Introduction and Purpose

CTAS provides federally recognized tribes and tribal consortia an opportunity to apply for funding to aid in developing a comprehensive and coordinated approach to public safety and victimization.



How does CTAS work?

Applicants select the DOJ component and program/purpose area(s) that best address their individual public safety, criminal and juvenile justice and/or victimization needs.

These purpose areas focus on:

- Enhancing law enforcement;
- Preventing and controlling juvenile delinquency;
- Strengthening the juvenile justice system;
- Improving the investigation and prosecution of child abuse cases; and
- Addressing the needs of survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking sex trafficking and other crimes.


The <u>U.S. Department of Justice</u> (DOJ) is seeking applications for funding to improve public safety and victim services in tribal communities. This solicitation provides federally recognized tribes and tribal consortia an opportunity to apply for funding to aid in developing a comprehensive and coordinated approach to public safety and victimization. The majority of DOJ's existing Tribal Government—specific programs are included in and available through this single Coordinated Tribal Assistance Solicitation.

Fiscal Year 2020 competitive grant announcement



Changes to the FY 2020 Solicitation



- The previously required document, tribal authority to apply, has been eliminated (except for tribal consortia and designees) to reduce the burden on applicants.
- OVC's Tribal Victim Services Program (PA 7) and BJA's Addressing Violent Crime in Native Communities (PA 10) will not be included this year.
- BJA's Tribal Justice System Infrastructure Program (PA 4) has expanded to support infrastructure projects related to domestic violence shelters, safe homes, transitional living facilities, and advocacy programs.



Changes to the FY 2020 Solicitation



For Fiscal Year 2020, awards under the following Purpose Areas will be made for 60 months for:


- COPS Office's Public Safety and Community Policing (hiring officers)
- Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems Strategic Planning
- BJA's Tribal Justice Systems Program
- BJA's Tribal Justice System Infrastructure Program
- OJJDP's Juvenile Tribal Healing to Wellness Courts
- OJJDP's Tribal Youth Program

OVW's Violence Against Women Tribal Governments Program. Awards will be made for up to \$900,000 for 36 months. Grantees may be eligible to receive 24 months of additional noncompetitive funding up to \$600,000 to continue their projects.

Public Safety and Community Policing (PA 1)

GOAL: to expand the implementation of community policing and meet the most serious needs of law enforcement in Tribal Nations through a broadened comprehensive program.





Public Safety and Community Policing (PA 1)

Project Funds May Support the Following:

Federal Award Information

The COPS Office anticipates making up to \$24 million available through this purpose area—awarding up to 40 applications.

The COPS Office will impose caps on FY2020 awards based on the number of sworn officers:

- Sworn officers of fewer than 10: No more than \$500,000
- Sworn officers of 10 to fewer than 20: No more than \$700,000
- Sworn officers of 20+: No more than \$900,000





Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems Strategic Planning (PA 2)

GOAL: to initiate a broad assessment of a tribe's current justice system and to then produce a comprehensive plan to further develop and enhance that justice system.





Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems Strategic Planning (PA 2)

Develop a justice system-wide strategic plan that includes:

- Law enforcement;
- Courts;
- Community corrections;
- Alternatives to incarceration;
- Collaborative strategies to address serious and violent crime;
- Strategies to address crime related to substance and alcohol abuse, including opioids;
- Tribal jails programming
- Crime victims' rights and services for all victims of crime, including services to promote safety for victims of child abuse, domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, and stalking;
- Addressing juvenile justice needs from prevention through re-entry; and
- Community resources that support alternatives to incarceration and re-entry into the community following incarceration (i.e., jail, prison, etc.).



Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems (PA 2)

Project Funds May Support the Following:

Full or Part-Time Project Manager to facilitate the planning process

Community outreach

Office supplies

Contractors to support the data collection and analysis, including research partners.



Comprehensive Tribal Justice Systems (PA 2)

Awarding up to <u>4</u> applications for approximately <u>\$150k</u> per award

Period of performance: Up to 60 months





Tribal Justice Systems (PA 3)

The Tribal Justice Systems program encompasses both the Tribal Courts Assistance Program (TCAP) and the Indian Alcohol and Substance Abuse Program (IASAP).

Projects under this purpose area can focus on the tribal justice system, alcohol and substance abuse or both.

Awarding up to <u>35</u> applications for approximately <u>\$250,000</u> <u>\$900,00</u> per award.

Period of performance: 60 Months





Tribal Justice System Infrastructure Program (PA 4)

GOAL: To assist tribes with building justice system infrastructure capacity by providing funding to support the renovation and/or expansion of existing facilities or establishment of prefabricated or permanent modular buildings to serve as:

- correctional facilities;
- correctional alternative/treatment facilities;
- multipurpose justice centers (including police departments corrections);
- domestic violence shelters/safe homes/transitional living facilities/advocacy programs; and
- transitional living facilities (halfway houses).





Tribal Justice System Infrastructure Program (PA 4)

Examples of Different PA 4 Funded Projects:

Renovation and expansion of police department

Renovation of existing building to serve as tribal court

Renovation of existing building to serve as transitional living facility

Replacement of existing outpatient and residential treatment facility with permanent modular facility

Purchase of Furniture, Fixtures, and equipment for detention center

Permanent modular facility to serve as multipurpose justice center

Domestic Violence Shelters or Transitional Living Facilities





Tribal Justice System Infrastructure Program (PA 4)

Award Information for PA 4

Estimated \$7.5 million is available
 Estimated 2–4 awards will be made for facility renovation or expansion or completion of existing construction projects, for approximately \$1 million per award.

Estimated **1–2 awards** for facility renovation or expansion or completion of existing construction projects for regional facility approximately **\$2–4 million per award.**

Period of performance: 60 Months





GOAL: This program enhances the ability of tribes to respond to violent crimes against Indian women particularly domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking and sex trafficking. Also to enhance victim safety, and develop education and prevention strategies.





In FY 2020, OVW is interested in supporting the priority area(s) identified below. Applications proposing activities in the following areas will be given priority in funding decisions.

- Reducing violent crime against women and promote victim safety through investing in law enforcement and increasing prosecution
- Hiring and training a .5 full time equivalent or more law enforcement position, including village public safety officers
- Establishing a domestic violence court/docket or a specialized prosecution or probation unit with trained personnel
- Empowering Victims to become Survivors by growing them past their vulnerabilities to a place of self-sufficiency
- Increase efforts to combat stalking to include cyber stalking

OVW anticipates making up to \$34 million available through this purpose area—awarding up to 55 applications.

- **New applicants**: Applicants that have never before received funding from OVW or whose last award from OVW closed on or before September 30, 2019 are eligible to request up to \$900,000.
- Current grantees: Applicants that have at least one active, current award from OVW are
 considered current grantees. There is no explicit limit on how much current grantees can
 request; however, because of demand for funding, OVW anticipates that it will not be
 able to offer current grantees an award totaling more than \$900,000.





Children's Justice Act Partnership for Indian Communities (PA 6)

Goal: To provide funding and TTA to help AI/AN communities develop, establish, and operate programs designed to improve the investigation, prosecution, and handling of cases of **criminal** child abuse and neglect, particularly child sexual abuse cases, in a manner designed to minimize trauma for child victims and their family.

Children's Justice Act Partnership for Indian Communities (PA 6)

Award Information for PA 6

- Estimated **\$2.7 million** is available
- Approximately 6 awards; up to a maximum of \$450k per award
- Period of performance: 3 years



Due to the limited amount of funding available under PA 6, applications focused on the criminal investigation and prosecution of child abuse and neglect, especially cases of child sexual abuse, will receive priority consideration.





Juvenile Tribal Healing to Wellness Courts (PA 8)

Goal: The overall purpose of this grant program is to support tribes seeking to develop a **new** Juvenile Tribal Healing to Wellness Court to respond to the alcohol and substance use issues (including opioid use) of juveniles and young adults under the age of 21.





Juvenile Tribal Healing to Wellness Courts (PA 8)

Examples of different projects funded under PA 8:

Developing a JHTW court that promotes physical and spiritual healing utilizing a holistic, traditional, and community-wide approach

Building capacity for the tribe to implement evidence based substance abuse intervention and prevention strategies with court-involved youth

Development of an 11 member intertribal court



Juvenile Tribal Healing to Wellness Courts (PA 8)

Federal Award Information for PA 8

- Estimated **\$2 million** is available
- Approximately <u>5</u> awards; up to a maximum of \$400k per award
- Period of performance: 5 years





GOAL: To support and enhance tribal efforts to prevent and reduce juvenile delinquency and strengthen a fair and beneficial juvenile justice system response for American Indian and Alaska Native youth.

Note: The population of youth served under this grant **must not include youth** who are age 18 or older.





Applicants may choose to address any of the following eligible activities described below, and should choose from the following 2 categories.

(Category 1) Develop a new tribal youth program. Applicants are limited to those tribes that have not been awarded a PA 9 award from OJJDP in FY19, FY 18 or FY 17.

(Category 2) Continue or enhance an existing OJJDP-funded youth program. Funding for this activity is intended for current grantees who have developed and are implementing a successful youth program that they would like to expand or extend.

Afterschool programs

Diversion programs

Truancy prevention and intervention

Treatment services for children exposed to violence

Tribal best practices and traditional healing to support youth

- Awarding up to <u>9</u> applications for up to <u>\$400,000</u> per award

Application Timeline

- Solicitation Opened: Tuesday, December 4, 2019
- Solicitation Closes: 9 p.m. ET, Tuesday, February 25, 2020
- DOJ expects to award grants no later than September 30, 2020

Eligibility (who may apply)

The following applicants are eligible to apply for CTAS:

- 1. Federally Recognized Indian Tribal Governments
- 2. Tribal Consortia
- 3. Tribal Designees are eligible to apply only for OVW and OVC programs

Note: Each purpose area may have different eligibility requirements. For more information, please review the eligibility information under each purpose area section.



Applications Should Include

The following information **must be included** in the application submission:

- Tribal Community & Justice Profile (30% of the application score) *
- Purpose Area Narrative for each requested Purpose Area for which the applicant is applying for (50% of the application score)*
- **Purpose Area Timeline** for <u>each requested Purpose Area</u> for which the applicant is applying for (5% of the application score)*
- Budget Detail Worksheet and Narrative (15% of the application score) *
 (Demographic Form is only applicable for Purpose Area 1 Applicants.)



If you fail to submit <u>ANY</u> of above documents, your application <u>will not</u> be considered for funding!



Applications Should also Include

Along with the <u>4</u> required documents, the following information <u>should be included</u> in the application submission:

- Project Abstract
- Application Disclosure of High Risk Status
- Application Disclosure of Pending or Active Applications
- Tribal Authority to Apply
 Documentation/Tribal Resolution (tribal designees only)

- Disclosure of Lobbying Activities
- Indirect Cost Rate Agreement (if applicable)
- Financial Management and System of Internal Controls Questionnaire
- Other Attachments (as needed)
 - Prior OVC Approved Strategic
 Plan or Logic Model
 - Resumes of Key Personnel


CTAS Application Quick Start Guide

DOJ is currently seeking peer reviewers to assess grant applications. Reviewers should have relevant **expertise and experience** related to either: public safety, criminal and juvenile justice or relevant crime victimizations.

What's involved:

- Participate remotely
- Review and score 5-15 applications within a 2-week period
- Participate in an Orientation Call before beginning their review
- Reviewers are paid \$125 for each application reviewed
