FACTUAL BASIS

The defendant, **TREVOIR JACKSON** ("JACKSON"), has agreed to plead guilty as charged to Count 1 of a two-count indictment.

Should this matter have gone to trial, the government would have demonstrated, through the introduction of competent testimony and other admissible evidence, the following facts, beyond a reasonable doubt, to support the allegations in the indictment now pending against **JACKSON**:

On April 20, 2016, the Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office ("JPSO") responded to a report of firearms discharge at approximately 2:47 a.m. in the 1100 block of Lurline Drive in Jefferson, Louisiana. When JPSO deputies arrived at the scene, they were told that the gunshot victim, JACKSON, was in the Ochsner Hospital emergency room. JPSO met with JACKSON at the hospital. JACKSON stated that he was walking on Lurline Drive when an unknown individual began to shoot at him. JACKSON said that once the shooting was over he ran into his home and told his father that he had been shot. JACKSON'S father drove JACKSON to the hospital. JACKSON sustained five gunshot wounds.

JPSO also interviewed **JACKSON'S** father, Roger Jackson. Roger Jackson said that he was asleep in his home when he was awakened by gunshots. He said that he observed **JACKSON** come in the back door stating, "Dad, I'm shot." Roger Jackson then drove **JACKSON** to the hospital.

As JPSO processed the scene of the shooting, they observed a blood trail from 1101 Lurline Drive and ending at JACKSON'S home at 1105 Lurline Drive. JPSO located an additional blood trail from 1101 Lurline Drive that ended on the side of a raised residence located at 1109 Lurline Drive. JPSO noticed that latticework that surrounded the lower portion of the residence was pushed inward. JPSO then looked under the house and saw a loaded semi-automatic handgun, specifically a Springfield Armory Model 1911-A1, .45 caliber semi-automatic handgun, bearing serial number N436526, with blood on it. The Springfield Arms firearm fits the definition of "firearm" as described in 18 U.S.C. § 921(a)(3). DNA analysis later determined that the blood on the firearm was JACKSON'S. JACKSON knowingly possessed the loaded firearm prior to the shooting and placed it under the house where it was later recovered by JPSO.

AUSA POOL Defendant A. No. Defense Counsel AUI Before **JACKSON** came into possession of the Springfield Arms firearm, the firearm traveled in interstate commerce, including from Mississippi, where it was stolen from its original owner, to Louisiana. At the time **JACKSON** possessed the Springfield Arms firearm, **JACKSON** had been convicted of a crime punishable by imprisonment for a term in excess of one year, specifically a February 2008 conviction for possession of cocaine, in violation of La. R.S. 40:967(C) in Jefferson Parish case number 07-6930 "N."
