severity. The offense severity level is determined by the AOUSC, which ranks offenses according to the maximum sentence, type of crime, and maximum fine amount. These four-digit codes are then aggregated into the primary offense charges used for this report.

This report also uses AOUSC data from the Probation and Pretrial Services Automated Case Tracking System (PACTS), which contains information on defendants interviewed and supervised by pre-trial services. These data are used to describe background characteristics of defendants arraigned. Post-sentencing data from PACTS are used to describe persons under post-sentencing supervision in the community.

U.S. Sentencing Commission: The Monitoring Database contains information on criminal defendants sentenced pursuant to the provisions of the Sentencing Reform Act of 1984. Data files are limited to those defendants whose court records have been obtained by the U.S. Sentencing Commission. These data do not appear in this bulletin.


⁶A felony is classified as an offense for which the maximum term of imprisonment is more than one year in prison. Offenses classified as misdemeanors include those for which the maximum term of imprisonment is less than one year in prison. Class A misdemeanors include offenses for which the maximum term of imprisonment is one year or less but more than 6 months in prison. Class B misdemeanors include offenses for which the maximum term of imprisonment is 6 months or less but more than 30 days in prison.

Federal Bureau of Prisons (BOP): The SENTRY database contains information on all federally sentenced offenders admitted into or released from federal prison during a fiscal year and offenders in federal prison at the end of each fiscal year (September 30). The prisoner count reported by the FJSP differs from what is reported by the BOP although data are from the same source (SENTRY). For example, the BOP reports 192,170 prisoners as of September 30, 2016.⁷ The FJSP starts with data extracted from SENTRY that differs slightly (down 506) from this total (191,664). Of the 191,664 records, 15,759 records were dropped because the prisoner was not designated at an assigned BOP custodial facility. The excluded records included designations to community confinement, home confinement, hospital, Immigration and Customs Enforcement detention, material witness, and pre-sentence admission. Next, 439 records were excluded due to missing commitment offense, and 4,529 prisoners were dropped as they were sentenced by the District of Columbia Superior Court. Finally, 559 prisoner records were dropped because the prisoner was a state boarder, a treaty transfer, or serving a sentence from a military court commitment. Of the 191,664 prisoners reported by the BOP in custody on September 30, 2016, a total of 170,378 (89% of the total population) met the criteria as federally sentenced prisoners (figure 7).

There has been some litigation over the content of the census questionnaire, but this is the first time that a court has ever ruled that the government cannot ask a question on the census. Judge Furman's earlier opinion explained that courts had routinely rejected challenges to questions on the census questionnaire:

See page 34: In fact, at least two of the cases involved challenges to the census questionnaire itself — precisely the kind of challenge brought here. See Morales, 116 F. Supp. 2d at 809; Prieto, 321 F. Supp. at 421-22.

Page 53: Admittedly, the Supreme Court has never confronted a direct challenge to the questions posed on the census. But a handful of lower courts, including the Second Circuit and this Court, have — and have universally rejected such challenges as meritless. See United States v. Rickenbacker, 309 F.2d 462, 463 (2d Cir. 1962) (Thurgood Marshall, J.); Morales, 116 F. Supp. 2d at 803-20; United States v. Little, 321 F. Supp. 388, 392 (D. Del. 1971); United States v. Moriarity, 106 F. 886, 891 (C.C.S.D.N.Y. 1901); see also Prieto, 321 F. Supp. at 421-23 (denying a preliminary injunction based in part on the claim that, because "the standard 'short form' census" did not allow a respondent to identify as "Mexican-American," it would "result in a serious underestimation of what is America's second-largest minority group"); United States v. Mitchell, 58 F. 993, 999 (N.D. Ohio 1893) (stating, in dicta, that "[c]ertain kinds of information valuable to the public, and useful to the legislative branches of the government as the basis for proper laws, . . . may properly be required from the citizen" on the decennial census). As a judge on this Court put it more than a century ago, the fact that Article I mandates only "a census of the population . . . does not prohibit the gathering of other statistics, if 'necessary and proper,' for the intelligent exercise of other powers enumerated in the constitution, and in such case there could be no objection to acquiring this information through the same machinery by which the population is enumerated." Moriarity, 106 F. at 891 (citing McCulloch, 4 Wheat. at 416); accord Morales, 116 F. Supp. 2d at 809 (citing Moriarity, McCulloch, and the Legal Tender Cases in affirming that the census may be used to conduct more than "a mere headcount").



Prosecution Dismantled International Sex Trafficking Organization that Forced Young Women and Girls from Mexico and Central America into Prostitution for Over a Decade

WASHINGTON – Last week in federal district court in Brooklyn, New York, five members of a notorious international criminal organization, known as the Rendon-Reyes Trafficking Organization, were sentenced to prison terms of 15 to 25 years by United States District Court Judge Edward R. Korman. The amount to be paid in restitution will be announced at a later date. Three other defendants are set to be sentenced on Jan. 15. The defendants previously pled guilty to racketeering, sex trafficking, and other federal charges following their arrests in Mexico and the United States, where they were residing illegally. For over a decade, the Rendon-Reyes Trafficking Organization, based in Tenancingo, Tlaxcala, Mexico, smuggled numerous young women and girls from Mexico and Central America into the United States and forced them to engage in prostitution for the Organization's profit, generating hundreds of thousands of dollars in criminal proceeds that were then laundered back to Mexico. The U.S. Attorney's Office for the Eastern District of New York and the Department of Justice's Civil Rights Division prosecuted this case.

"These well-deserved sentences reflect the gravity of the human trafficking crimes these defendants committed," said Acting Attorney General Whitaker. "The defendants operated an extensive sex trafficking enterprise that preyed on vulnerable young women and girls, deceiving them with false promises, coercing their compliance, and compelling them into submission through beatings, threats, isolation, and intimidation. This prosecution is the result of strong partnerships among the Eastern District of New York, the Civil Right Division's Human Trafficking Prosecution Unit, the New York Office of the Department of Homeland Security's Homeland Security Investigations, and our Mexican law enforcement counterparts. The sentences imposed in this case demonstrate our unwavering commitment to working across international borders to dismantle transnational trafficking networks and seek justice on behalf of victims and survivors."

"These sentencings are the latest chapter in this Office's long-term commitment to eradicate human trafficking and all forms of modern-day slavery," stated United States Attorney Donoghue. "The crimes committed by the members of the Rendon-Reyes Trafficking Organization were brutal and shocking, and I hope that today's sentences give the victims in this case some sense of justice. We will not tolerate the exploitation of women and girls for profit or sexual servitude."

"These individuals will now face the consequences of their callous criminal actions exploiting women and girls whom they forced into sex slavery for profit. The investigation and prosecution that led to today's sentencings speaks to the strong bilateral relationship between the United States and Mexico, in which both nations are committed to holding accountable those engaged in the ruthless act of human trafficking," said Homeland Security Investigations Executive Associate Director Derek Benner. "Investigating human trafficking remains a priority for HSI, whose primary focus is to rescue victims and release them from the grip of their captors. HSI will continue leveraging all of its investigative capabilities to disrupt human trafficking syndicates no matter where in the world they operate."

According to documents filed in court, between December 2004 and November 2015, members of the Rendon-Reyes Organization, including the defendants, enriched themselves by forcing multiple young women and girls, including the 12 referenced in court documents, to perform countless commercial sex acts throughout the United States and Mexico. The Organization targeted vulnerable women and girls, some as young as 14, from impoverished areas of Mexico and Central America. Male members of the Organization typically used false promises of love and marriage to lure the victims into fraudulent romantic relationships. In some instances, they forcibly abducted the victims, and on one occasion, a victim's child. Members of the Organization frequently arranged for others to smuggle the victims across the border and into the United States. Once in the United States, members of the Organization utilized different methods to force the victims to engage in prostitution, including severe and repeated beatings, sexual assaults, forced abortions, threats to the victims, their families and children, and psychological harm. Members of the Organization forced the victims to perform as many as 45 sex acts a night and took all of the prostitution proceeds, funneling the money back to Mexico.

The investigation, prosecution, bilateral enforcement action, and extraditions of the defendants apprehended in Mexico were coordinated through the U.S.-Mexico Bilateral Human Trafficking Enforcement Initiative. Since 2009, the Departments of Justice and Homeland Security have collaborated with Mexican law enforcement counterparts in a Bilateral Human Trafficking Enforcement Initiative to more effectively dismantle human trafficking networks operating across the U.S.-Mexico border, bring human traffickers to justice, and restore the rights and dignity of human trafficking victims. These efforts have resulted in successful prosecutions in both Mexico and the United States, including U.S. federal prosecutions of over 170 defendants in multiple cases in New York, Georgia, Florida, and Texas, in addition to numerous Mexican federal and state prosecutions of associated sex traffickers. The convictions in this case are also the latest development in the Eastern District of New York's comprehensive anti-trafficking program, which has to date indicted more than 80 defendants, assisted more than 150 victims, including 45 minors, reunited 19 victims' children with their mothers, and secured restitution orders of over \$4 million on behalf of trafficking victims.

The investigation of the Rendon-Reyes Trafficking Organization was led by HSI New York's Trafficking in Persons Unit with assistance from HSI Mexico City Attaché Office, the Department of Justice's Office of International Affairs, the State Department, Interpol and the New York City Police Department. Assistance was also provided by the FBI's Atlanta Division, and the U.S. Attorney's Office of the Northern District of Georgia. The government of Mexico, including Mexico's Procuraduria General de la República and Policia Federal, also played a prominent role in advancing the bilateral anti-trafficking enforcement efforts in this case. Non-governmental victim service providers and advocates also dedicated efforts to restore and improve the lives of survivors of trafficking and their families.

Acting Attorney General Matthew Whitaker, Assistant Attorney General Eric Dreiband for the Civil Rights Division, U.S. Attorney Richard P. Donoghue of the Eastern District of New York, and U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement's Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) Executive Associate Director Derek Benner made the announcement today.

The case against the Rendon-Reyes Trafficking Organization was investigated by HSI New York's Trafficking in Persons Unit, and is being prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorneys Taryn A. Merkl and Margaret Lee of the Eastern District of New York and Deputy Director for Litigation Benjamin J. Hawk of the Civil Rights Division's Human Trafficking Prosecution Unit.


