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THREE INDIVIDUALS INDICTED ON CHILD EXPLOITATION CHARGES

MEMPHIS - U.S. Attorney David F. Kustoff of the Western District of Tennessee announced a federal grand jury returned three indictments charging three individuals with violations of federal criminal law involving the production and possession of child pornography; and interstate travel for the purpose of engaging in sexual activity with a minor. The indictments resulted from investigations conducted by member agencies of the FBI Memphis Crimes against Children Task Force.

Steven C. Haney, 47, of Cordova, Tennessee was indicted for using, persuading, and enticing a minor to engage in sexually explicit conduct for the purpose of producing visual depictions of such conduct. The maximum penalty for first violation of this statute, not less than 10 years, not more than 20 years prison, \$250,000 fine, or both; and possession of child pornography. The maximum penalty for first violation of this statute, not more than 10 years prison, \$250,000 fine, or both.

Sean William Norman, 34, of Albuquerque, New Mexico was indicted for interstate travel from outside the State of Tennessee to the Western District of Tennessee, for the purpose of engaging in sexual activity with a minor. The maximum penalty for first violation of this statute, not more than 30 years prison, \$250,000 fine, or both.

Donald Brent Page, 32, Calera, Alabama was indicted for interstate travel from the State of Alabama to the Western District of Tennessee, for the purpose of engaging in sexual activity with a minor. The maximum penalty for first violation of this statute, not more than 30 years prison, \$250,000 fine, or both.

This case was brought as part of Project Safe Childhood, a nationwide initiative designed to protect children from online exploitation and abuse. Led by the United States Attorneys Offices, Project Safe Childhood marshals federal, state and local resources to better locate, apprehend, and prosecute individuals who exploit children via the Internet, as well as identify and rescue victims.
