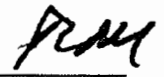

PLEA AGREEMENT

Pursuant to Fed. R. Crim. P. 11(c), the United States of America, by A. Lee Bentley, III, United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, and the defendant, RAYMOND  RODRIGUEZ, JR. , and the attorney for the defendant, Victor Martinez, mutually agree as follows:

A. Particularized Terms

1. Count(s) Pleading To

The defendant shall enter a plea of guilty to Count One of the Information. Count One charges the defendant with money laundering conspiracy, in violation of 18 U.S.C. § 1956(h).

2. Maximum Penalties

Count One carries a maximum sentence of 20 years imprisonment, a fine of not more than \$500,000, a term of supervised release of up to three years, and a special assessment of \$100. With respect to certain offenses, the Court shall order the defendant to make restitution to any victim of the offense(s),

and with respect to other offenses, the Court may order the defendant to make restitution to any victim of the offense(s), or to the community, as set forth below.

3. Elements of the Offense(s)

The defendant acknowledges understanding the nature and elements of the offense(s) with which defendant has been charged and to which defendant is pleading guilty. The elements of Count One are:

First: That two or more persons, in some way or manner, came to a mutual understanding to try to accomplish a common and unlawful plan, as charged in the Indictment; and;

Second: That the defendant, knowing the unlawful purpose of the plan, willfully joined in it.

4. Indictment Waiver

Defendant will waive the right to be charged by way of indictment before a federal grand jury.

5. No Further Charges

If the Court accepts this plea agreement, the United States Attorney's Office for the Middle District of Florida agrees not to charge defendant with committing any other federal criminal offenses known to the United States Attorney's Office at the time of the execution of this agreement related to the facts giving rise to this agreement. This includes any obstruction of justice charges stemming from the production of documents responsive to a grand jury subpoena in the instant case. The United States also agrees not to charge the

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defendant's wife, B.R., with any offense related to the facts giving rise to this agreement.

6. Guidelines Sentence

Pursuant to Fed. R. Crim. P. 11(c)(1)(B), the United States will recommend to the Court that the defendant be sentenced within the defendant's applicable guidelines range as determined by the Court pursuant to the United States Sentencing Guidelines, as adjusted by any departure the United States has agreed to recommend in this plea agreement. The parties understand that such a recommendation is not binding on the Court and that, if it is not accepted by this Court, neither the United States nor the defendant will be allowed to withdraw from the plea agreement, and the defendant will not be allowed to withdraw from the plea of guilty.

7. Acceptance of Responsibility - Three Levels

At the time of sentencing, and in the event that no adverse information is received suggesting such a recommendation to be unwarranted, the United States will recommend to the Court that the defendant receive a two-level downward adjustment for acceptance of responsibility, pursuant to USSG §3E1.1(a). The defendant understands that this recommendation or request is not binding on the Court, and if not accepted by the Court, the defendant will not be allowed to withdraw from the plea.

Further, at the time of sentencing, if the defendant's offense level prior to operation of subsection (a) is level 16 or greater, and if the defendant

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complies with the provisions of USSG §3E1.1(b) and all terms of this Plea Agreement, including but not limited to, the timely submission of the financial affidavit referenced in Paragraph B.5., the United States agrees to file a motion pursuant to USSG §3E1.1(b) for a downward adjustment of one additional level. The defendant understands that the determination as to whether the defendant has qualified for a downward adjustment of a third level for acceptance of responsibility rests solely with the United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, and the defendant agrees that the defendant cannot and will not challenge that determination, whether by appeal, collateral attack, or otherwise.

8. Cooperation - Substantial Assistance to be Considered

Defendant agrees to cooperate fully with the United States in the investigation and prosecution of other persons, and to testify, subject to a prosecution for perjury or making a false statement, fully and truthfully before any federal court proceeding or federal grand jury in connection with the charges in this case and other matters, such cooperation to further include a full and complete disclosure of all relevant information, including production of any and all books, papers, documents, and other objects in defendant's possession or control, and to be reasonably available for interviews which the United States may require. If the cooperation is completed prior to sentencing, the government agrees to consider whether such cooperation qualifies as "substantial assistance" in accordance with the policy of the United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, warranting the filing of a motion at the time of

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sentencing recommending (1) a downward departure from the applicable guideline range pursuant to USSG §5K1.1, or (2) the imposition of a sentence below a statutory minimum, if any, pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3553(e), or (3) both. If the cooperation is completed subsequent to sentencing, the government agrees to consider whether such cooperation qualifies as "substantial assistance" in accordance with the policy of the United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, warranting the filing of a motion for a reduction of sentence within one year of the imposition of sentence pursuant to Fed. R. Crim. P. 35(b). In any case, the defendant understands that the determination as to whether "substantial assistance" has been provided or what type of motion related thereto will be filed, if any, rests solely with the United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida, and the defendant agrees that defendant cannot and will not challenge that determination, whether by appeal, collateral attack, or otherwise.

9. Use of Information - Section 1B1.8

Pursuant to USSG §1B1.8(a), the United States agrees that no self-incriminating information which the defendant may provide during the course of defendant's cooperation and pursuant to this agreement shall be used in determining the applicable sentencing guideline range, subject to the restrictions and limitations set forth in USSG §1B1.8(b).

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10. Cooperation - Responsibilities of Parties

a. The government will make known to the Court and other relevant authorities the nature and extent of defendant's cooperation and any other mitigating circumstances indicative of the defendant's rehabilitative intent by assuming the fundamental civic duty of reporting crime. However, the defendant understands that the government can make no representation that the Court will impose a lesser sentence solely on account of, or in consideration of, such cooperation.

b. It is understood that should the defendant knowingly provide incomplete or untruthful testimony, statements, or information pursuant to this agreement, or should the defendant falsely implicate or incriminate any person, or should the defendant fail to voluntarily and unreservedly disclose and provide full, complete, truthful, and honest knowledge, information, and cooperation regarding any of the matters noted herein, the following conditions shall apply:

(1) The defendant may be prosecuted for any perjury or false declarations, if any, committed while testifying pursuant to this agreement, or for obstruction of justice.

(2) The United States may prosecute the defendant for the charges which are to be dismissed pursuant to this agreement, if any, and may either seek reinstatement of or refile such charges and prosecute the defendant thereon in the event such charges have been dismissed pursuant to

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this agreement. With regard to such charges, if any, which have been dismissed, the defendant, being fully aware of the nature of all such charges now pending in the instant case, and being further aware of defendant's rights, as to all felony charges pending in such cases (those offenses punishable by imprisonment for a term of over one year), to not be held to answer to said felony charges unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, and further being aware that all such felony charges in the instant case have heretofore properly been returned by the indictment of a grand jury, does hereby agree to reinstatement of such charges by recision of any order dismissing them or, alternatively, does hereby waive, in open court, prosecution by indictment and consents that the United States may proceed by information instead of by indictment with regard to any felony charges which may be dismissed in the instant case, pursuant to this plea agreement, and the defendant further agrees to waive the statute of limitations and any speedy trial claims on such charges.

(3) The United States may prosecute the defendant for any offenses set forth herein, if any, the prosecution of which in accordance with this agreement, the United States agrees to forego, and the defendant agrees to waive the statute of limitations and any speedy trial claims as to any such offenses.

(4) The government may use against the defendant the defendant's own admissions and statements and the information and books,

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papers, documents, and objects that the defendant has furnished in the course of the defendant's cooperation with the government.

(5) The defendant will not be permitted to withdraw the guilty pleas to those counts to which defendant hereby agrees to plead in the instant case but, in that event, defendant will be entitled to the sentencing limitations, if any, set forth in this plea agreement, with regard to those counts to which the defendant has pled; or in the alternative, at the option of the United States, the United States may move the Court to declare this entire plea agreement null and void.

11. Cooperation - Family Member

While defendant agrees to cooperate fully with the United States, the United States will not require defendant to testify against family members on direct examination at trial. However, defendant understands that defendant may be asked on cross-examination or rebuttal about the criminal activities of family members and understands and agrees to fully and truthfully answer any such questions.

12. Forfeiture of Assets

The defendant agrees to forfeit to the United States immediately and voluntarily any and all assets and property, or portions thereof, subject to forfeiture, pursuant to Title 18, United States Code, Section 982(a)(1) and Title 31, United States Code, Section 5317(c)(1), whether in the possession or control of the United States or in the possession or control of the defendant or

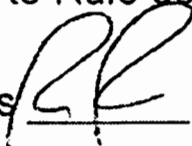
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defendant's nominees. The assets to be forfeited specifically include, but are not limited to, a money judgment equal to the value of the property involved in the offenses charged in Count One, which amount will be at least \$400,000.00. The defendant also hereby agrees to waive all constitutional, statutory and procedural challenges in any manner (including direct appeal, habeas corpus, or any other means) to any forfeiture carried out in accordance with this Plea Agreement on any grounds, including that the forfeiture described herein constitutes an excessive fine, was not properly noticed in the charging instrument, addressed by the Court at the time of the guilty plea, announced at sentencing, or incorporated into the judgment.

The defendant admits and agrees that the conduct described in the Factual Basis below provides a sufficient factual and statutory basis for the forfeiture of the property sought by the government. Pursuant to the provisions of Rule 32.2(b)(1)(A), the United States and the defendant request that promptly after accepting this Plea Agreement, the Court make a determination that the government has established the amount of the proceeds of the offense to which defendant is pleading guilty and enter an order of forfeiture. Pursuant to Rule 32.2(b)(4), the defendant agrees that the preliminary order of forfeiture will satisfy the notice requirement and will be final as to the defendant at the time it is entered. In the event the forfeiture is omitted from the judgment, the defendant agrees that the forfeiture order may be incorporated into the written judgment at any time pursuant to Rule 36.

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The defendant agrees that the United States shall, at its option, be entitled to the forfeiture of any property (substitute assets) of the defendant up to the value of the money judgment. The Court shall retain jurisdiction to settle any disputes arising from application of this clause. The defendant agrees that forfeiture of substitute assets as authorized herein shall not be deemed an alteration of the defendant's sentence.

The defendant agrees to take all steps necessary to identify and locate all substitute assets and to transfer custody of such assets to the United States before the defendant's sentencing. The defendant agrees to be interviewed by the government, prior to and after sentencing, regarding such assets. The defendant further agrees to be polygraphed on the issue of assets, if it is deemed necessary by the United States. The defendant agrees that Federal Rule of Criminal Procedure 11 and USSG §1B1.8 will not protect from forfeiture assets disclosed by the defendant as part of his cooperation.

The defendant agrees to take all steps necessary to assist the government in obtaining clear title to any substitute assets before the defendant's sentencing. In addition to providing full and complete information about substitute assets, these steps include, but are not limited to, the surrender of title, the signing of a consent decree of forfeiture, and signing of any other documents necessary to effectuate such transfers.

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Forfeiture of the defendant's assets shall not be treated as satisfaction of any fine, restitution, cost of imprisonment, or any other penalty the Court may impose upon the defendant in addition to forfeiture.

The defendant agrees that, in the event the Court determines that the defendant has breached this section of the Plea Agreement, the defendant may be found ineligible for a reduction in the Guidelines calculation for acceptance of responsibility and substantial assistance, and may be eligible for an obstruction of justice enhancement.

B. Standard Terms and Conditions

1. Restitution, Special Assessment and Fine

The defendant understands and agrees that the Court, in addition to or in lieu of any other penalty, shall order the defendant to make restitution to any victim of the offense(s), pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3663A, for all offenses described in 18 U.S.C. § 3663A(c)(1); and the Court may order the defendant to make restitution to any victim of the offense(s), pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3663, including restitution as to all counts charged, whether or not the defendant enters a plea of guilty to such counts, and whether or not such counts are dismissed pursuant to this agreement. The defendant further understands that compliance with any restitution payment plan imposed by the Court in no way precludes the United States from simultaneously pursuing other statutory remedies for collecting restitution (18 U.S.C. § 3003(b)(2)), including, but not limited to,

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garnishment and execution, pursuant to the Mandatory Victims Restitution Act, in order to ensure that the defendant's restitution obligation is satisfied.

On each count to which a plea of guilty is entered, the Court shall impose a special assessment pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3013. To ensure that this obligation is satisfied, the Defendant agrees to deliver a check or money order to the Clerk of the Court in the amount of \$100, payable to "Clerk, U.S. District Court" within ten days of the change of plea hearing.

The defendant understands that this agreement imposes no limitation as to fine.

2. Supervised Release

The defendant understands that the offense(s) to which the defendant is pleading provide(s) for imposition of a term of supervised release upon release from imprisonment, and that, if the defendant should violate the conditions of release, the defendant would be subject to a further term of imprisonment.

3. Immigration Consequences of Pleading Guilty

The defendant has been advised and understands that, upon conviction, a defendant who is not a United States citizen may be removed from the United States, denied citizenship, and denied admission to the United States in the future.

4. Sentencing Information

The United States reserves its right and obligation to report to the Court and the United States Probation Office all information concerning the background, character, and conduct of the defendant, to provide relevant factual information, including the totality of the defendant's criminal activities, if any, not limited to the count(s) to which defendant pleads, to respond to comments made by the defendant or defendant's counsel, and to correct any misstatements or inaccuracies. The United States further reserves its right to make any recommendations it deems appropriate regarding the disposition of this case, subject to any limitations set forth herein, if any.

5. Financial Disclosures

Pursuant to 18 U.S.C. § 3664(d)(3) and Fed. R. Crim. P. 32(d)(2)(A)(ii), the defendant agrees to complete and submit to the United States Attorney's Office within 30 days of execution of this agreement an affidavit reflecting the defendant's financial condition. The defendant promises that his financial statement and disclosures will be complete, accurate and truthful and will include all assets in which he has any interest or over which the defendant exercises control, directly or indirectly, including those held by a spouse, dependent, nominee or other third party. The defendant further agrees to execute any documents requested by the United States needed to obtain from any third parties any records of assets owned by the defendant, directly or

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through a nominee, and, by the execution of this Plea Agreement, consents to the release of the defendant's tax returns for the previous five years. The defendant similarly agrees and authorizes the United States Attorney's Office to provide to, and obtain from, the United States Probation Office, the financial affidavit, any of the defendant's federal, state, and local tax returns, bank records and any other financial information concerning the defendant, for the purpose of making any recommendations to the Court and for collecting any assessments, fines, restitution, or forfeiture ordered by the Court. The defendant expressly authorizes the United States Attorney's Office to obtain current credit reports in order to evaluate the defendant's ability to satisfy any financial obligation imposed by the Court.

6. Sentencing Recommendations

It is understood by the parties that the Court is neither a party to nor bound by this agreement. The Court may accept or reject the agreement, or defer a decision until it has had an opportunity to consider the presentence report prepared by the United States Probation Office. The defendant understands and acknowledges that, although the parties are permitted to make recommendations and present arguments to the Court, the sentence will be determined solely by the Court, with the assistance of the United States Probation Office. Defendant further understands and acknowledges that any discussions between defendant or defendant's attorney and the attorney or other agents for the government

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regarding any recommendations by the government are not binding on the Court and that, should any recommendations be rejected, defendant will not be permitted to withdraw defendant's plea pursuant to this plea agreement. The government expressly reserves the right to support and defend any decision that the Court may make with regard to the defendant's sentence, whether or not such decision is consistent with the government's recommendations contained herein.

7. Defendant's Waiver of Right to Appeal the Sentence

The defendant agrees that this Court has jurisdiction and authority to impose any sentence up to the statutory maximum and expressly waives the right to appeal defendant's sentence on any ground, including the ground that the Court erred in determining the applicable guidelines range pursuant to the United States Sentencing Guidelines, except (a) the ground that the sentence exceeds the defendant's applicable guidelines range as determined by the Court pursuant to the United States Sentencing Guidelines; (b) the ground that the sentence exceeds the statutory maximum penalty; or (c) the ground that the sentence violates the Eighth Amendment to the Constitution; provided, however, that if the government exercises its right to appeal the sentence imposed, as authorized by 18 U.S.C. § 3742(b), then the defendant is released from his waiver and may appeal the sentence as authorized by 18 U.S.C. § 3742(a).

8. Middle District of Florida Agreement

It is further understood that this agreement is limited to the Office of the United States Attorney for the Middle District of Florida and cannot bind other federal, state, or local prosecuting authorities, although this office will bring defendant's cooperation, if any, to the attention of other prosecuting officers or others, if requested.

9. Filing of Agreement

This agreement shall be presented to the Court, in open court or in camera, in whole or in part, upon a showing of good cause, and filed in this cause, at the time of defendant's entry of a plea of guilty pursuant hereto.

10. Voluntariness

The defendant acknowledges that defendant is entering into this agreement and is pleading guilty freely and voluntarily without reliance upon any discussions between the attorney for the government and the defendant and defendant's attorney and without promise of benefit of any kind (other than the concessions contained herein), and without threats, force, intimidation, or coercion of any kind. The defendant further acknowledges defendant's understanding of the nature of the offense or offenses to which defendant is pleading guilty and the elements thereof, including the penalties provided by law, and defendant's complete satisfaction with the representation and advice received from defendant's undersigned counsel (if any). The defendant also

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understands that defendant has the right to plead not guilty or to persist in that plea if it has already been made, and that defendant has the right to be tried by a jury with the assistance of counsel, the right to confront and cross-examine the witnesses against defendant, the right against compulsory self-incrimination, and the right to compulsory process for the attendance of witnesses to testify in defendant's defense; but, by pleading guilty, defendant waives or gives up those rights and there will be no trial. The defendant further understands that if defendant pleads guilty, the Court may ask defendant questions about the offense or offenses to which defendant pleaded, and if defendant answers those questions under oath, on the record, and in the presence of counsel (if any), defendant's answers may later be used against defendant in a prosecution for perjury or false statement. The defendant also understands that defendant will be adjudicated guilty of the offenses to which defendant has pleaded and, if any of such offenses are felonies, may thereby be deprived of certain rights, such as the right to vote, to hold public office, to serve on a jury, or to have possession of firearms.

11. Factual Basis

Defendant is pleading guilty because defendant is in fact guilty. The defendant certifies that defendant does hereby admit that the facts set forth below are true, and were this case to go to trial, the United States would be able to prove those specific facts and others beyond a reasonable doubt.

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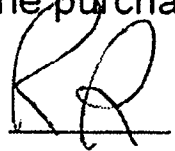
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FACTS

The defendant, Raymond L. Rodriguez, Jr., owned and operated Rodriguez Auto Wholesale along with his wife, B.R. Rodriguez Auto Wholesale was located at 4116 N. Florida Avenue, Tampa, in the Middle District of Florida. As a used car dealership that purchased and sold vehicles, Rodriguez Auto Wholesale was a business that conducted financial transactions in and affecting interstate and foreign commerce. Starting on an unknown date but at least in or around 2009, and continuing through the date of the Information, the defendant, Raymond L. Rodriguez Jr., acting alone and with others, knowingly sold vehicles to individuals who paid him and his conspirators with proceeds from the sale of illegal narcotics and/or stolen identity refund fraud (SIRF) offenses.

Rodriguez, who knew the funds were illegally derived, agreed to disguise the large cash transactions from the government in a number of ways. First, he agreed to accept large cash payments for vehicles without reporting the payments to the government by failing to file Forms 8300, as required by law. The defendant also agreed to place vehicles in the names of straw buyers so law enforcement and other governmental entities would not be aware of the true owner of the cars or the illegally gained proceeds used to purchase the vehicles. The defendant also promised purchasers he would keep a lien on certain vehicles, despite receiving payment in full, so that if those vehicles were seized by law enforcement authorities, Rodriguez could reclaim possession and return the seized cars to the purchaser and/or their family members.

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In or around 2012, several members of a Tampa-based drug trafficking organization (DTO) were charged with trafficking in hundreds of kilograms of cocaine. During the arrest of some members of the DTO, agents seized at least four luxury vehicles. One member of the DTO identified the defendant, Raymond Rodriguez, as the owner of a Tampa-area car dealership who assisted several members of the DTO in laundering their drug proceeds by selling them high-end used cars.

The leader of the DTO, K.L., told investigators that he purchased a 2003 Hummer from Rodriguez Auto Wholesale for approximately \$20,450 in or around late September 14, 2009. K.L. related that Rodriguez informed him that if he (K.L.) paid cash for the vehicle, Rodriguez would temporarily leave a lien on the vehicle to avoid raising suspicion by law enforcement about K.L. making a large cash purchase. Rodriguez also agreed to allow K.L. to use a straw purchaser and did not file a Form 8300 despite receiving payment in full in cash. K.L. pleaded guilty to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine.

Another member of the DTO, J.R., purchased several vehicles from Rodriguez Auto Wholesale between 2010 and 2012. J.R. related that he went to Rodriguez Auto Wholesale to buy vehicles because Rodriguez would ensure he, J.R., would not have to "worry about the Feds." J.R. stated that Rodriguez knew his funds to purchase the vehicles came from drug dealing because they spoke about it and because Rodriguez would purchase personal use amounts of marijuana from J.R. J.R. also used proceeds from stolen identify refund fraud,

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specifically money orders, to purchase vehicles from Rodriguez. J.R. stated that Rodriguez would increase the price of a vehicle in exchange for accepting SIFR proceeds in the form of money orders.

J.R. purchased a 2007 Mercedes from Rodriguez in or around September 2011, for approximately \$30,000. J.R. told investigators that Rodriguez agreed to title the car in his sister's name so J.R. "wouldn't get caught" and the "police wouldn't take the car." Rodriguez also failed to file a Form 8300 for the cash he received from J.R. in exchange for the vehicle.

Rodriguez sold J.R. additional vehicles, including an Infiniti Q35 and a Dodge Challenger. Each time, Rodriguez titled the vehicles in others' names and failed to file Form 8300's despite receiving payment in full in cash and/or money orders for the vehicles, which ranged in price from \$17,000 to \$30,000. J.R. pleaded guilty to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine.

Another member of the DTO, D.H., accompanied by an undercover Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office detective, went to Rodriguez Auto Wholesale in 2013. During the meeting, which was audio recorded, D.H. told Rodriguez that he (D.H.) was looking to buy a car, and Rodriguez tried to sell him a BMW. D.H. told Rodriguez that he did not have a job and could not legitimately pay for that type of vehicle. D.H. also said, "You know what I do, man," referring to the fact that D.H. was a drug dealer. Rodriguez responded to D.H., "I love

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'hood money!" D.H. pleaded guilty to conspiracy to possess with intent to distribute cocaine.

Yet another government informant, T.W., told investigators that Rodriguez knowingly accepted proceeds from SIRF offenses, particularly numerous money orders, for vehicles. T.W. admitted to purchasing four vehicles from Rodriguez Auto Wholesale, all of which she paid for in cash with the proceeds of SIRF crimes. T.W. stated that most people who purchased cars from Rodriguez were drug dealers and "doing drops," the street term for SIRF, and that Rodriguez would sell cars in exchange for money orders and tax refunds loaded onto reloadable debit cards. T.W. pleaded guilty to theft of government property and aggravated identity theft. Investigators determined that Rodriguez sold vehicles to at least the following individuals in exchange for SIRF proceeds: T.B. (pleaded guilty to conspiracy to engage in theft of government property and aggravated identity theft); N.W. (pleaded guilty to theft of government property and aggravated identity theft); and P.W. (pleaded guilty to theft of government property and aggravated identity theft).

Agents reviewed Rodriguez Auto Wholesale's bank account records, on which the defendant was a signatory. They identified approximately 953 currency deposits into five bank different bank accounts totaling \$3,772,335.23 between 2009, and 2012, all of which were less than \$10,000, indicating Rodriguez and his conspirators structured the deposits of the money laundering proceeds. In Rodriguez Auto Wholesale's primary operating account

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at Bank of America, Rodriguez and his conspirators made \$2,205,028.00 worth of cash deposits and deposited \$521,130.00 in money orders. Other accounts showed similar activity, including: (a) BOA account ending 6137 had \$355,922 in cash deposits; (b) BOA account ending 5183 had \$220,960 in cash deposits; (c) BOA account ending 6082 had \$507,579 cash deposits and \$27,600.00 in money order deposits; and (d) a GTEFCU account ending 2076 had \$482,846.63 in cash deposits.

In total, between 2009 and 2013, the defendant Raymond L. Rodriguez Jr. and his conspirators laundered at least \$1,751,648 worth of proceeds derived from the sale of illegal narcotics and the commission of SIRF offenses through his automobile dealership, Rodriguez Auto Wholesale, via the sale of approximately 87 vehicles.

12. Entire Agreement

This plea agreement constitutes the entire agreement between the government and the defendant with respect to the aforementioned guilty plea and no other promises, agreements, or representations exist or have been made to the defendant or defendant's attorney with regard to such guilty plea.

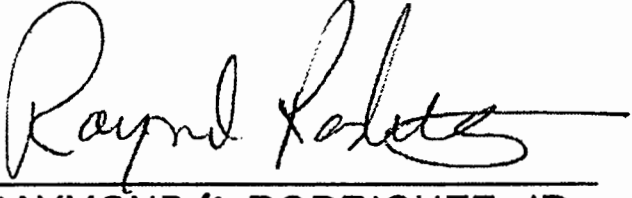

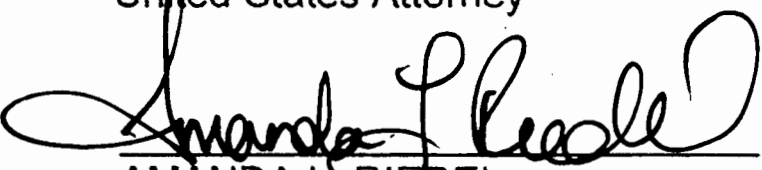
