Dear Mr. Chairman:

Recent news reports indicate a classified memorandum prepared by House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence (HPSCI or Committee) staff alleges abuses at the Department of Justice (Department) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in the FISA process. We understand many members of the House of Representatives have viewed this memorandum and that it has raised concerns.

As you know, we have provided HPSCI with more than 1,000 pages of classified documents relating to the FBI's relationship, if any, with a source and its reliance, if any, on information provided by that source. Media reports indicate that the Committee's memorandum contains highly classified material confidentially provided by the Department to the Committee in a secure facility.¹

The Department takes any allegation of abuse of our justice system by Department employees seriously. Further, we assume that HPSCI members want to provide evidence of any specific allegation of misconduct to Department officials so that we may take appropriate action. The rule of law depends on the confidence of the American people that our prosecutors and investigators apply the law fairly and without bias or regard for political influence. Though we are currently unaware of any wrongdoing relating to the FISA process, we agree that any abuse of that system cannot be tolerated.

¹ To date, the Department has provided detailed briefings and made available to HPSCI documents requested as part of its investigation into Russian influence in the 2016 election. The terms of access stipulated that review of the documents would be limited to the Chairman or his designee, the Ranking Member or his designee, and two staff members each. (Mr. Gowdy reviewed the documents for the majority. Mr. Schiff reviewed the documents for the minority.) Other committees of jurisdiction—the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence, the Senate Committee on the Judiciary, and the House Committee on the Judiciary—have accepted similar procedural safeguards to protect against improper dissemination of information.

In addition, we have also heard that HPSCI is considering making the classified memorandum available to the public and the media, an unprecedented action. We believe it would be extraordinarily reckless for the Committee to disclose such information publicly without giving the Department and the FBI the opportunity to review the memorandum and to advise the HPSCI of the risk of harm to national security and to ongoing investigations that could come from public release. Indeed, we do not understand why the Committee would possibly seek to disclose classified and law enforcement sensitive information without first consulting with the relevant members of the Intelligence Community.

Seeking Committee approval of public release would require HPSCI committee members to vote on a staff-drafted memorandum that purports to be based on classified source materials that neither you nor most of them have seen. Given HPSCI's important role in overseeing the nation's intelligence community, you well understand the damaging impact that the release of classified material could have on our national security and our ability to share and receive sensitive information from friendly foreign governments. We know that committee members take this responsibility seriously, and would not risk damage to our intelligence community or the important work it does in safeguarding the American people. Additionally, we believe that wider distribution of the classified information presumably contained within your memorandum would represent a significant deviation from the terms of access negotiated in good faith by the Department, HPSCI, and the Office of Speaker Paul Ryan.

The Department renews its request—as previously made in a personal appeal by the Director of the FBI—for an opportunity to review the memorandum in question so that it may respond to the Committee before any vote on public release. In the alternative, should you wish not to provide the memorandum to the Deputy Attorney General and the FBI Director, we encourage you to provide it to Michael E. Horowitz, the Department's Inspector General. His office would appropriately investigate any alleged wrongdoing by the FBI or other Department personnel and independently assess whether prior public release of the memorandum would impair its ability to do so.

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT DEMANDS DOCUMENTS AND THREATENS TO SUBPOENA 23 JURISIDICTIONS AS PART OF 8 U.S.C. 1373 COMPLIANCE REVIEW

The Department of Justice today sent the attached letters to 23 jurisdictions, demanding the production of documents that could show whether each jurisdiction is unlawfully restricting information sharing by its law enforcement officers with federal immigration authorities.

All 23 of these jurisdictions were previously contacted by the Justice Department, when the Department raised concerns about laws, policies, or practices that may violate 8 U.S.C. 1373, a federal statute that promotes information sharing related to immigration enforcement and with which compliance is a condition of FY2016 and FY2017 Byrne JAG awards.

The letters also state that recipient jurisdictions that fail to respond, fail to respond completely, or fail to respond in a timely manner will be subject to a Department of Justice subpoena.

"I continue to urge all jurisdictions under review to reconsider policies that place the safety of their communities and their residents at risk," said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. "Protecting criminal aliens from federal immigration authorities defies common sense and undermines the rule of law. We have seen too many examples of the threat to public safety represented by jurisdictions that actively thwart the federal government's immigration enforcement enough is enough."

Failure to comply with section 1373 could result in the Justice Department seeking the return of FY2016 grants, requiring additional conditions for receipt of any FY2017 Byrne JAG funding, and/or jurisdictions being deemed ineligible to receive FY2017 Byrne JAG funding.

Why did the FCSC deny the claim?

How much of the \$1.5 billion that Libya paid to compensate U.S. victims is left over? How much does the government keep? Why?

What will happen to the remaining funds? Will the feds keep it or return it to Libya?

Johnson, Grassley Ask DOJ IG Horowitz about Missing FBI Text Messages

WASHINGTON – U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson, chairman of the Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, and Sen. Chuck Grassley, chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, wrote a letter to the Justice Department Office of Inspector General Tuesday regarding the revelation that the FBI did not preserve text messages between Peter Strzok and Lisa Page for the time period between Dec. 14, 2016, and May 17, 2017.

In a previous letter to Sens Johnson and Grassley, IG Michael Horowitz stated his office obtained text messages from Nov. 30, 2016, through July 28, 2017 without disclosing the missing texts. The Senators' letter is asking the DOJ Inspector General (1) to explain why he did not previously disclose FBI's failure to provide the missing texts, and (2) to inform the committees about the steps the IG is taking to investigate the circumstances surrounding the missing texts.

Dear Inspector General Horowitz:

The Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs and the Committee on the Judiciary are conducting oversight of the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and the FBI's investigation of classified information on former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's private email server. We write to request information about the loss of FBI records connected to this investigation.

On January 12, 2017, the Department of Justice Office of Inspector General (DOJ OIG) announced an investigation of "allegations that Department or FBI policies or procedures were not followed in connection with, or in actions leading up to or related to, the FBI Director's public announcement on July 5, 2016, and the Director's letters to Congress on October 28 and November 6, 2016 and that certain underlying investigative decisions were based on improper considerations."

On December 6, 2017, we wrote to you concerning the DOJ OIG discovery of text messages between FBI employees Lisa Page and Peter Strzok. Your response, dated December 13, 2017, suggested that DOJ OIG received all text messages between Ms. Page and Mr. Strzok from November 30, 2016 to July 28, 2017. You wrote:

In gathering evidence for the OIG's ongoing 2016 election review, we requested, consistent with standard practice, that the FBI produce text messages from the FBI-issued phones of certain FBI employees involved in the Clinton email investigation based on search terms we provided. After finding a number of politically-oriented text messages between Page and Strzok, the OIG sought from the FBI all text messages between Strzok and Page from their FBI-issued phones through November 30, 2016, which covered the entire period of the Clinton e-mail server investigation. The FBI produced these text messages on July 20, 2017. Following our review of those text messages between Strzok and Page from November 30, 2016, through the date of the document request, which was July 28, 2017. The OIG received these additional messages on August 10, 2017.

On January 19, 2018, the Department of Justice produced to Congress 384 pages of text messages exchanged between Ms. Page and Mr. Strzok. According to a cover letter accompanying the documents, the FBI did not preserve text messages between Ms. Page and Mr. Strzok between approximately December 14, 2016 and May 17, 2017. The cover letter explained:

The Department wants to bring to your attention that the FBI's technical system for retaining text messages sent and received on FBI mobile devices failed to preserve text messages for Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from December 14, 2016 to approximately to May 17, 2017. The FBI has informed [the Department of Justice] that many FBI-

provided Samsung 5 mobile devices did not capture or store text messages due to misconfiguration issues related to rollouts, provisioning, and software upgrades that conflicted with the FBI's collection capabilities. The result was that data that should have been automatically collected and retained for long-term storage and retrieval was not collected.

These statements—that DOJ OIG requested "all text messages between Strzok and Page from November 30, 2016, [to] July 28, 2017," received them on August 10, 2017, and that the FBI "failed to preserve text messages from Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from December 14, 2016, to approximately May 17, 2017"—need to be reconciled. During a phone call on January 22, 2018, DOJ OIG staff indicated that the FBI did not produce text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from December 14, 2016, to May 17, 2017.

Accordingly, to understand fully the scope of text messages in the possession of the DOJ OIG, we respectfully request that you please provide the following information and material:

- Is it accurate that the FBI failed to provide to DOJ OIG text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from December 14, 2016, to May 17, 2017 due to technical errors that prevented the texts from being archived in the FBI's records preservation system?
 - a. Has the FBI also been unable to provide the texts from any other source, such as the physical phones, carrier records, or any other source?
 - b. Has the OIG requested texts of other FBI personnel during the same time period? If so, has the FBI also been unable to produce texts of others as well or is the missing text problem limited to these two employees?
 - c. On what date did the OIG request access to messages for that time period from the FBI?
 - d. Did the FBI notify the OIG of the missing text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page? If so, on what date? If not, how and on what date did the OIG discover that messages were missing?
 - e. Did the DOJ OIG notify the office of the Deputy Attorney General of the missing text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page? If so, on what date?
 - Please explain why the DOJ OIG did not notify Congress of the missing text messages.
- Please produce all communications between DOJ OIG, DOJ, and the FBI referring or relating to the missing text messages.
- 3. The Attorney General said in a statement yesterday that your office was already undertaking a review of the circumstances that led to the FBI's failure to preserve and provide texts to the OIG. On what date did that review begin, and what is the scope and methodology of that OIG review?
- 4. Has the DOJ OIG been successful in retrieving any of the missing text messages from any other source?

- Does the OIG have the necessary authorities, resources, and capabilities to obtain the missing texts from another source? If not, please identify any gaps in your office's ability to do so.
- 6. In the most recent batch of texts, Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page frequently indicate that they are also communicating about work-related matters via apparently personal accounts on Apple's encrypted iMessage texting system, as well as through Gmail. Does the OIG have the necessary authorities, resources, and capabilities to obtain any federal records that may reside in those personal accounts? If not, please explain any gaps in your ability to do so.
- Has the OIG asked Mr. Strzok or Ms. Page to voluntarily provide any information from their personal accounts? If so, have they been cooperative? If the OIG has not asked, please explain why not.
- 8. Has the DOJ OIG interviewed Mr. Strzok or Ms. Page?
- 9. Has the DOJ OIG interviewed employees of the FBI's Information Technology office regarding the loss of text messages?

Please respond to this letter as soon as possible but no later than January 29, 2018.

Senator Johnson Reveals New FBI Text Messages

Peter Strzok: 'My gut sense and concern there's no big there there.'

WASHINGTON – During an appearance on The Jay Weber Show in Milwaukee, U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, revealed new text message exchanges between Peter Strzok and Lisa Page, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) employees who both worked at the FBI on the Clinton Investigation and then for Special Counsel Robert Mueller. Of note, one text message sent on May 19, 2017, shortly after the Deputy Attorney General appointed Mueller as special counsel, seems to imply Strzok was skeptical about the inquiry.

This new text message follows the revelation from this weekend that the <u>FBI does not have</u> <u>access to text messages</u> between Strzok and Page for the time period between Dec. 14, 2016 and May 17, 2017. Johnson <u>sent a letter</u> to FBI Director Christopher Wray Saturday seeking answers to questions about the missing communications from that period of time.

Excerpts from the interview are below, and the full segment can be found here.

Johnson: "And then on May 19th we have a big gap—a five-month gap. And now the texts

begin again. This is two days after Mueller was appointed Special Counsel. Strzock writes they're talking back and forth about their future at the FBI given the recent appointment of Mueller. They're talking about what they ought to do. And it indicates their considering joining that Mueller Special Counsel investigation.

Johnson: "Strzok says, quote, 'You and I both know the odds are nothing. If I thought it was likely, I'd be there no question. I hesitate in part because of my gut sense and concerned there's no big there there.' In other words, Peter Strzok was the FBI Deputy Assistant Director of the Counter Intelligence Division, and the man had a plan to do something, because he just couldn't abide Donald Trump being president."

Johnson: "It's saying that his gut sense that there's no big there there, when it comes to the Mueller Special Counsel investigation. He doesn't really want to join that because his gut sense is there's no big there there. I think that's kind of shocking."

Johnson: "The correct reaction is we need to see the five months of missing texts, because, who knows. Again, texts between two people having an extra-marital affair, and they're completely unguarded in their communication. And so we're getting insight into exactly what's happening inside the FBI at the highest levels."

Jay Weber: "Could you read again the passage? What Peter Strzok's message there was a couple of days after it was announced that Mueller was going to put together this team."

Johnson: "Yeah, they're wondering, and we think they're probably considering whether or not they want to join that team, Strzok says, quote, 'You and I both know the odds are nothing. If I thought it was likely, I'd be there no question. I hesitate in part because of my gut sense to be concerned there's no big there there."

Peter Strzok: 'My gut sense and concern there's no big there there.'

WASHINGTON – During an appearance on The Jay Weber Show in Milwaukee, U.S. Sen. Ron Johnson (R-Wis.), chairman of the Senate Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs Committee, revealed new text message exchanges between Peter Strzok and Lisa Page, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) employees who both worked at the FBI on the Clinton Investigation and then for Special Counsel Robert Mueller. Of note, one text message sent on May 19, 2017, shortly after the Deputy Attorney General appointed Mueller as special counsel, seems to imply Strzok was skeptical about the inquiry.

This new text message follows the revelation from this weekend that the <u>FBI does</u> <u>not have access to text messages</u> between Strzok and Page for the time period between Dec. 14, 2016 and May 17, 2017. Johnson <u>sent a letter</u> to FBI Director Christopher Wray Saturday seeking answers to questions about the missing communications from that period of time. Excerpts from the interview are below, and the full segment can be found here.

Johnson: "And then on May 19th we have a big gap—a five-month gap. And now the texts begin again. This is two days after Mueller was appointed Special Counsel. Strzock writes—they're talking back and forth about their future at the FBI given the recent appointment of Mueller. They're talking about what they ought to do. And it indicates their considering joining that Mueller Special Counsel investigation.

Johnson: "Strzok says, quote, 'You and I both know the odds are nothing. If I thought it was likely, I'd be there no question. I hesitate in part because of my gut sense and concerned there's no big there there.' In other words, Peter Strzok was the FBI Deputy Assistant Director of the Counter Intelligence Division, and the man had a plan to do something, because he just couldn't abide Donald Trump being president."

Johnson: "It's saying that his gut sense that there's no big there there, when it comes to the Mueller Special Counsel investigation. He doesn't really want to join that because his gut sense is there's no big there there. I think that's kind of shocking."

Johnson: "The correct reaction is we need to see the five months of missing texts, because, who knows. Again, texts between two people having an extra-marital affair, and they're completely unguarded in their communication. And so we're getting insight into exactly what's happening inside the FBI at the highest levels."

Jay Weber: "Could you read again the passage? What Peter Strzok's message there was a couple of days after it was announced that Mueller was going to put together this team."

Johnson: "Yeah, they're wondering, and we think they're probably considering whether or not they want to join that team, Strzok says, quote, 'You and I both know the odds are nothing. If I thought it was likely, I'd be there no question. I hesitate in part because of my gut sense to be concerned there's no big there there.'"

This responds to your request to the Department of Justice (Department) to provide the Committee with copies of text message communications between Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) employees Peter Strzok and Lisa Page.

As you may know, on January 12, 2016, the Department's Office of Inspector General (OIG) publicly announced that the OIG would review "allegations that Department or FBI policies or procedures were not followed in connection with, or in actions leading up to or related to, the FBI Director's public announcement on July 5, 2016,¹ and the Director's letters to Congress on October 28 and November 6, 2016, and that certain underlying investigative decisions were based on improper considerations.²" As part of that review, the OIG obtained, among other things, text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page.

In December 2017, we provided you with an initial production of approximately 375 text message communications, dated August 16, 2015 to December 1, 2016. In response to the requests for the texts messages, the Department collected all text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page available from the FBI for the period July 1, 2015 to July 28, 2017,³ which was the same period requested by the OIG. The Department began reviewing those documents in an effort to provide you those messages that were either work-related or that provided any insight into the political views of the participants.

The Department is not providing text messages that were purely personal in nature. Furthermore, the Department has redacted from some work-related text messages portions that were purely personal. The Department's aim in withholding purely personal text messages and redacting personal portions of work-related text messages was primarily to facilitate the Committee's access to potentially relevant text messages without having to cull through large quantities of material unrelated to either the investigation of former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton's use of a personal email server or the investigation into Russian efforts to interfere with the 2016 Presidential election. Also, the withholding of personal information in some instances avoids unnecessary embarrassment or harassment to third parties that could result from public release of such information. The Department redacted the names of employees who are not SESlevel employees, and in some instances, redacted SES employees' names to avoid unwarranted attention to those individuals when comments were gratuitous and did not provide relevant information to ongoing Congressional inquiries.

In a few instances, the Department has redacted portions of work-related texts that concern other investigations. Finally, the Department consulted with the Special Counsel's Office (SCO) and made some redactions related to the structure, operation, and substance of the SCO investigation because it is ongoing.

To avoid any concern that the Department has withheld relevant information, if a Committee has specific questions about why a particular text was partially redacted or about the nature of personal text messages withheld, the Department will work with that Committee to either further describe or disclose redacted information in a closed setting. Although the original spreadsheet contained only what the Department believed to be work-related text messages, subsequent reviews identified some additional personal text messages within that document. Therefore, the document produced today contains a small number of fully redacted messages that were determined to be personal messages subsequent to their initial inclusion in the previously provided spreadsheet. The enclosed document also excludes columns of information that contained only technical information such as phone numbers or email addresses in an effort to provide a more readily reviewable set of documents. In the attached, the "Inbox" documents are from Mr. Strzok to Ms. Page, and the "Outbox" documents are from Ms. Page to Mr. Strzok.

The Department wants to bring to your attention that the FBI's technical system for retaining text messages sent and received on FBI mobile devices failed to preserve text messages for Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from December 14, 2016 to approximately to May 17, 2017. The FBI has informed us that many FBI-provided Samsung 5 mobile devices did not capture or store text messages due to misconfiguration issues related to rollouts, provisioning, and software upgrades that conflicted with the FBI's collection capabilities. The result was that data that should have been automatically collected and retained for long-term storage and retrieval was not collected. This problem should have been corrected with the rollout of the Samsung 7s in 2017.

Mr. Strzok's Samsung 5 phone last connected to the storage system on June 18, 2016. He received his new Samsung 7 phone on or about July 5, 2017. Ms. Page's Samsung 5 phone last connected to the storage system on December 13, 2016. She received her new Samsung 7 phone on or about May 22, 2017.⁴

The Office of Inspector General pieced together the text messages between Mr. Strzok and Ms. Page from June 18, 2016, to December 13, 2016, using the data from Ms. Page's phone until the connection to the storage system stopped on December 13, 2016. On May 17, 2017, Ms. Page's data collection re-initiated when she received her new phone.

Using newly released detailed data on all prisoners who entered the Arizona state prison from January 1985 through June 2017, we are able to separate non-U.S. citizens by whether they are illegal or legal residents. These data do not rely on self-reporting by criminals. Undocumented immigrants are at least 142% more likely to be convicted of a crime than other Arizonans. They also tend to commit more serious crimes and serve 10.5% longer sentences, more likely to be classified as dangerous, and 45% more likely to be gang members than U.S. citizens. Yet, there are several reasons that these numbers are likely to underestimate the share of crime committed by undocumented immigrants. There are dramatic differences between in the

criminal nistones of convicts who are 0.5, cluzens and undocumented minigrants.

Young convicts are especially likely to be undocumented immigrants. While undocumented immigrants from 15 to 35 years of age make up slightly over two percent of the Arizona population, they make up about eight percent of the prison population. Even after adjusting for the fact that young people commit crime at higher rates, young undocumented immigrants commit crime at twice the rate of young U.S. citizens. These undocumented immigrants also tend to commit more serious crimes.

If undocumented immigrants committed crime nationally as they do in Arizona, in 2016 they would have been responsible for over 1,000 more murders, 5,200 rapes, 8,900 robberies, 25,300 aggravated assaults, and 26,900 burglaries.

Trump earned Four Pinocchios the last time we looked into his claim that immigrants cause crime rates to rise in the United States. Fresh data and several new studies have been released since that fact-check in 2015, and we took another look at the body of knowledge to see how the president's view holds up. when we fact-checked him as a candidate in 2015, frump spoke of himingrams generally and without distinguishing between legal and unauthorized residents. But in his most recent statements on Dec. 6, the president narrowed it down to "illegal immigrants ... bringing with them crime, tremendous amounts of crime." (We're not evaluating Trump's claim that Democrats "want to have illegal immigrants.")

Is Trump on solid ground now when he says unauthorized immigrants make the country less safe?

The Facts

As we found in 2015, it's all but impossible to determine whether Trump's statement is accurate concerning either legal or undocumented immigrants.

The Department of Justice says 90 percent of prisoners are housed at the state or local levels. That's because almost all crimes are prosecuted by state and local law enforcement agencies, not the federal government.

States generally do not track how many of their prisoners are undocumented immigrants. But most states do report their total number of noncitizen prisoners every year to the Justice Department, without breaking down their legal status.

Noncitizens accounted for 4 percent of the total prison population in the states, according to reports from the Bureau of Justice Statistics from 2013 to 2016, the most recent year for which data are available. (This figure excludes California and a handful of other states that did not provide data on noncitizen prisoners to the Justice Department.)

At the federal level, noncitizens made up 11 percent to 12 percent of the total prison population from 2013 to 2015, the reports show. The Bureau of Justice Statistics changed its methodology in 2018 at the request of the Justice Department, said Elizabeth Ann Carson, the bureau's statistician. So in the 2016 report, the number of noncitizen federal prisoners jumped from 21,479 to 39,956, or from 11 percent of the federal prison population to 21 percent, because of this methodology change, she said.

The difference is that the Bureau of Justice Statistics previously reported the

number of noncitizens housed in federal prisons, but now it adds those in privately run or community correctional facilities. The BJS data do not factor in persons detained by the Department of Homeland Security, which enforces immigration laws.

The 21 percent rate now appears to track with separate data from the U.S. Sentencing Commission, which found that noncitizens accounted for 20 percent of total federal prison sentences in fiscal year 2016, excluding immigration offenses.

Trump's campaign pointed to Sentencing Commission data to support its claims in 2015. The White House did not respond to a request for comment.

Some experts say the BJS data are unreliable because, among other reasons, state officials ask prisoners to self-report whether they are legal or undocumented residents. As we noted, a handful of states do not report their number of noncitizen prisoners to the Justice Department, which means the BJS data undercount the total.

But since it's the closest thing to a yardstick provided by the federal government, it's worth analyzing the data. (Incidentally, the Homeland Security and Justice departments "are working to develop a reliable methodology for estimating the status of state and local incarcerated populations in future reports," according to a December report they released.)

Excluding five states that did not provide data, state and federal correctional facilities in 2016 housed 1.3 million prisoners, of which 83,556, or 6 percent, were noncitizens, according to the latest BJS report. The total immigrant population stood at 43.7 million in 2016, or 13.5 percent, according to Census data. A comparison of these figures shows that noncitizens are far underrepresented in the prison population at the state level (4 percent), overrepresented at the federal level after excluding immigration offenses (21 percent), and far below their share of the population when combining both state and federal prisons (6 percent).

Let's move on to the new research studies released since our fact-check from 2015.

The majority of the research available on this question continues to show that immigrants are less likely to commit crimes than the native-born and that overall crime rates decline in areas where immigrants settle. However, many of these studies use statistical modeling in the absence of reliable and standardized statelevel data about immigrant prisoners or convicts.

A March 2017 study by the pro-immigration Cato Institute found that "all immigrants are less likely to be incarcerated than natives relative to their shares of the population" and that "even illegal immigrants are less likely to be incarcerated than native-born Americans."

Analyzing Census data from the 2014 American Community Survey, authors Michelangelo Landgrave and Alex Nowrasteh found that 2,194,435 individuals were incarcerated in 2014. The imprisonment rate for unauthorized immigrants was 0.85 percent, and 0.47 percent for legal immigrants, they found. Subtracting immigration-related offenses, the rate was lower for unauthorized immigrants: 0.5 percent.

The American Immigration Council, another pro-immigration group, estimated that there were 11.2 million undocumented immigrants in 2013. The total population that year was 316.2 million, according to the Census, which means illegal immigrants made up 3.5 percent of the total population when using the council's estimate.

Cato's study suggests that unauthorized immigrants are dramatically underrepresented in the U.S. prison population, including or excluding immigration offenses. Meanwhile, 45 percent of Americans say immigrants make the crime situation worse, 9 percent say they make the crime situation better, and 43 percent say there is not much effect, according to a Gallup survey from 2017. "We're running against the popular current," Nowrasteh said. "We're not running against the weight of empirical evidence on this claim. Our findings are actually pretty consistent with those in peer-reviewed journals as well as other scholarly publications."

According to "The Integration of Immigrants into American Society," a 2015 peer-

reviewed study of years of academic research, the perception that immigrants bring crime to the United States has been popular for nearly a century and "is perpetuated by 'issue entrepreneurs' who promote the immigrant-crime connection in order to drive restrictionist immigration policy." "Far from immigration increasing crime rates, studies demonstrate that immigrants and immigration are associated inversely with crime," the study, published by the National Academy of Sciences, concludes. "Immigrants are less likely than the native-born to commit crimes, and neighborhoods with greater concentrations of immigrants have much lower rates of crime and violence than comparable nonimmigrant neighborhoods. However, crime rates rise among the second and later generations, perhaps a negative consequence of adaptation to American society."

But, once again pointing to the dearth of good data, the authors added: "While the research is conclusive on the statistical relation between immigration and crime, there is still a lot to be learned because of limitations in the available data. The extent to which this relationship is truly generalizable or robust for all immigrant groups needs further study."

As the Fact Checker reported in 2015, one study showed that between 1990 and 2013, "the foreign-born share of the U.S. population grew from 7.9 percent to 13.1 percent and the number of unauthorized immigrants more than tripled from 3.5 million to 11.2 million.

"During the same period, FBI data indicate that the violent crime rate declined 48 percent — which included falling rates of aggravated assault, robbery, rape, and murder. Likewise, the property crime rate fell 41 percent, including declining rates of motor vehicle theft, larceny/robbery, and burglary," according to the American Immigration Council.

In short, the violent crime rate was cut nearly by half during a period in which unauthorized immigrants tripled, according to the council.

Some experts caution that this study and Cato's — which are based on Census data — and the Bureau of Justice Statistics figures should all be taken with a heavy dose of salt. State authorities and census workers are relying on offenders to self-report whether they are legal residents or undocumented, which is not an easy proposition for those facing possible deportation.

"Is the ACS doing a good job of capturing the foreign-born? It didn't in the past," said Steven A. Camarota, the research director at the Center for Immigration Studies, which has documented several issues with the quality of Census data on immigrant prisoners. "The question is, How good is it now? ... What I can say is that the incarceration data in the ACS looks more consistent over time, but that sometimes means it could be consistently undercounting." Across the spectrum, experts agree that Trump's claims are nearly impossible to

verify without reliable and standardized data on state-level offenders who are undocumented immigrants.

Camarota's group opposes sanctuary city policies and advocates for less legal immigration. He added that without solid data from the states, it's not possible to reach sound conclusions on immigrant crime rates. "It is not our contention that the data is clear that immigrants commit a disproportionate share of crime," Camarota said.

John R. Lott of the Crime Prevention Research Center in December released a study of prisoner data from the Arizona Department of Corrections. "The murder and manslaughter rate for illegal immigrants is 2.7 times higher than the average for U.S. citizens," Lott said of the study, which maps 32 1/2 years of prisoner statistics in a state with a history of making headlines for its tough immigration enforcement policies.

"While undocumented immigrants from 15 to 35 years of age make up a little over 2 percent of the Arizona population, they make up almost 8 percent of the prison population," Lott found. "These immigrants also tend to commit more serious crimes."

He added that undocumented immigrants in the Arizona data, which cover 1985 to 2017, had the highest incarceration rate compared with legal immigrants and U.S. citizens. Legal immigrants had a lower rate than U.S. citizens, he said.

"What we're finding is that people who are legal immigrants tend to be extremely law-abiding." Lott said "But illegal immigrants commit crimes at extremely high rates. And when you lump them together you get something in the middle."

The Arizona figures are "great data in the sense that it doesn't lump the two together" and because they do not rely on offenders self-reporting their immigration status, Lott said.

Lott's review appears to be unique — no other comparable research on state correctional data has been conducted — and an outlier, since the majority of other studies have come to diametrically opposite conclusions, including those in peerreviewed publications.

The Pinocchio Test

Trump for years has argued that immigrants pose a threat to public safety, bringing higher crime to the communities where they settle. When we last factchecked his statements in 2015, Trump was speaking about immigrants generally and without separating legal residents from unauthorized ones. Most recently, on Dec. 6, the president said "illegal immigrants" were "bringing with them crime, tremendous amounts of crime."

The Justice Department reports that 90 percent of U.S. prisoners are housed in state or local institutions, and because states generally do not report data breaking down how many of their prisoners are undocumented immigrants, experts on several sides of the immigration debate say it is not possible to verify Trump's claim. The admittedly incomplete data that the Justice Department does publish on noncitizen prisoners does not support Trump's claims.

Almost all the independent research on this question — do immigrants bring more crime? — contradicted Trump in 2015 and continues to do so today as we look at newer studies. One report based on Arizona reaches a different conclusion: that undocumented immigrants do commit crimes at higher rates than U.S. citizens or legal immigrants. But it's not scientific to extrapolate Arizona's figures to form nationwide conclusions.

The bottom line is that a great majority of research on this question contradicts

Trump's claim, even in its narrower form focused only on "illegal immigrants." There is a possibility that Census data on which many of these studies are based could be giving an inaccurate count of who is and is not undocumented. But there is no way to prove it because of the lack of reliable, standardized data from the states, where 90 percent of prisoners are housed. As always, the burden of proof rests with the speaker, so the president once again earns Four Pinocchios.

Justice Department Files Notice to Appeal and Intends to Petition for Immediate Supreme Court Review in DACA Lawsuit

The Department of Justice today filed a notice of appeal in *The Regents of the University of California and Janet Napolitano v. U.S. Department of Homeland Security and Elaine Duke seeking review before the U.S.* Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. The Department also intends later this week to take the rare step of filing a petition for a writ of certiorari before judgment, seeking direct review in the Supreme Court.

"It defies both law and common sense for DACA—an entirely discretionary non-enforcement policy that was implemented unilaterally by the last administration after Congress rejected similar legislative proposals and courts invalidated the similar DAPA policy—to somehow be mandated nationwide by a single district court in San Francisco," said Attorney General Jeff Sessions. "It is clear that Acting Secretary Duke acted within her discretion to rescind this policy with an orderly wind down. This was done both to give Congress an opportunity to act on this issue and in light of ongoing litigation in which the injunction against DAPA had already been affirmed by the Supreme Court. We are now taking the rare step of requesting direct review on the merits of this injunction by the Supreme Court so that this issue may be resolved quickly and fairly for all the parties involved."

DOJ, DHS Report: Three Out of Four Individuals Convicted of International Terrorism and Terrorism-Related Offenses were Foreign-Born

Departments of Justice and Homeland Security Release Data for the First Time on Terrorism-Related Activity

Today, the Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) released a report, revealing that three out of every four, or 402, individuals convicted of international terrorism-related charges in U.S. federal courts between September 11, 2001, and December 31, 2016 were foreign-born. Over the same period, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement removed approximately 1,716 aliens with national security concerns. Further, in 2017 alone DHS had 2,554 encounters with individuals on the terrorist watch list (also known as the FBI's Terrorist Screening Database) traveling to the United States.

This report was required by Section 11 of President Trump's <u>Executive Order 13780</u>, <u>Protecting the Nation</u> from Foreign Terrorist Entry into the United States, which declared that "it is the policy of the United States to protect its citizens from terrorist attacks, including those committed by foreign nationals," directed a series of actions to enhance the security and safety of the American people. The actions directed by Executive Order have raised the baseline for the vetting and screening of foreign nationals, prevented the entry of malicious actors, and enhanced the safety and security of the American people.

"This report reveals an indisputable sobering reality—our immigration system has undermined our national security and public safety," said Attorney General Sessions. "And the information in this report is only the tip of the iceberg: we currently have terrorism-related investigations against thousands of people in the

United States, including hundreds of people who came here as refugees. Our law enforcement professionals do amazing work, but it is simply not reasonable to keep asking them to risk their lives to enforce the law while we admit thousands every year without sufficient knowledge about their backgrounds. The pillars of President Trump's immigration policy—securing our porous borders, moving to a merit-based immigration system that ends the use of diversity visas and chain migration, and enforcing our nation's laws—will make their jobs easier and make the United States a safer place."

"My top priority as Secretary of Homeland Security is to ensure the safety and security of the American people," said Secretary Nielsen. "This report is a clear reminder of why we cannot continue to rely on immigration policy based on pre-9/11 thinking that leaves us woefully vulnerable to foreign-born terrorists, and why we must examine our visa laws and continue to intensify screening and vetting of individuals traveling to the United States to prevent terrorists, criminals, and other dangerous individuals from reaching our country. Without legislative change, DHS will continue to see thousands of terrorists a year attempt to enter the United States, and while we must be right every time, the terrorists only need to be lucky once. Therefore, DHS has personnel deployed around the world and along our borders working with our global and domestic law enforcement partners to stop terrorists before they enter the homeland."

The report reveals that at least 549 individuals were convicted of international terrorism-related charges in U.S. federal courts between September 11, 2001, and December 31, 2016. An analysis conducted by DHS determined that approximately 73 percent (402 of these 549 individuals) were foreign-born. Breaking down the 549 individuals by citizenship status at the time of their respective convictions reveals that:

- 254 were not U.S. citizens;
- 148 were foreign-born, naturalized and received U.S. citizenship; and,
- 147 were U.S. citizens by birth.

According to information available to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), since September 11, 2001, there were approximately 1,716 removals of aliens with national security concerns.

As mentioned above, in FY 2017, DHS encountered 2,554 individuals on the terrorist watchlist (also known as the FBI's Terrorist Screening Database) traveling to the United States. Of those individuals, 335 were attempting to enter by land, 2,170 were attempting to enter by air, and 49 were attempting to enter by sea. Where consistent with the law, such individuals are denied entry into the United States, while in some cases law enforcement authorities are notified and can take appropriate action.

From October 1, 2011, to September 30, 2017, a total of 355,345 non-U.S. citizen offenders, were administratively arrested after previously being convicted of an aggravated felony, as defined in 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(43), or two or more crimes each punishable by more than one year (felony offenses). During that same period, a total of 372,098 non-U.S. citizen offenders were removed from the United States after conviction of an aggravated felony or two or more felonies.

Data from U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services' Fraud Detection and National Security Directorate shows that between 2007 and 2017, USCIS referred 45,858 foreign nationals who applied for immigration benefits to ICE for criminal or civil enforcement action, based on information indicating that such foreign nationals had committed egregious public safety-related offenses within the United States.

Between FY 2010 and FY 2016, CBP identified and prevented the boarding of 73,261 foreign travelers on flights destined for the United States, who may have presented an immigration or security risk.

In October, the Trump Administration sent to Congress a list of legislative priorities that would enhance our national security—such as eliminating the diversity visa lottery and extended family chain migration, funding the wall, closing loopholes in our asylum system, combatting visa overstays, and closing other loopholes in existing law that potentially benefit aliens who pose threats to our national security.

Background on the Executive Order

Section 11 of Executive Order requires the Secretary of Homeland Security, in consultation with the Attorney General, to collect and make publicly available the following information:
- Information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been charged with terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; convicted of terrorism-related offenses while in the United States; or removed from the United States based on terrorism-related activity, affiliation with or provision of material support to a terrorism-related organization, or any other national-security-related reasons;
- Information regarding the number of foreign nationals in the United States who have been radicalized after entry into the United States and who have engaged in terrorism-related acts, or who have provided material support to terrorism-related organizations in countries that pose a threat to the United States;
- Information regarding the number and types of acts of gender-based violence against women, including so-called "honor killings," in the United States by foreign nationals; and,
- iv. Any other information relevant to public safety and security as determined by the Secretary of Homeland Security or the Attorney General, including information on the immigration status of foreign nationals charged with major offenses.

"Some policies implemented in the immigration court system in recent years have contributed to a three-fold increase of the courts' pending caseload. Certain 'prioritization' practices actually made the caseload worse by continuing cases that could be resolved more quickly in favor of cases that often actually take longer to complete—the immigration court equivalent of fiddling while Rome burned. Any designation of a case as a 'priority' should mean it is simply a priority to complete the case in an expeditious manner that serves the national interest and does not compromise due process."

"In 2010, longstanding immigration court benchmarks for non-detained cases were abruptly abandoned, and since that time--perhaps not coincidentally--the caseload has tripled. This memorandum is effective immediately, applies prospectively to all new cases filed and to all immigration court cases reopened, recalendared, or remanded, and serves to rescind the January 31, 2017, memorandum entitled "Case Processing Priorities" and all other prior memoranda establishing case processing or docketing priorities.

I. Background

On December 6, 2017, the Attorney General issued a memorandum to all Executive Office for Immigration Review (EOIR) employees outlining several principles to follow to ensure that the adjudication of immigration court cases serves the national interest. It also provided that the Director of EOIR may issue further guidance to ensure the achievement of those principles. Pursuant to 8 C.F.R. § 1003.0(b)(1)(ii) and (iv), the EOIR Director has the authority to "[d]irect the conduct of all EOIR employees to ensure the efficient disposition of all pending cases, including the power, in his discretion, to set priorities or time frames for the resolution of cases and otherwise to manage the docket of matters to be decided by the immigration judges" and to "[e]valuate the performance of the Office of the Chief Immigration Judge (OCIJ) and take corrective action where needed."

Accordingly, pursuant to that authority and in accordance with the Attorney General's principles, this memorandum lays out EOIR's specific priorities and goals in the adjudication of immigration court cases.

II. Case Prioritization

EOIR has always designated detained cases as priorities for completion. In 2014, EOIR began designating other types of "priority" cases for docketing and processing purposes, and those priority designations have been subsequently modified three times—most recently on January 31, 2017.

The repeated changes in case prioritization have caused confusion and created difficulty in comparing and tracking case data over time. But, most importantly, the frequent shifting priority designations did not enhance docket efficiency. Not only were cases repeatedly moved to accommodate new priorities without a clear plan for resolving both the new and older cases, but also the designations did not adequately stress the importance of completing all cases in a timely manner.

For example, less than 10% of cases currently pending meet the definition of "priority" outlined in the January 31, 2017, memorandum—a statistic that conveys a potentially mistaken impression regarding the importance of completing the other 600,000-plus pending cases that do not bear a "priority" designation.

Accordingly, to address concerns and confusion, it is appropriate to clarify EOIR's priorities and goals to ensure that the adjudication of cases serves the national interest consistent with the principles outlined by the Attorney General.

All cases involving individuals in detention or custody, regardless of the custodian, are priorities for completion.¹ Likewise, cases subject to a statutory or regulatory deadline, cases subject to a federal court-ordered deadline, and cases otherwise subject to an established benchmark for completion, including those listed in Appendix A, are also priorities. As developments warrant, other priority designations may be established as appropriate, and other categories of cases may be tracked regardless of whether they reflect a priority designation.

The designation of a category of cases as priority is an indication of an expectation that such cases should be completed expeditiously and without undue delay consistent with due process. Because the designations outlined in this memorandum apply prospectively, it is not intended to require the rescheduling of currently-docketed cases. The designation of priority cases is also not intended to diminish or reduce the significance of other cases. Indeed, the timely completion of *all* cases consistent with due process remains a matter of the utmost importance for the agency. Finally, the designation of a case as a priority is not intended to limit the discretion afforded an immigration judge under applicable law, nor is it intended to mandate a specific outcome in any particular case.

¹Cases of aliens in the custody of the Department of Homeland Security and aliens in the care and custody of the Department of Health and Human Services who do not have a sponsor identified were priorities under prior policy and remain so under this new policy.

III. Immigration Court Benchmarks and Performance Metrics

Apart from designated case priorities, EOIR's case processing has also involved other types of evaluative measures over time, such as statutory or regulatory deadlines for the completion of certain types of cases, including under the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA), the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) of 1993, and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010. Although these case completion goals have not previously denoted case priorities *per se*, they do serve as indicators of the importance of completing certain classes of cases in a timely manner.

Historically, EOIR also utilized case completion measures for non-detained cases from FY 2002 to FY 2009, but it eliminated those measures in FY 2010, leading to confusion regarding the extent to which the timely completion of non-detained cases was perceived as a priority for the agency. The abolition of non-detained case completion benchmarks was also subsequently criticized by both the Department of Justice (DOJ) Office of Inspector General and the Government Accountability Office, both of whom recommended that EOIR reinstate goals for the completion of non-detained cases. In 2016 and 2017, the House Committee on Appropriations also directed EOIR to establish a goal that the median length of detained cases be no longer than 365 days.

Although EOIR has previously stated that case completion goals are statements of agency priorities and has tracked performance relative to those goals, it has not expressly designated cases subject to such measures as priorities, unless they happened to fall into another category that was a priority (*e.g.* detained cases). This has led to even further confusion regarding the interaction between case priorities and case resolution goals, especially because the overwhelming majority of pending cases in recent years were neither designated as a priority nor subject to a performance goal.

Almost every trial court system utilizes performance measures or case completion metrics to ensure that it is operating efficiently and appropriately. Some of these are established by statute or regulation whereas others are set by policy; nevertheless, trial court performance measures are an essential and widely-recognized tool for ensuring healthy and effective court operations.

In the federal system, for example, the Civil Justice Reform Act of 1990 requires semiannual reporting of the number of certain types of civil cases and motions pending beyond a particular date with the intent of reducing litigation delays in federal district courts. Many administrative adjudicatory systems also feature case processing time standards, either by statute,

regulation, or policy.² At the state level, most states have adopted court case processing time standards, many of which follow model standards approved by the American Bar Association (ABA).³

In fact, over 25 years ago, the ABA recognized the importance of establishing court performance standards to ensure effective case management and to avoid undue delay; in doing so, it outlined seven essential elements for managing cases, including several that are now being implemented by EOIR such as "[p]romulgation and monitoring of time and clearance standards for the overall disposition of cases," "[a]doption of a trial-setting policy which schedules a sufficient number of cases to ensure efficient use of judge time while minimizing resettings caused by overscheduling," "[c]ommencement of trials on the original date scheduled with adequate advance notice," and "[a] firm, consistent policy for minimizing continuances."⁴ In short, court performance measures and case completion goals are common, well-established, and necessary mechanisms for evaluating how well a court is functioning at performing its core role of adjudicating cases.

EOIR is no exception to the rule that court performance measures are a necessary accountability tool to ensure that a court is operating at peak efficiency, nor is there anything novel or unique about applying performance measures to EOIR's immigration courts.⁵ Rather, a review of such measures is vital to ensure that the immigration court system is performing strongly, that EOIR is adjudicating cases fairly, expeditiously, and uniformly consistent with its mission, and that it is addressing its pending caseload in support of the principles established by the Attorney General.

Accordingly, to ensure that EOIR is meeting these goals, the court-based performance measures outlined in Appendix A to this memorandum will be tracked by EOIR, and court

performance in meeting them will be regularly audited. These goals are intended to help determine which courts are operating in a healthy and efficient manner, and which courts may be in need of more specialized attention in the form of additional resources, training, court management, creative thinking and planning, and/or other action as appropriate.

As published here in Appendix A, these court-based goals are not intended to apply specifically to any individual employee; rather, these goals apply to the court as a whole, and all court employees accordingly share responsibility for working together to successfully meet them.⁶

OCIJ will provide additional "not-to-exceed" guidelines for each goal, as appropriate. Further, some cases may be subject to more than one goal. EOIR will also track the clearance rate (the ratio of new cases filed to cases completed) and the age of existing cases at each court and may announce future goals for those statistics at a later date.

Many of these measures derive from statutory or regulatory mandates, including the INA; others derive from EOIR's goals developed under GPRA. Still others, such as a goal of ensuring file completion and accuracy, are simply reflections of the standard that a professional administrative court system should endeavor to attain. Although many of these goals have already existed for several years at EOIR, their current designation clarifies that cases subject to a goal should be considered priority cases and reiterates that the goals themselves reflect considered policy judgments regarding optimal court performance and functioning that EOIR's immigration courts should strive to achieve.

EOIR is already meeting, or close to meeting, some of these goals; for instance, the median length of time a detained case is pending at the immigration court level is currently less than 60 days. For other goals, they may appear merely aspirational at first, and the agency is cognizant that it may take time for them to be fully realized. Nevertheless, as a professional administrative court system within the DOJ exercising the Attorney General's delegated authority, EOIR should strive to become the preeminent administrative adjudicatory agency in the federal government and to fulfill its mission at the highest level possible. Further, by making you aware of these goals, you can begin thinking about how, with these goals in mind, EOIR's day-to-day activities can be streamlined to improve efficiency while maintaining due process. Moreover, there is no doubt that as the agency puts into place additional resources, training, and

more efficient processes, you will continue impress with your dedication to our mission. As the Attorney General indicated, every employee at EOIR can contribute something to improve the system, and your creative suggestions regarding more effective case management are welcome.

APPENDIX A

IMMIGRATION COURT PERFORMANCE MEASURES

- 1. Eighty-five percent (85%) of all non-status⁷ detained removal⁸ cases should be completed⁹ within 60 days of filing of the Notice to Appear (NTA), reopening or recalendaring of the case, remand from the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA), or notification of detention.
- 2. Eighty-five percent (85%) of all non-status non-detained removal cases should be completed within 365 days (1 year) of filing of the NTA, reopening or recalendaring of the case, remand from the BIA, or notification of release from custody.
- 3. Eight-five percent (85%) of all motions should be adjudicated within 40 days of filing.
- 4. Ninety percent (90%) of all custody redeterminations should be completed within 14 days of the request for redetermination.
- 5. Ninety-five percent (95%) of all hearings should be completed on the initial scheduled individual merits hearing date.
- 6. One hundred percent (100%) of all credible fear reviews should be completed within seven (7) days of the initial determination by an asylum officer that an alien does not have a credible fear of persecution. See INA § 235(b)(1)(B)(iii)(III). One hundred percent (100%) of all reasonable fear reviews should be completed within 10 days of the filing of the negative reasonable fear determination as reflected in Form I-863. See 8 C.F.R. § 1208.31(g).
- One hundred percent (100%) of all expedited asylum cases should be completed within the statutory deadline and consistent with established EOIR policy. *See* INA 208(d)(5)(A)(iii); OPPM 13-02.
- 8. Eighty-five percent (85%) of all Institutional Hearing Program (IHP) removal cases should be completed prior to the alien's release from detention by the IHP custodian.
- 9. One hundred percent (100%) of all electronic and paper records should be accurate and complete.

⁷ A status case is (1) one in which an immigration judge is required to continue the case pursuant to binding authority in order to await the adjudication of an application or petition by U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, (2) one in which the immigration judge is required to reserve a decision rather than completing the case pursuant to law or policy, or (3) one which is subject to a deadline established by a federal court order.

⁸ A "removal" case includes a case in removal proceedings, in addition to any reopened, recalendared, or remanded cases in exclusion or deportation proceedings.

⁹ A completed removal case is one in which a final decision has been rendered concluding the case at the immigration court level and encompasses an order of removal, an order of voluntary departure, an order terminating proceedings, or an order granting protection or relief from removal. For other types of cases, a completed case is one in which a final decision has been rendered appropriate for the specific type of case proceeding.

Over the same period, 1 Immigration and Customs Enforcement removed approximately 1,716 aliens with national security concerns. Fu alone DHS had 2,554 encounters with individuals on the terrorist watch list (also known as the FBI's Terrorist Security Database) traveling to the United States.

This report was required by Section 11 of President Trump's <u>Executive Order 13780</u>, <u>Protecting the Nation fron</u> <u>Terrorist Entry into the United States</u>, which declared that "it is the policy of the United States to protect its citi terrorist attacks, including those committed by foreign nationals," directed a series of actions to enhance the secu safety of the American people. The actions directed by Executive Order have raised the baseline for the vetting of foreign nationals, prevented the entry of malicious actors, and enhanced the safety and security of the America

"This report reveals an indisputable sobering reality—our immigration system has undermined our national sect public safety," said Attorney General Sessions. "And the information in this report is only the tip of the iceberg: have terrorism-related investigations against thousands of people in the United States, including hundreds of pehere as refugees. Our law enforcement professionals do amazing work, but it is simply not reasonable to keep as risk their lives to enforce the law while we admit thousands every year without sufficient knowledge about their The pillars of President Trump's immigration policy—securing our porous borders, moving to a merit-based imm system that ends the use of diversity visas and chain migration, and enforcing our nation's laws—will make their and make the United States a safer place."

"My top priority as Secretary of Homeland Security is to ensure the safety and security of the American people,' Secretary Nielsen. "This report is a clear reminder of why we cannot continue to rely on immigration policy base thinking that leaves us woefully vulnerable to foreign-born terrorists, and why we must examine our visa laws a intensify screening and vetting of individuals traveling to the United States to prevent terrorists, criminals, and (dangerous individuals from reaching our country. Without legislative change, DHS will continue to see thousands year attempt to enter the United States, and while we must be right every time, the terrorists only need to be lu Therefore, DHS has personnel deployed around the world and along our borders working with our global and dor enforcement partners to stop terrorists before they enter the homeland."

The report reveals that at least 549 individuals were convicted of international terrorism-related charges in U.S. courts between September 11, 2001, and December 31, 2016. An analysis conducted by DHS determined that a 73 percent (402 of these 549 individuals) were foreign-born. Breaking down the 549 individuals by citizenship s time of their respective convictions reveals that:

- 254 were not U.S. citizens;
- · 148 were foreign-born, naturalized and received U.S. citizenship; and,
- · 147 were U.S. citizens by birth.

According to information available to U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE), since September 11, 20 were approximately 1,716 removals of aliens with national security concerns.

As mentioned above, in FY 2017, DHS encountered 2,554 individuals on the terrorist watchlist (also km wn as th Terrorist Screening Database) traveling to the United States. Of those individuals, 335 were attempting to enter 2,170 were attempting to enter by air, and 49 were attempting to enter by sea. Where consistent with the law, s individuals are denied entry into the United States, while in some cases law enforcement authorities are notified appropriate action.

From October 1, 2011, to September 30, 2017, a total of 355,345 non-U.S. citizen offenders, were administrative after previously being convicted of an aggravated felony, as defined in 8 U.S.C. § 1101(a)(43), or two or more crip punishable by more than one year (felony offenses). During that same period, a total of 372,098 non-U.S. citizen were removed from the United States after conviction of an aggravated felony or two or more felonies.

Data from U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services' Fraud Detection and National Security Directorate shows t 2007 and 2017, USCIS referred 45,858 foreign nationals who applied for immigration benefits to ICE for crimina enforcement action, based on information indicating that such foreign nationals had committed egregious publics offenses within the United States.

Between FY 2010 and FY 2016, CBP identified and prevented the boarding of 73,261 foreign travelers on flights the United States, who may have presented an immigration or security risk.

In October, the Trump Administration sent to Congress a list of legislative priorities that would enhance our nati such as eliminating the diversity visa lottery and extended family chain migration, funding the wall, closing looph asylumsystem, combatting visa overstays, and closing other loopholes in existing law that potentially benefit alie threats to our national security.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SESSIONS APPLAUDS CHINA FOR RESTRICTING TWO FENTANYL PRECURSORS

WASHINGTON – Today Attorney General Jeff Sessions applauded the Chinese government for announcing that it would restrict two chemical precursors to fentanyl.

"Synthetic opioids are killing thousands of people in communities across this nation, and we know that many of these substances originated in China," Attorney General Sessions said. "President Trump and I have repeatedly brought up this issue with the Chinese government, and we are working to restrict the flow of these drugs to our country. I am pleased to see China taking steps that will protect not just their own people from this poison, but the American people, too. I hope that China will continue to take steps like this and eventually schedule all fentanyl analogues, just as the DEA is doing."

In 2017, China scheduled a number of fentanyl-class substances, including carfentanil, furanyl fentanyl, valeryl fentanyl, acryl fentanyl, U-47700, MT-45, PMMA, and 4,4' DMAR. Last week, China's Ministry of Public Security announced that, effective Feb. 1, NPP and 4ANPP, substances that can be used to make illicit fentanyl, would also be scheduled.

U.S. Department of Justice and Chinese officials maintain frequent contact to collaborate and share data on the threat from fentanyl-class substances. Information-sharing includes scientific data, trafficking trends, and sample exchanges. This dialogue has resulted in more effective methods for identifying deadly substances for government control.

Attorney General Sessions and Deputy Attorney General Rosenstein both requested China's scheduling action in meetings with then-State Councilor Guo Shengkun of the Chinese Ministry of Public Security. Deputy Attorney General Rosenstein met with then-State Councilor Guo in Beijing. China on Sept. 25, 2017 and the Attorney General met with him in Washington, D.C. on Oct. 3 and 4, 2017.

In October, Deputy Attorney General Rosenstein <u>announced</u> the first-ever indictment of Chinese nationals for attempting to distribute massive quantities of synthetic opioids in two different regions of the United States.

It is estimated that, in 2016, <u>more than 20,000 Americans</u> were killed by overdoses of fentanyl or fentanyl analogues, making these the deadliest drugs in America. According to <u>the U.S.-China Commission</u>, a majority of the fentanyl products in the United States originated in China.

And if it were the other way around, if tens of thousands of Chinese nationals were dying as a result of poison shipped from the United States, we would be proactive."

However, in little noticed comments, a Chinese official told Vice News, that nah, China won't be proactive.

Yu Haibin, of China's National Narcotics Control Commission, told Vice News, "We don't have evidence indicating them breaking Chinese law. Our counterparts in the U.S. have also failed to provide such evidence. Therefore regarding these two suspects, we haven't reached a point to indict or arrest them yet."

ATTORNEY GENERAL SESSIONS ANNOUNCES HEZBOLLAH FINANCING AND NARCOTERRORISM TEAM

WASHINGTON – Attorney General Jeff Sessions today announced the creation of the Hezbollah Financing and Narcoterrorism Team (HFNT), a group of experienced international narcotics trafficking, terrorism, organized crime, and money laundering prosecutors. HFNT prosecutors and investigators are tasked with investigating individuals and networks providing support to Hezbollah, and pursuing prosecutions in any appropriate cases. The HFNT will begin by assessing the evidence in existing investigations, including cases stemming from Project Cassandra, a law enforcement initiative targeting Hezbollah's drug trafficking and related operations.

Acting Assistant Attorney General John P. Cronan of the Justice Department's Criminal Division will supervise the HENT and will convene a coordination meeting focused on identifying and combatting such support to Hezbollah. The HFNT will coordinate with, among others, investigators from the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), including the DEA's Special Operations Division; Federal Bureau of Investigation; Homeland Security Investigations; Assistant United States Attorneys; and attorneys from the Justice Department's Criminal Division and National Security Division.

"The Justice Department will leave no stone unturned in order to eliminate threats to our citizens from terrorist organizations and to stem the tide of the devastating drug crisis," said Attorney General Sessions. "In an effort to protect Americans from both threats, the Justice Department will assemble leading investigators and prosecutors to ensure that all Project Cassandra investigations as well as other related investigations, whether past or present, are given the needed resources and attention to come to their proper resolution. The team will initiate prosecutions that will restrict the flow of money to foreign terrorist organizations as well as disrupt violent international drug trafficking operations."

"The investigation and prosecution of terrorist organizations that contribute to the growing drug crisis are a priority for this administration," said Acting Assistant General Cronan. "At the Attorney General's direction, the HFNT will use all appropriate tools to aggressively investigate and prosecute those who provide financial support to Hezbollah in an effort to eradicate the illicit networks that fuel terrorism and the drug crisis."

JUSTICE DEPARTMENT SECURES FIRST DENATURALIZATION AS A RESULT OF OPERATION JANUS

On January 5, Judge Stanley R. Chesler of the U.S. District Court for the District of New Jersey entered an order revoking the naturalized U.S. citizenship of Baljinder Singh aka Davinder Singh, and canceling his Certificate of Naturalization, the Justice Department announced.

Following Judge Chesler's order, Singh's immigration status reverted from naturalized citizen to lawful permanent resident, rendering him potentially subject to removal proceedings at the Department of Homeland Security's discretion.

Singh's denaturalization is the first arising out of a growing body of cases referred to the Department of Justice by United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) as part of <u>Operation Janus</u>. The action against Singh was filed contemporaneously with two other Operation Janus cases, as <u>announced</u> by the Justice Department on September 19, 2017.

A Department of Homeland Security initiative, Operation Janus, identified about 315,000 cases where some fingerprint data was missing from the centralized digital fingerprint repository. Among those cases, some may have sought to circumvent criminal record and other background checks in the naturalization process. These cases are the result of an ongoing collaboration between the two departments to investigate and seek denaturalization proceedings against those who obtained citizenship unlawfully.

"The defendant exploited our immigration system and unlawfully secured the ultimate immigration benefit of naturalization, which undermines both the nation's security and our lawful immigration system," said Acting Assistant Attorney General Chad Readler of the Justice Department's Civil Division. "The Justice Department will continue to use every tool to protect the integrity of our nation's immigration system, including the use of civil denaturalization."

USCIS dedicated a team to review these Operation Janus cases, and the agency has stated its intention to refer approximately an additional 1,600 for prosecution.

"We appreciate the dedication of our Justice Department partners as we work together to ensure the integrity of our nation's legal immigration system," said USCIS Director L. Francis Cissna. "I hope this case, and those to follow, send a loud message that attempting to fraudulently obtain U.S. citizenship will not be tolerated. Our nation's citizens deserve nothing less."

Baljinder Singh aka Davinder Singh, 43, a native of India, arrived at San Francisco International Airport

Davinder Singh. He was placed in exclusion proceedings, but failed to appear for his immigration court hearing and was ordered excluded and deported on January 7, 1992. Four weeks later, on February 6, 1992, he filed an asylum application under the name Baljinder Singh. He claimed to be an Indian who entered the United States without inspection. Singh abandoned that application after he married a U.S. citizen, who filed a visa petition on his behalf. Singh naturalized under the name Baljinder Singh on July 28, 2006. Singh has been residing in Carteret, New Jersey.

This case was investigated by USCIS and the Civil Division's Office of Immigration Litigation, District Court Section (OIL-DCS). The case was prosecuted by Counsel for National Security Aaron Petty of OIL-DCS's National Security and Affirmative Litigation Unit, with support from Deputy Chief Patrice Rodman of USCIS's Office of the Chief Counsel, Northeast Law Division and Immigration Services Officer Caroline D'Angelo of USCIS's Field Operations Directorate.

CHESLER, District Judge

This matter comes before the Court upon Plaintiff's filing of a motion for summary judgment (Docket No. 7) pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 56(c), to seek an order of denaturalization against Defendant Baljinder Singh a/k/a Davinder Singh¹ under 8 United States Code § 1451(a). Defendant has not opposed the motion, nor has he responded to the complaint filed on September 19, 2017 (Docket No. 1). The Court has reviewed the Plaintiff's unopposed motion and proceeds to rule without oral argument. <u>See</u> Fed. R. Civ. P. 78(b). For the reasons set forth below, Plaintiff's motion will be granted.

¹ Plaintiff has submitted a laboratory report by the Homeland Security Investigations-Forensic Laboratory of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which compares a January 24, 1992 fingerprint card bearing the name Baljinder Singh to a September 25, 1991 fingerprint card bearing the name Davinder Singh. (Docket No. 7-2.) Based on a comparative analysis of the friction ridge details of each fingerprint, the report concludes that the fingerprints match and belong to the same individual. Plaintiff relies on this report to contend that Baljinder Singh and Davinder Singh are, in fact, the same individual. (Plaintiff's Statement of Undisputed Material Fact ("SUMF") \P 4.) Having received no opposition to this motion from Defendant to impeach the credibility of this scientific fingerprint analysis, this Court finds that there is no genuine issue as to the fact that Davinder and Baljinder Singh are the same individual. Accordingly, the Court refers to both names interchangeably as 'Defendant.'

The Justice Department issued new measures on Wednesday that will prioritize certain immigration cases in an effort to streamline a system that nearly tripled the caseload of judges during the Obama administration.

A memo listing guidelines for all new cases filed and an order that all immigration court cases that are reopened must establish case priorities was sent by John McHenry, the director of the Justice Department's Executive Office for Immigration Review, to the Office of Chief Immigration Judge, all immigration judges, all court administrators and all immigration court staff.

"In 2010, immigration court benchmarks for non-detained cases were abruptly abandoned, and since that time -- perhaps non-coincidentally -- the caseload has tripled," Justice Department spokesman Devin O'Malley said in a statement to Fox News, noting that the reintroduction of court-based goals and benchmarks would "assist in properly managing cases, increase productivity, and reduce the pending caseload."

"Some policies implemented in the immigration court system in recent years have contributed to a three-fold increase of the courts' pending caseload," O'Malley said to Fox News, noting that certain "prioritization practices" made the caseload "worse" by continuing cases that could be resolved more quickly in favor of cases that often took longer to complete.

It was "the immigration court equivalent of fiddling while Rome burned," O'Malley said.

McHenry's memo is part of a larger push led by Attorney General Jeff Sessions, who issued a broader memo late last year outlining principles to ensure that the "adjudication of immigration court cases serves the national interest," and gave McHenry the "authority" to set time frames for the resolution of cases, and to evaluate the performance of immigration judges and "take corrective action where needed."

Currently, less than 10 percent of immigration cases pending meet the definition of "priority," according to McHenry, leading him to address "confusion" and "clarify" the department's priorities. That statistic, however, conveys a "potentially mistaken impression" of the importance of completing the other 600,000-plus pending cases that do not bear a "priority" designation, according to McHenry.

"All cases involving individuals in detention or custody, regardless of the custodian are priorities for completion." McHanny wrote, but noted that "the designation of a case as a priority is not intended to mandate a specific outcome in any particular case."

Other measures McHenry ordered were new benchmarks for courts, and for immigration judges.

The new measures require that 85 percent of all non-status detained removal cases be completed within 60 days of filing; 85 percent of all non-status nondetained removal cases be completed within 1 year of filing; and 85 percent of all motions adjudicated within 14 days of the request.

McHenry also required 90 percent of custody redeterminations to be completed within 14 days of the request, and 95 percent of all hearings to be completed on their initial scheduled hearing date.

Another new rule requires 100 percent of "all credible fear reviews" to be completed within seven days.

 This case took 108 days from filing to order of denaturalization—abnormally quick for federal civil litigation.

From the opinion:

- "There is no genuine dispute that Defendant misrepresented or concealed facts related to his immigration history in his Form N-400 naturalization form, including facts related to the prior use of a different name (Part 1, Question C); having committed a prior crime or previously been arrested or detained (Part 10, Section D, Questions 15 and 16); giving false information in an immigration proceeding and lying to a U.S. official to gain entry into the United States (Part 10, Section D, Questions 23 and 24); and previously being ordered to be removed, excluded, or deported from the U.S and applying for relief from such an order (Part 10, Section E, Questions 27 and 28)." – Opinion at 10

- "Defendant procured his naturalization as a result of these misrepresentations and concealments. If Defendant had not made these misrepresentations in the Form N-400 or in his naturalization interview, it is fair to infer that he would not have been granted naturalization. Indeed, he was not eligible for naturalization under the name Davinder Singh, due to the in absentia exclusion order against him. By not disclosing this information, Defendant was able to successfully naturalize under the name Baljinder Singh. As such, Defendant's naturalization was procured as a result of these misrepresentations and concealments. Since the Government has demonstrated, through clear and convincing evidence, that all four denaturalization requirements in Kungys are satisfied, this Court will grant its motion for summary judgment and enter an order to revoke Defendant's naturalization and cancel his certificate of naturalization." - Opinion at 12.

¹ Plaintiff has submitted a laboratory report by the Homeland Security Investigations-Forensic Laboratory of the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, which compares a January 24, 1992 fingerprint card bearing the name Baljinder Singh to a September 25, 1991 fingerprint card bearing the name Davinder Singh. (Docket No. 7-2.) Based on a comparative analysis of the friction ridge details of each fingerprint, the report concludes that the fingerprints match and belong to the same individual. Plaintiff relies on this report to contend that Baljinder Singh and Davinder Singh are, in fact, the same individual. (Plaintiff's Statement of Undisputed Material Fact ("SUMF") \P 4.) Having received no opposition to this motion from Defendant to impeach the credibility of this scientific fingerprint analysis, this Court finds that there is no genuine issue as to the fact that Davinder and Baljinder Singh are the same individual. Accordingly, the Court refers to both names interchangeably as 'Defendant.'
