Dine & Dialogue: American Indian and Alaska Native Trauma Informed Care and Suicide Prevention

This plenary session will provide information about the health effects on American Indian/Alaska Native (AI/AN) communities arising from trauma within the context of historical/intergenerational trauma, early childhood trauma, sexual assault, domestic violence,

and other environmental traumas. The panelists will discuss trauma informed care principles for Al/ANs as part of efforts made by a SAMHSA-sponsored workgroup and will seek input from participants. The session will also describe a prevention planning guide that lays the framework for comprehensive prevention planning within Al/AN communities while honoring and preserving the uniqueness of individual tribes and villages. This guide, *To Live to See the Great Day That Dawns: Preventing Suicide by American Indians and Alaska Native Youth and Young Adults*, represents a starting point for discovery.
