## What is a United States Attorney's Office?

United States Attorneys serve as the nation's principal litigators under the direction of the United States Attorney General. Each U. S. Attorney is the chief law enforcement officer within the Federal District in which they are appointed. There are 93 U.S. Attorneys stationed in 94 Federal Districts throughout the United States, Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, Guam, and the Northern Mariana Islands. Each U.S. Attorney has a staff composed of lawyers and support personnel such as paralegals and legal assistants. Collectively, the U.S. Attorneys and their staffs are referred to as the United States Attorneys' Offices or USAOs.

USAOs conduct most of the trial work in which the United States is a party. The U.S. Attorneys have three statutory responsibilities under Title 28, Section 547 of the United States Code: the prosecution of criminal cases brought by the Federal government; the prosecution and defense of civil cases in which the United States is a party; and the collection of debts owed the Federal government which are administratively uncollectible.

# **Organization of USAOs**\*

Most USAOs have the following sections:

- Administrative Office provides support in the areas of human resources, budget, information technology, and logistics
- Appellate Division handles all appellate cases
- Civil Division prosecutes and defends civil cases for the federal government
- Criminal Division prosecutes federal crimes
- Financial Litigation Unit collects debts owed to the federal government
- Victim Witness/Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee – works to improve communication and cooperation among numerous agencies and aid in law enforcement
