Today, a bipartisan group of over 60 current and former elected prosecutors and attorneys general <u>urged</u> the Virginia Supreme Court to protect prosecutorial discretion after a Circuit Court judge in Virginia entered an unprecedented order removing Loudoun County Commonwealth's Attorney Buta Biberaj and her entire office from a case, with no prior notice, based solely on his personal disagreement with the office's handling of a plea agreement. Virginia law explicitly gives very limited power to courts to overrule decisions within a prosecutor's discretion, preventing the judiciary from infringing on prosecutorial autonomy.

"This dramatic and unprecedented move sent a clear message to CA Biberaj: exercise your discretion according to the court's values and judgment or risk losing oversight and control of your cases."

If allowed to stand, this decision would open the door to further judicial intrusion into the power uniquely vested in prosecutors and the rights of voters to determine their own vision for safety and justice.

"Since the founding of our country, prosecutorial discretion has been enshrined as a crucial part of our justice system, even as it was used to fuel mass incarceration at immense human and financial costs. Now, when reform-minded prosecutors and the voters who put them in office are rejecting decades of failed tough-on-crime policies, the discretion that judges have respected for centuries must continue to be protected."



Dear President Biden:

We are a group of current and former elected prosecutors and Attorneys General, former federal criminal justice leaders, and past and present law enforcement leaders writing to urge the Biden-Harris Administration to convene a **Presidential Task Force on 21st Century Prosecution** before the year is out.

The evidence is clear: our nation's decades of "tough on crime" practices have not created safety and have been an anathema to justice. The United States detains 2.3 million people in prisons, jails, and confinement facilities, more than any other democratic nation. Racial, ethnic, and class disparities pervade the criminal legal system: American justice is far from equal. Our communities in turn bear an enormous human and fiscal toll. Countless families have been torn apart by over-policing and over-incarceration. Too many Americans are trapped in poverty and unable to contribute to their communities because of their criminal records. Many marginalized neighborhoods, particularly Black communities, face cycles of trauma, violence, and disinvestment, and are denied opportunities. Although state and local prosecutors work to protect their communities through targeted prosecution of serious crimes and offering services for survivors, survivors of crime still do not receive the care they deserve. And taxpayers pay an estimated \$182 billion each year for our current system that throws away far too many lives as well as scarce resources. The

traditional punitive approach to prosecution has not made us safer and it has not brought justice. We urge the Biden-Harris Administration to help us chart a new path forward.

Every day, we fight for fairness and justice in our jurisdictions. We work in our jurisdictions to advance a new vision of justice, one in which all Americans are safe from harm and oppression, and empowered to collectively build a better future. We need allies and support in that fight. And we need national engagement.

Prosecutors possess far-reaching discretion to charge crimes, recommend bail, plea bargain, and recommend sentences. With this starting point in mind, it is not surprising that President Biden's <u>Plan for Strengthening America's Commitment to Justice</u> called for a "task force on prosecutorial discretion." Transforming prosecution must be at the heart of any effective criminal legal reform agenda.

Across the country over the past few years, a number of elected reform-minded prosecutors are boldly redefining what it means to be a prosecutor and how we can play a key role in a new 21st Century vision for prosecution. The prosecutorial profession, however, still has much to learn. In the model of the Presidential Task Force on 21st Century Policing, we need prosecutorial leaders at a state and local level to come together with justice-impacted people, defense attorneys, crime survivors, civil rights advocates, community and law enforcement leaders, researchers, Department of Justice representatives and other federal experts, and many others, to listen, share innovations, and together create a roadmap that can help promote the justice system our communities seek and deserve.

The American people have demanded change. The rallying cry to transform our criminal legal system stretches from the streets to <u>across the political aisle</u>. We urge the Biden-Harris Administration to seize this moment and create a Presidential Task Force on 21st Century Prosecution soon; our communities are urging us all to act.

Re: Federal Assistance to Stop Threats and Acts of Violence Against Public Schoolchildren, Public School Board Members, and Other Public School District Officials and Educators

Dear Mr. President:

America's public schools and its education leaders are under an immediate threat. The National School Boards Association (NSBA) respectfully asks for federal law enforcement and other assistance to deal with the growing number of threats of violence and acts of intimidation occurring across the nation. Local school board members want to hear from their communities on important issues and that must be at the forefront of good school board governance and promotion of free speech. However, there also must be safeguards in place to protect public schools and dedicated education leaders as they do their jobs.

NSBA believes immediate assistance is required to protect our students, school board members, and educators who are susceptible to acts of violence affecting interstate commerce because of threats to their districts, families, and personal safety. As our school boards continue coronavirus recovery operations within their respective districts, they are also persevering against other challenges that could impede this progress in a number of communities. Coupled with attacks against school board members and educators for approving policies for masks to protect the health and safety of students and school employees, many public school officials are also facing physical threats because of propaganda purporting the false inclusion of critical race theory within classroom instruction and curricula. This propaganda continues despite the fact that critical race theory is not taught in public schools and remains a complex law school and graduate school subject well beyond the scope of a K-12 class.

On behalf of our state associations and the more than 90,000 school board members who govern our country's 14,000 local public school districts educating more than 50 million schoolchildren, NSBA appreciates your leadership to end the proliferation of COVID-19 in our communities and our school districts. We also appreciate recent discussions with White House and U.S. Department of Education staff on many critical issues facing public schools, including threats school officials are receiving.

In addition, we applaud your actions to restore resources to school districts that have not yet received their education stabilization funding through the Project SAFE (Supporting America's Families and Educators) grant program for coronavirus recovery efforts, including the use of face masks and other precautions to help prevent COVID-19 infections among students and educators. Now, we ask that the federal government investigate, intercept, and prevent the current threats and acts of violence against our public school officials through existing statutes, executive authority, interagency and intergovernmental task forces, and other extraordinary measures to ensure the safety of our children and educators, to protect interstate commerce, and to preserve public school infrastructure and campuses.

While local and state law enforcement agencies are working with public school officials in several communities to prevent further disruptions to educational services and school district operations, law enforcement officials in some jurisdictions need assistance – including help with monitoring the threat levels. As these threats and acts of violence have become more prevalent – during public school board meetings, via documented threats transmitted through the U.S. Postal Service, through social media and other online platforms, and around personal properties – NSBA respectfully asks that a joint collaboration among federal law enforcement agencies, state and local law enforcement, and with public school officials be undertaken to focus on these threats. NSBA specifically solicits the expertise and resources of the U.S. Department of Justice, Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), U.S. Department of Homeland Security, U.S. Secret Service, and its National Threat Assessment Center³ regarding the level of risk to public schoolchildren, educators, board members, and facilities/campuses. We also request the assistance of the U.S. Postal Inspection Service to intervene against threatening letters and cyberbullying attacks that have been transmitted to students, school board members, district administrators, and other educators.

As these acts of malice, violence, and threats against public school officials have increased, the classification of these heinous actions could be the equivalent to a form of domestic terrorism and hate crimes. As such, NSBA requests a joint expedited review by the U.S. Departments of Justice, Education, and Homeland Security, along with the appropriate training, coordination, investigations, and enforcement mechanisms from the FBI, including any technical assistance necessary from, and state and local coordination with, its National Security Branch and Counterterrorism Division, as well as any other federal agency with relevant jurisdictional authority and oversight. Additionally, NSBA requests that such review examine appropriate enforceable actions against these crimes and acts of violence under the Gun-Free School Zones Act, the PATRIOT Act in regards to domestic terrorism, the Matthew Shepard and James Byrd Jr. Hate Crimes Prevention Act, the Violent Interference with Federally Protected Rights statute, the Conspiracy Against Rights statute, an Executive Order to enforce all applicable federal laws for the

protection of students and public school district personnel, and any related measure. As the threats grow and news of extremist hate organizations showing up at school board meetings is being reported, this is a critical time for a proactive approach to deal with this difficult issue.

These threats or actual acts of violence against our school districts are impacting the delivery of educational services to students and families, as many districts receive federal funds and subsidies for services to millions of students with disabilities, health screenings and supplemental supports for disadvantaged students, child nutrition, broadband connectivity, educator development, school safety activities, career and technical education, and more. School board meetings have been disrupted in California⁴, Florida⁵, Georgia⁶, and other states⁷ because of local directives for mask coverings to protect students and educators from COVID-19.

An individual was arrested in Illinois for aggravated battery and disorderly conduct during a school board meeting. During two separate school board meetings in Michigan, an individual yelled a Nazi salute in protest to masking requirements, and another individual prompted the board to call a recess because of opposition to critical race theory.

In New Jersey¹⁰, Ohio¹¹, and other states¹², anti-mask proponents are inciting chaos during board meetings. In Virginia¹³, an individual was arrested, another man was ticketed for trespassing, and a third person was hurt during a school board meeting discussion distinguishing current curricula from critical race theory and regarding equity issues. In other states including Washington¹⁴, Texas¹⁵, Wisconsin¹⁶, Wyoming¹⁷, and Tennessee¹⁸, school boards have been confronted by angry mobs and forced to end meetings abruptly. A resident in Alabama, who proclaimed himself as "vaccine police," has called school administrators while filming himself on Facebook Live.¹⁹

Other groups are posting watchlists against school boards and spreading misinformation that boards are adopting critical race theory curriculum and working to maintain online learning by haphazardly attributing it to COVID-19.²⁰

In Ohio, an individual mailed a letter to a school board member labeling the return address on the envelope from a local neighborhood association and then enclosing threatening hate mail from another entity.²¹ This correspondence states that, "We are coming after you and all the members on the ... BoE [Board of Education]." This hate mail continues by stating, "You are forcing them to wear mask—for no reason in this world other than control. And for that you will pay dearly." Among other incendiaries, this same threat also calls the school board member a "filthy traitor," implies loss of pension funds, and labels the school board as Marxist. Earlier this month, a student in Tennessee was mocked during a board meeting for advocating masks in schools after testifying that his grandmother, who was an educator, died because of COVID-19.²² These threats and acts of violence are affecting our nation's democracy at the very foundational levels, causing school board members – many who are not paid – to resign immediately and/or discontinue their service after their respective terms.²³ Further, this increasing violence is a clear and present danger to civic participation, in which other citizens who have been contemplating service as either an elected or appointed school board member have reconsidered their decision.

NSBA believes public discussions and transparency by local school board members are important for the safe and effective operations of schools.²⁴ It is vital that public discourses be encouraged in a safe and open environment, in which varying viewpoints can be offered in a peaceful manner. Our children are watching the examples of the current debates and we must encourage a positive dialogue even with different opinions. However, with such acute threats and actions that are disruptive to our students' well-being, to the safety of public school officials and personnel, and to interstate commerce, we urge the federal government's intervention against individuals or hate groups who are targeting our schools and educators.

Re: Potential Hatch Act Violations

Dear Mr. Kerner:

America First Legal Foundation ("AFL") respectfully requests that the Office of Special Counsel investigate whether Biden Administration officials from the White House, the Department of Justice, and the Department of Education violated the Hatch Act in an attempt to influence the outcome of the 2021 Virginia state elections—most notably, the gubernatorial race.

The Office of Special Counsel ("OSC") is tasked with administration and enforcement of the Hatch Act, which restricts certain political activities of Federal employees to ensure that government resources are not used to advance partisan campaigns. To this end, OSC can conduct investigations of alleged violations of the Hatch Act.¹

As described below, it appears as though Biden Administration officials concocted and executed a scheme designed to influence the outcome of the election, which culminated in the issuance of an unfounded memorandum from Attorney General Merrick Garland that threatened to chill the free speech rights of parents in Virginia and across the United States.

I. Background

CRT Becomes a Central Issue in Virginia State Elections

Throughout the summer of 2021, parents nationwide protested public school policies and practices associated with, among other things, the teaching of certain principles

of critical race theory ("CRT") to K-12 students. Virginia became an epicenter for many of the parental protests, with Loudon County garnering national attention.²

The issue became a central focus in the Virginia gubernatorial race. By May 2021, Republican candidate Glenn Youngkin and other Republican candidates had signed a pledge to oppose the teaching of CRT in schools.³ In June 2021, Democratic candidate Terry McAuliffe described concerns about CRT being taught in school as a "right-wing conspiracy."⁴ Media outlets noted how the CRT/school curriculum issue had become a central issue in the Virginia elections.⁵

In this context, Biden Administration officials at the White House, the Department of Justice, and the Department of Education coordinated with political allies including the National School Boards Association ("NSBA") and others, likely including persons connected to, affiliated with, or funded by the National Education Association ("NEA") and the American Federation of Teachers ("AFT"), to insert themselves into the debate in defense of CRT, in an attempt to benefit Democratic candidate McAuliffe.

According to our information, in early September 2021, Biden Administration officials discussed with key Administration allies avenues for potential federal action against parents who opposed the teaching of CRT in schools. Senior Department of Justice officials, including at least one political appointee in the Department's Civil Rights Division, discussed potential federal action with these allies. Notably, officials in the White House are said to have separately expressed concern regarding the potential partisan political impact of parent mobilization and organization around school issues in the upcoming midterm elections.

Our information shows further that at the express direction of the White House, or with its express consent, Biden Administration officials developed a plan to use a

letter from an outside group (with a preference for "not the usual suspects") as pretext for federal action to chill, deter, and discourage parents from exercising their constitutional rights and privileges.

While this effort was underway in Washington D.C., there was a gubernatorial debate between candidates Youngkin and McAuliffe in Virginia on September 28, 2021. The issue of parental involvement in school curriculum was hotly contested by the two candidates, with Youngkin asserting, "I believe parents should be in charge of their kids' education."6 McAuliffe responded, "I don't think parents should be telling schools what they should teach."7

In media reports following the debate, it became clear that McAuliffe's statement dismissing parents' concerns was a major liability for his election prospects. The Washington Examiner noted that "[f]ormer Virginia Gov. Terry McAuliffe handed his Republican gubernatorial opponent Glenn Youngkin a campaign ad on a silver platter during a Tuesday debate by stating that he would not allow parents to tell schools what to teach their children."8 Another report characterized McAuliffe's comment as "an apparent rebuke of ongoing parental concerns in Loudoun County, Va," where the education battle burned hottest throughout 2021.9

Indeed, those concerns about McAuliffe's statement would prove to be valid, as throughout the month of October, and even after the election, political observers would point to that moment as the reason for his sinking prospects and, ultimately, his defeat on November 2, 2021.¹⁰

The Attorney General's October 4, 2021, Memorandum

On September 29, 2021, the very day after McAuliffe's campaign-changing debate disaster, the National School Boards Association, citing legal authorities including the Patriot Act, sent a letter to President Biden demanding federal action to confront

"the growing number of threats of violence and acts of intimidation" to local school board members arising out of "policies for masks to protect the health and safety of students and school employees" and "propaganda purporting the false inclusion of critical race theory within classroom instruction and curricula." ¹¹

Media reports indicate that Education Secretary Miguel Cardona solicited this letter from the NSBA.¹² According to an October 5, 2021, email obtained by Parents Defending Education via a Freedom of Information Act request, the NSBA Secretary-Treasurer recalled that the organization's interim CEO "told the officers he was writing a letter to provide information to the White House, from a request by Secretary Cardona." ¹³

Meanwhile, on September 30, 2021, Loudoun County School Board Member Atoosa Reaser announced via Twitter that she would be campaigning with Vice-President Kamala Harris's husband and Terry McAuliffe that weekend. The next day, on October 1, 2021, Reaser tweeted, "School Boards Ask @JoeBiden to Review Threats and Violence as Possible 'Domestic Terrorism' and linked to an Education Week article about the NSBA letter. A fellow school board member responded "Funny, our school board did NOT vote on this. I do not think it appropriate for an elected official on her official social media feed to make such a misleading statement without input from her full school board." 16

On October 2, 2021, Reaser tweeted, "Kicking off a weekend of action w/ @Douglas Emhoff @Terry McAuliffe @JenniferWexton @MarkHerringVA @WendyGooditisVA @ShuasforVA @kmurphyva @biberajbb @SylviaBroadRun @MarkKeam @AtoosaReaser @JenniferBoysko" and included pictures from the campaign event with several of the Virginia Democrats running for election. 17

Just two days later, and five days after the NSBA letter, on October 4, 2021 Attorney General Merrick Garland released a memorandum to the FBI Director, DOJ officials,

and U.S. Attorneys on the subject of "Partnership Among Federal, State, Local, Tribal, and Territorial Law Enforcement to Address Threats Against School Administrators, Board Members, Teachers, and Staff." Using language strikingly similar to that of the NSBA's letter, the Memorandum cited "a disturbing spike in harassment, intimidation, and threats of violence against school administrators, board members, teachers, and staff," before directing the FBI and U.S. Attorneys to "convene meetings with federal, state, local, Tribal, and territorial leaders ... to facilitate the discussion of strategies for addressing threats against school administrators, board members, teaches, and staff."

The abbreviated period between the NSBA's Wednesday, September 29th letter to President Biden and the Attorney General's Monday, October 4th Memorandum strongly suggests coordination between the parties. It is extraordinarily rare for a letter to even be routed from the White House to an executive agency or department in such an abbreviated period—much less result in the issuance of a memorandum of the head of a cabinet department.

Notably, the Attorney General's Memorandum does not appear to have been generated because of information collected by the FBI. Indeed, in response to a Freedom of Information request submitted to the FBI by AFL seeking, among other things, all records showing the "disturbing spike in harassment, intimidation, and threats of violence" referenced in the Attorney General's Memorandum, as well as all records "relied upon to support that finding, the FBI denied having *any* responsive records whatsoever. This curious lack of records documenting a need for the Attorney General's aggressive actions suggests that the Memorandum may have been spurred because of other—perhaps political—interests.

On October 14, 2021, during the White House Press Briefing, Press Secretary Jen Psaki admitted, "President [Biden], of course, wants former Governor McAuliffe to be the future governor of Virginia," and that, "we're going to do everything we can to help former Governor McAuliffe." Later in the same press conference, Psaki assured that she expected President Biden would "do more to help his friend, Governor Terry McAuliffe." 19

II. Analysis

The Hatch Act prohibits any executive branch official or employee from "us[ing] his official authority or influence for the purpose of interfering with or affecting the result of an election." 5 U.S.C. § 7323(a)(1). Certain federal employees, including employees of law enforcement agencies, are "further restricted," meaning they are also prohibited from "tak[ing] an active part in political management or political campaigns." *Id.* at § 7323

The chronology of events leading up to the release of the Attorney General's October 4th Memorandum at a minimum creates the appearance of federal government intervention in several closely contested partisan state elections by taking official action on the central issue in those campaigns, for the purpose of influencing those elections. The close coordination and planning between government officials and non-government allies, the FBI's own representation that the agency lacked any record of violence or threats of violence at the FBI, and the curious timing of the Attorney General's actions, together suggest that the motivations behind these actions were impermissibly intended to reflect favorably on Democrat candidates, in violation of the Hatch Act.

III. Conclusion

For the foregoing reasons, AFL respectfully requests that OSC investigate whether officials from the White House, the Department of Justice, the Department of Education, or others violated the Hatch Act.
