MR. ZWONITZER: Some. He had be down once in 2010 also to talk about the possibility of a book but that it sort of went nowhere.

MR. (b)(6),(b)(7)(C) What -- can you tell us about that?
Who did you -- did you go down to the Naval Observatory?

MR. ZWONITZER: Yeah.

MR. (b) (6), (b) (7)(C) What was --

MR. ZWONITZER: He just had me into the -- I was actually down there. I was serving on an NEH panel. I was -- so I was in Washington at the time and I can't remember how it happened. But his office reached out and asked if I would go to the Naval Observatory, which I did.
