Among the items of evidence which the Government desires to introduce in the forthcoming trial of the above entitled case are a series of 7 plastic phonographic recordings, each designated #K5914, and dated July 19, 1943. This series of 7 records constitutes one complete program designated for radio broadcast and spoken by the subject.

It is anticipated that some difficulty may be experienced in seeking to have these records admitted in evidence from the standpoint of establishing the source of the same and the manner and means by which they came into the possession of the Government.

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Mr. Victor C. Woerheide, Attorney, Department of Justice, was one of several representatives of the Department who went to Germany in 1946 for the purpose of securing evidence in divers treason cases then pending in relation to American citizens who had been employed during the war by the German Broadcasting Corporation.

In describing how he came into possession of the phonographic recordings in question, Mr. Woerheide states that in the latter part of February, or the early part of March, 1946, while in Berlin, Germany, and shortly prior to the apprehension of the subject, he was informed by a former neighbor of the subject that certain personal property belonging to Miss Gillars was located in an apartment house adjoining the premises in which the subject had lived during the war.

At that time, Miss Gillars was in hiding in Germany, under the assumed name of Barbara Mome, and was the object of a search conducted by the Counter Intelligence Corps, U. S. Army, under the direction of Special Agent, CIC. accompanied Mr. Woerheide to the apartment house in question and conducted a search in a basement storeroom where the phonographic records in question were found and turned over by to Mr. Woerheide.

Inquiry has recently been made of the CIC, European Command, in order to ascertain the present whereabouts of since it is believed that he will be a necessary witness at the trial. This source advises that it has no information in this connection save that

Statement by

Subject: Mildred GILLARS.

In 1940, as Miss Gillars was beginning to work for the German "Sender Bremen", she declared, that she never wanted to work again for the USA.

I was then the

of Miss Mildred Gillars.

At the time, as the USA were going to come into the war, there was given an occasion to all American citizens living in Berlin, to leave Germany. Miss Gillars was at that time in a full despair because she wanted to return to her home country and on the other hand she could not. She had a big confidence in me. So she told me private things, which she never will tell to the court.

The main reason was, that she was in love to a certain German Natural Philosopher, who had declared, that he wanted to marry her. This man told her, that, if she would return to America, he never would marry her. She asked me for my advice. I said to her, that, if she was really sure, her friend would marry her, it would be better for her future, if she would remain in Germany, as she had no relations in the USA.

This discussion was confidential and I never told something about it to my superiors. At the same time Herr Kamm, the leading director of the "Sender Bremen Friesland Calais" (Europa-Sender), asked me whether Miss Gillars wanted to leave or to stay. - I answered, that I had got the impression, that she wanted to remain in Germany. Mr. Kamm laughed and said, that even in the case, if she wanted to return to America, there would be more than one possibility to stop her, because the German "Hundfunk" wanted her in Berlin. So I believe that in the case, that she had wanted to go, the Gestapo would have prohibited it, so it was not in her free will to go or to remain.

Later on, in 1945, her friend had obviously broken his promise, I guess, for in that year she tried to commit suicide. It was prevented by her colleagues, Miss [redacted] who entered her residence in the certain night by force, because she had got some notion about the intention of Ms. Gillars, and about the opened gas-valve. At the same time I was sent to the Russian front and could not speak to her about this case.

Miss Gillars never had been a Nazi, I often had to warn her, that her speeches about Goebbels a.s.o. would be very dangerous for her. She always declared, that she loved her home country and would remain a good American during her life-time.

Reference is made to our earlier memorandum herein, dated October 9, 1948, as to which the Bureau furnished its report dated November 10, 1948, to Cleveland, Ohio. It is noted in the above report that the death certificate in the name of R. B. Gillars recites his marital status as "divorced" and from other information contained in the report there is no question but that the said R. B. Gillars was the stepfather of the subject.

It is requested that the records of the appropriate court in Mansfield, Ohio, be examined to determine whether or not there is a record of divorce proceedings between R. B. Gillars and Ray Gillars. If such records exist, it is probable that the pleadings and/or the testimony in the case will contain some reference to the subject herein, possibly giving her date and place of birth and revealing that she was a child of the mother's first marriage and a stepchild of R. B. Gillars.

It is also of importance to ascertain the date and place of the marriage between R. B. Gillars and Ray Gillars. If this information can be obtained from the divorce records on file in Mansfield, Ohio, the Bureau is further requested to continue its investigation, at whatever city such marriage took place, in search of additional documentary proof (from the application for the marriage license, etc.) which demonstrates that the subject of this case was born Mildred E. Bisk and subsequently became a stepchild of R. B. Gillars (thus accounting for the subject's use of the name "Gillars" throughout the major portion of her life). In the event no record of divorce is found in the courts at Mansfield, Ohio, a similar search should be undertaken at Piqua, Ohio (or the County Seat of the county in which Piqua is located), since it is believed possible that the wife was living in Piqua, Ohio, at the time the divorce was obtained. If, in the course of this search, any documents are noted which refer to the subject in this case demonstrating her relationship of stepdaughter to R. B. Gillars or setting forth the subject's date and place of birth or true name at time of birth, etc., certified copies of such documents should be obtained and furnished to the Criminal Division.

We respectfully request, therefore, that you be kind enough to permit _____ to depart from Holland for the United States on a date which will assure his arrival in Washington, D. C., at any time between January 24, and February 1, 1949. It is expected that Mr. Blackston, Vice-Consul for the United States, in Amsterdam, Holland, will get in touch with you and with _____ in January and arrange the exact date of _____ departure that will meet with your convenience and which will permit him to arrive in Washington within the period of time indicated above.
